

CLEAR LAKE, STUKEL AREAS BURNED OVER

on the Merrill side, and County Fire Warden Lynton Cunningham was coming over the hill with a fire trail to block off two sides of the blaze. Additional county crews and equipment went into the area Saturday morning.

This fire came dangerously close to Scott McKendree's sheep sheds on the Merrill side of the mountain last night. Calls for more help were sent out, and by backing it was possible to save the sheds from destruction. Stock and equipment were moved out.

Farms In Danger

Last night several farms were in the fire's path. A graintield on the Casbeer property was in danger. A general call to ranchers and farmers was sent out, and they gathered to bolster the fire fighting lines. Copco sent a crew out to protect power lines, and CCC youths were called from Honanza and Camp Klamath at Merrill. The Merrill fire department was also out on the line.

The blaze continued to prevent an impressive spectacle from the city and nearby roads and highways. Great billows of smoke arose from the mountain, and occasionally spurts of flame could be discerned through the heavy clouds. The fire frequently "topped" through the heavier stands of scrub timber.

60-Mile Front

Men from many points in California were rushed into the Modoc forest area to combat the fire there, which last night was burning on a 60-mile front. Low humidity and stiff winds nullified the efforts of the large force, and the blaze burned savagely onward, some predicting that it might go as far east as the Goose lake country and the Nevada line.

This fire started on the Southern Pacific right-of-way at Cornwell late Thursday. It leaped the Alhambra highway Friday, and swept to Clear lake boundary, a distance of eight miles. It was burning last night at the south end of Clear lake. A high wind sent another front northward in the direction of Malin.

The fire at times approached good timber, but none was destroyed up to last night. The Horn farm was saved by the frantic efforts of Clear lake CCC boys, as was another farm in that area.

The Clear lake men were relieved by eight companies of Medford and Redding CCC troops. The Southern Pacific sent four cars of men to the front last night. Three hundred came from Redding. Another 100 are due in Sunday.

Clear Lake CCC outfits are providing assistance for the fire fighters. About 100 meals an hour are being provided.

Radio service is being employed on this fire, with short wave sets keeping the front in constant touch with headquarters, as well as the Timber mountain lookout.

A crew from the Mud Lake CCC camps Friday afternoon lost a truck, and had to run for their lives as flames swept suddenly in on them. About 60 trucks are being used.

forward friendship, of peaceful understanding.

"But of necessity, we are deeply concerned about tendencies of recent years among many of the nations of the other continents. It is a bitter experience to us when the spirit of agreement to which we are a party is not lived up to. It is an even more bitter experience for the whole company of nations to witness not only the spirit but the letter of international agreements violated with impunity and without regard to the simple principles of honor. Permanent friendships between nations as between men can be sustained only by scrupulous respect for the pledged word."

