Regiment to Visit—An extended march of the 10th field artillery regiment from Fort Lewis will bring the men to Klamath Falls on September 5, according to word received by the city police bureau. The regiment will camp at the fair grounds until the night of September 7, when it will march via the Green-springs highway to Grants Pass, leaving here shortly after midnight. The regiment is motorized and will have with it approximately 160 vehicles and 550 men, according to Major William Alexander, plans and training officer. A police escort and traffic control officer will be supplied by the local bureau both on arrival and departure of the regiment.

21-Point Plan Offered

Koehn presented, as the keynote of the annual commander's report to the state convention, a 21-point program headed by a war-cry against all forms of dictatorship and subversive activities, and including a demand for Legionnaires to stand opposed to constitutional amendments "tending to interfere with the operation of the fundamental principles of our form of government."

Other planks in the platform included:

Continued advocacy of an "adequate" national defense;
Opposition to American entry into the league of nations as now constituted;

Adoption of a permanent strict neutrality policy by the United States;

Debt Default Assailed.

Refusal of future loans to all nations that have defaulted on previous obligations;
Opposition to modification or cancellation of foreign war debts;

Adoption of the universal draft law;

Federal control and regulation of the manufacture and sale of armaments;

Total restriction of immigration for at least 10 years; registration of all aliens now in the country, and a policy of "American jobs for Americans first";

Prompt deportation of all alien criminals and expulsion of all aliens who advocate the violent overthrow of the American government;

Withdrawal of diplomatic recognition to Soviet Russia;

Subscription to an oath of allegiance to the United States by all employees of federal, state, and municipal governments;

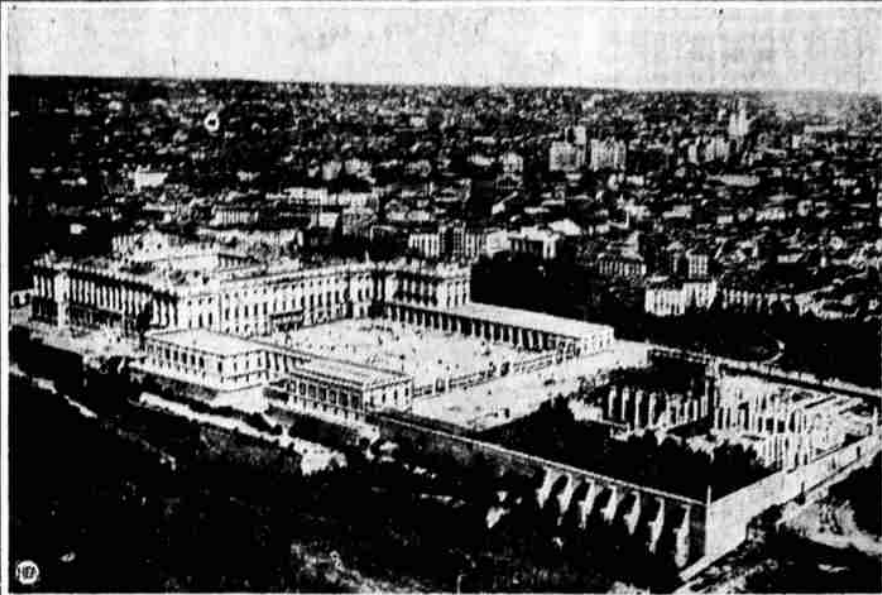
Continuation of the fight for "proper and reasonable" care of disabled veterans but not for general pensions;

Continuation of the Legion program of community service, child welfare, and development of American youth.

great American Legion," said Koehn. "Let us nail this course of action—this thesis—to our masthead as we launch on a program of yet greater service, to the land we love. We must, we shall go forward, practical idealists in the cause of liberty and freedom, defenders of American institutions and traditions, builders of a constructive, patriotic program."

Koehn urged that a committee of 1000 be formed from the Legion's 1935 Oregon posts to combat the anti-military training bill, he also asked that a speaker's bureau be organized to more fully acquaint the public with the aims and purposes of the Legion.

The retiring commander brought to the attention of the convention the abolition by Governor Martin of the soldiers' and sailors' commission, and urged that the Legion devise some means of financing the office of state service officer. He further suggested that in such case, services should be rendered by the service officer only to members of the Legion.

Koehn expressed satisfaction with the work of the Legion during the past year, which he asserted was the most successful in Legion history. He pointed out that the two major parts of the Legion program, payment of the adjusted service certificates and increase in national defense, had both materialized.

Two of the biggest figures in Soviet Russia were arrested in connection with the alleged crime against the government. They were Leon Kamenoff, former assistant head of the council of commissars, and Gregory Zinoviev, former chairman of the executive council of the third international.

RUSSIA ARRESTS REVOLT SUSPECTS

MOSCOW, Aug. 14 (AP)—Sixteen persons were thrown in prison today by the Soviet government in the biggest counter-revolutionary plot to be announced by the government in more than a decade.

Directing the plot, said secret police who uncovered it, was the

exiled Leon Trotsky, now in asylum in Norway. The government charged that Trotsky was planning a terrorist campaign, including attacks against Soviet leaders.

It said he had sent five agents from abroad into Russia to help carry out his plans.

(Only last week Trotsky was given a clean bill of health by the Norwegian government after he had been accused by young Norwegian fascists of endeavoring to foment revolutions in France and other European countries.)

1 DEAD, 3 INJURED IN FOREST BLAZE

CALGARY, Alta., Aug. 14 (AP)—One man was burned to death and three others were injured as forest fires flared anew today in southwestern Alberta and in the southeastern corner of British Columbia.

The charred body of Alex Skiba, 35, Cranbrook, B. C., was found in the East Kootenays, just over the provincial boundary. He was one of a party trapped while fighting a blaze in the Green Bay district.

Three men were burned, two so severely they were taken to a hospital.

ST. PAUL, Aug. 14 (AP)—Rain abated the northern Minnesota forest fire danger somewhat today as showers aided fire fighters in subduing all brush, pest and bog fires in at least one area—Hibbing.

Minnesota's three principal conflagrations were checked for the time being.

A wireless dispatch to the Duluth National Guard from Kabetogama lake, 50 miles west of International Falls, said the flames had "burned out" on a peninsula after blackening 30,000 acres.

SPOKANE, Wash., Aug. 14 (AP)—Severe lightning storms and a new Canadian forest fire menaced timberlands in north Idaho and northwestern Montana today, after the forest service had reported all fires under control and started reducing crews.

The Spokane warehouse of the forest service received a report of a new fire on the Canadian border between Kingsgate, B. C., and Port Hill, west of where the Hunter mountain blaze has raged for several days. A spread of the flames would endanger the Kankiku forest.

DOWNTOWN FIRE PORTLAND, Aug. 14 (AP)—A spectacular downtown fire early today caused damage estimated at \$50,000 to a building at Southwest Fourth avenue and Washington street.
