

STRONGER SPUD MARKET SHOWN IN ALL SECTIONS

The Market News Service, just received at the county agent's office, shows further strengthening of potatoes in practically all markets. The price on futures in the Chicago market has shown considerable strength since publication of the August 1 report. Idaho Russets, 100 lb. sacks, U. S. No. 1, for October delivery are now quoted at from \$2.18 to \$2.25 per cwt. January delivery at from \$2.60 to \$2.63.

The August 1 estimate shows the four Pacific states of Idaho, Washington, Oregon and California, have an estimated crop for 1936 of 48,745,000 bushels, as compared with 39,230,000 bushels in 1935. The crop throughout the northwest seems to be doing particularly well, indicating heavy yields and good quality. A further report from the department of agriculture this week indicates that Oregon is the only state in the Union entirely unaffected by drought or some other serious condition affecting crop production. Maine and Idaho are close seconds to Oregon, each of these states however having a small corner of the state slightly affected, but not of economic importance. All states throughout the middle west and adjoining states both on the east and west of this area show tremendous crop deterioration affecting all crops and livestock throughout that area. Apparently Oregon is the favored state in the Union at the present time.

The estimated wheat report for the northwestern states of Oregon, Washington and Idaho, indicates a total harvest of all wheat of 88,060,000 bushels, as compared with 80,731,000 bushels in 1935, and a five-year average from 1928 to 1932, of 91,237,000 bushels—again showing the favored condition of the northwest.

Hitler Stages Great Show Of Nazi Might at Stadium

OLYMPIC STADIUM, Berlin, Aug. 14 (UP)—In the pit of the Reich's great sports stadium where the finest youth of 52 nations have been battling for athletic supremacy under the Olympic code of good sportsmanship, Chancellor Adolf Hitler Thursday staged an elaborate demonstration of Nazi Germany's armed might.

It was the first time in the history of the Olympics that a military review was made part of the games.

Twenty five hundred helmeted men of the army, navy and air force—most of them about the same age as the Olympic athletes—goose-stepped onto the field amidst deafening "Heils". Eighty thousand arms swung up in the Nazi salute as the crack troops marched past the tribune where Hitler, surrounded by high officers of the third Reich's fighting forces, stood at rigid attention with right arm outstretched.

Mayhem Trial at S. F. to Be Heard By 9 Men, 3 Women

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 14 (UP)—A predominantly male jury—nine men and three women—was chosen late Thursday to hear testimony in the trial of Dr. Tilton E. Tillman and Dr. Samuel G. Boyd, charged with conspiracy to commit mayhem in the sterilization of Ann Cooper Hewitt, daughter of inventor Peter Cooper Hewitt and the five times married Marjory Cooper Hooper McCarter.

The defense sought an all-male jury and it came close to succeeding in its endeavor. The balance between the sexes on the jury swung in the two days of trial from almost half women to one point at which only two women were in the box. Another was added before both state and defense accepted the jury and prepared to begin testimony.
