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us do those things now which honorably may be done to maintain peace.

Enumerating the opportunities of the legion for service, Murphy pointed to the pledge to the veterans to combat communism, fascism, Hitlerism and like propaganda but he cautioned:

"While it is ever true that we must be vigilant in protecting our country against subversion, by whatever name it comes into our midst, it is equally important that in moments of over-zealousness, however well-intentioned they may be, that we do not permit ourselves to resort to un-Americanism.

**Youth Work Undertaken**

"There is a wide difference between subversion and orderly progress carried out in tempo with the onward march of civilization. While firmly combating the forces of violent revolution, therefore, we must be on guard that we do not make the mistake of failing to distinguish between subversion and progress."

The vast youth activities of the legion in its support of Boy Scouts, the Sons of the American Legion, the Legion Junior Baseball program, the boys' state, aid to underprivileged children in which it spent a million dollars alone last year, community service work in times of emergency and otherwise, such as the maintenance of playgrounds, provide splendid outlets for the energy of legion organizations, he said.

"Let us work without rest to protect the peace and honor of our beloved America; to render community service in its highest forms; to the completion of a child welfare program which will carry out the constitutional pledge of equal opportunity for all," he said in conclusion.

"Let us carry forward a rousing Americanism program based securely upon American methods and principles, with emphasis upon the guidance of youth to adequate preparation for citizenship and leadership.

"Here, my comrades, is a program above reproach; here is a program which no honest person can call 'selfish.'"

# Home of Big Klamath Mill



Hard wheat bakers' flour manufactured by Martin Brothers' mill in Klamath Falls is proving particularly popular with San Francisco bakers, who recently placed an order for 10 cars, or 2000 barrels of the local product to be used in the bay city district.

Several Klamath Falls bakers are also using this special flour, which is manufactured especially for the trade.

Martin Brothers' firm was established in 1884 by Thomas Martin, father of the present owners. All products used at the mill, with the exception of corn, are grown in the Klamath basin.

The mill has a capacity of 200 barrels a day, and is the largest mill between Portland and Sacramento.

A storage capacity of 300,000 bushels of grain is maintained in Klamath Falls, in addition to a 100,000 bushel capacity warehouse at Tulelake.

Martin Brothers also manufacture and handle stock flour and feed for retail and wholesale trade.

Thomas Martin built his first mill on Link river, where the business was operated from 1884 until 1908, when the railroad entered the city, and the firm built a roller mill on Sixth and Oak streets.

In 1917 the mill was moved to its present location on South Sixth street, but the structure was destroyed by fire a year later.

It was rebuilt at once, and completed in 1919, with operations resumed immediately.

Displays of all brands of flour, feed and other produce manufactured at the local mill are in the chamber of commerce windows this week.

On Saturday of this week, Martin Brothers mill will conduct a baking school in the offices of the Natural Gas company on Seventh and Main streets, using the special pastry flour manufactured for baking. Crater Lake and Anchor flour are the most popular brands manufactured by the local mill.

# Throngs Gather in Kentucky to Witness Public Hanging

OWENSBORO, Ky., Aug. 13 (AP)—Authorities estimated today approximately 10,000 persons would witness at dawn here tomorrow the public hanging of Rainey Bethea, 22, convicted negro rapist-slayer, by a woman sheriff.

As hotels began filling with visitors, city officials considered closing all liquor stores at 1 a. m., tomorrow. Authorities issued warnings against drunkenness and public disturbances the morning of the execution.

The hanging—the first to be held in Daviess county since two men were executed 31 years ago, will be conducted in the fenced-in yard of the county garage.
