Here in the capital, Governor Alf M. Landon's record in Kansas was the subject of conflicting statements.

Labor's non-partisan league, formed to help with re-election for President Roosevelt, made public a report by Leslie Doud, Kansas labor editor, saying the Landon administration is "controlled" by the "school book trust and the light and power trust."

Oscar Stauffer, Arkansas City, Kansas, editor, said that Landon has "no jurisdiction" over schools but that Kansas teachers have thanked him for his opposition to a proposed constitutional amendment to "put a fixed limit on local expenditures."

Governor Landon travelled to Colorado today for a brief vacation before starting his presidential campaign tour into the east. President Roosevelt made an unannounced journey late yesterday to nearby Orono, Md., where he talked with some prominent Maryland democrats. Senator Radcliffe (D-Md.) said the campaign was discussed.

State Range Condition Over Average of Last 10 Years

PORTLAND, Aug. 12 (AP) — Condition of Oregon ranges, although somewhat under normal, is shown by the August 1 bulletin of the department of agriculture to be well over the average of the past 10 years and to be the best of any western state, with the exception of Idaho.

The report given Oregon ranges a rating of 88 per cent of normal against 82 per cent a year ago and 94 per cent a month ago. The average August 1 figure for the last 10 years is 85.1. Cattle figures also place Oregon next to Idaho among western states, with a figure of 80 per cent, 2 points better than at the same time last year. The July figure was 88 and the 10-year average 80.4. Similarly, Oregon's sheep come next to Idaho's with a rating of 89 per cent, as compared to 88 a year ago, 93 in July, and a 10-year average of 90.9.

The report said that the last few weeks of warm, dry weather in the Willamette valley had affected pasture conditions there and resulted in a slight reduction in conditions of cattle and sheep, although livestock are still in good shape.

Gilliam county cattle, sheep and ranges were reported to be in very good shape, with lamb condition and weights somewhat better than in 1935. In Morrow county ranges were said to be drying very fast, but with hay probably ample for wintering livestock.

Cattle, sheep and ranges in Baker county were in good condition, although recent hot

weather has affected the range. The Pendleton district of Umatilla county reported good hay and pasture with plenty of feed. Around Pilot Rock, foothills were said to be well-grassed but with some lower ranges very bare. In Union county, the Cove district had a hay surplus. Around Elgin and Union ranges were dry. Walla Walla county conditions were good, except in the Flora section which reported hot and dry weather with springs failing.

High ranges were the best in years with fall range prospects good in southwestern Oregon. Jackson county reported a slight shortage of stock water in some sections, while Douglas county reported considerable rain damage to hay crops.

The Malheur section of Klamath county reported lamb heavier than last year, while Crockett district lamb were said to be as good or better than last year, although fewer. Around Merrill, ranges are expected to be very short but stubble pasture plentiful. All livestock was in excellent condition in Lake county, although with water getting very short in some places, late lambs are expected to shrink but still be better than average.

In Malheur county, water on ranges was better than for 7 or 8 years. Jordan valley fall range prospects were said to be poor. Wheeler county reported cattle, sheep and lambs in good shape. The fall range was fair but dry, with some water shortage expected.

sources, France looked toward the possibility of lending aid to the Madrid government in keeping with its statement that it reserved the right to dispatch war supplies if general neutrality could not be achieved.

Germany so far has failed to reply formally to the French suggestions.

Italy, together with Germany, has tagged its "agreement in principle" with reservations and suggestions.

Sweden, Norway and Denmark informed the foreign office today they had approved the French formula for non-intervention. Premier Mussolini was represented as wanting to "complete" the French formula by including some assurance that all powers would execute their engagements.