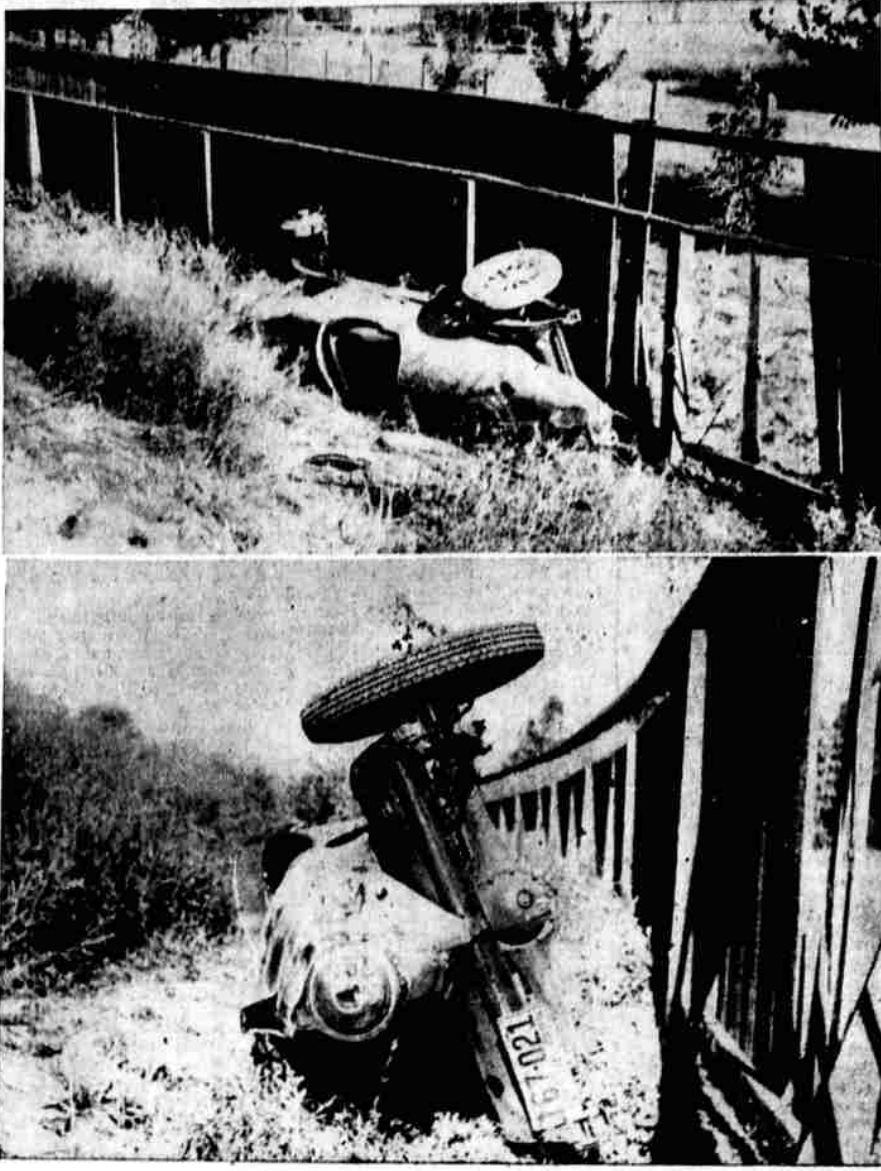

In spite of these violations the United States had sought to cooperate and assist in international movements to prevent war. "We cooperated," he said, "to the bitter end—and it was a bitter end—in the work of the general disarmament conference."

"When it failed, we sought a separate treaty to deal with the manufacture of arms and the international traffic in arms. That proposal also came to nothing."

To The Bitter End
"We participated—again to the bitter end—in a conference to continue naval limitation. And when it became evident that no general treaty could be signed because of the objections of other nations, we concluded with Great Britain and France a conditional treaty of qualitative limitation which, much to my regret, already shows signs of ineffectiveness."

At this point Mr. Roosevelt closed his summary on the treaty phase of the world situation by observing:

"We are no isolationists except insofar as we seek to isolate ourselves completely from war. I have passed unnumbered hours, thinking and planning how war may be kept from this nation."

The president, slowly measuring his words, then promised that he would make certain that no act of the United States helps to produce or promote war.

A prohibition on shipments of war materials to revolution-torn Spain awaited, however, assents from the German, Italian, Portuguese and Russian governments.

Only a few hours before the proposed embargo accord was approved, a grave warning to all Europe was issued by Downing street.

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LITTLE RELIEF FROM HEAT SEEN

A few clouds drifted over hot spots in the middle plains and southwest today, tantalizing sectors where the burning sun has killed more than 40 persons in a week.

Hot winds blew over Kansas, Oklahoma and Western Missouri and there was little hope of relief from 100-degree weather and worse.

Heat fatalities for the week totaled 27 in Oklahoma and 17 in Texas, but Texas temperatures returned to normal summer levels. Oklahoma has recorded 116 deaths since July 13.

A sprinkle last night gave Kansas City only momentary relief from a record-breaking temperature of 112.6 degrees. Emporia, Kan., had 116, Lawrence 114 and Topeka 113.

Some parts of the drought-suffering northwest were cooled overnight by rain. The Chicago area received its heaviest rain of the year, 1.41 inches at Chicago and 2.1 at Rockford, Ill. Scattered showers fell in Iowa. Minneapolis had thundershowers last night.

TWO MORE FINES PAID SATURDAY

Otis Ellis, employee of the Town and University club, and Alice Brasheers, employee of the Lenox Country club, pleaded guilty Saturday afternoon in justice court to charges of maintaining common nuisances, and were fined \$250 each by Justice of the Peace Harner. The cases were an outgrowth of a Wednesday night raid on three Klamath night clubs.

Complaints against James McRae, proprietor of the Town club, and other employees, as well as against Harry Renaud, proprietor of the Lenox club, were dismissed. A quantity of liquor was seized at each of the so-called clubs on Wednesday night, when Knox law enforcement officers and state police clamped down and charged illegal sale of liquor.

Murray Powers, employee of Lakeshore Inn, pleaded guilty to the nuisance charge Friday, and was fined \$250.

MIDWEST FOREST FIRES UNCHECKED

ST. PAUL, Aug. 15 (AP)—Work-worn fire fighters generally held the upper hand in their long battle against forest blazes today but at several points flames raged out of control.

A conflagration raced unchecked through the vicinity of McGrath, Minn. It swept over 7000 acres of countryside which Deputy State Forester A. E. O'Connell described as "desert-like" and without rain for months.

Farther north, another fire was reported out of hand near Skeybo. On scenic Isle Royale, 20 miles out in Lake Superior, four planes directed a force of 1800 men against flames that have ravaged more than 27,000 acres. But favorable progress was reported.

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
