NORTHWEST LUMBER PRODUCTION RISES

A 1935 lumber production increase for Oregon and Washington of 21 per cent above 1934 is indicated in preliminary data collected by the Pacific northwest forest experiment station in cooperation with the U. S. bureau of the census, the forest service announces this week. The cut of lumber for 1935 in the two states is shown to be 5,599,237,000 board feet as against 5,443,912,000 board feet cut in 1934. In 1932 the cut reached a depression low of 3,864,581,000 feet, it is pointed out.

Of lumber cut in 1935, Washington produced 3,459,951,000 board feet and Oregon 3,139,286,000, according to the experiment station report. Douglas fir led among species cut with a total of 4,670,621,000 board feet, of which Washington produced 2,717,490,000 feet and Oregon 1,953,131,000 feet. Ponderosa pine took second rank among species produced, with Oregon

cutting 1,024,017,000 feet and Washington 281,452,000.

Other species cut included western hemlock with a total of 249,115,000 feet, of which Washington accounted for 184,911,000; spruce, of which Washington cut 55,464,000 feet and Oregon 72,504,000; and cedar, of which Washington cut 89,737,000 feet and Oregon 12,941,000 feet.

Idaho white pine with a total cut of 81,285,000 feet, Port Orford cedar with 32,510,000 feet, sugar pine with 31,599,000 feet, white fir with 24,290,000 feet, larch with 17,842,000 feet, and hardwoods with 48,860,000 feet, are also among produced species listed.

Shingle production in 1935 amounted to 3,554,966 squares for Washington and 452,457 for Oregon. Lath production totaled 159,524,000 pieces for Washington and 116,756,000 pieces for Oregon.

The canvass showed that 1,122 lumber and shingle mills in the two states operated at least a portion of the year. Washington stands first and Oregon second among lumber producing states, the forest service points out.

STATE TELEPHONE BILL \$100,000

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 15 (UP)—The state's telephone bill is around \$100,000 a year, the board of control learned.

A survey of existing telephone facilities will be completed soon and may bring drastic economies. Approximately 1250 instruments are in use. Regular exchange service runs to \$4700 per month and the long distance bill to \$3400, State Treasurer Holman said.

"These figures show there must be considerable wastage," Holman said. "It is certainly possible to make a saving without hurting the service a bit."

Seven states had 100 or more airports and landing fields each on July 1, 1936: California, 193; Texas, 135; Pennsylvania, 113; Michigan, 114; Florida, 112; Ohio, 103; and New York, 100.

There were 2402 airports and landing fields in the United States as of July 1, 1936; of these, 701 were partially or fully lighted for night use.

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
