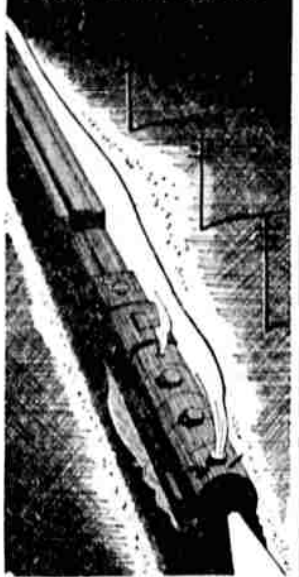

She was brought to Klamath Valley hospital for treatment, and was reported to be resting easily Monday afternoon, although she had lost much blood and suffered severe shock.

Joe Mathews was brought to Klamath Valley hospital for treatment about noon Sunday, after turning his motorcycle over three times just this side of Beatty.

He sustained an injured arm and shoulder, and severe lacerations of the left side of his head and about his body.

Goldie Miller of Cottage Grove and Marvin Hamilton of Klamath Falls received cuts, shock and bruises about 9:25 o'clock Sunday night, when their machine went off the road and overturned in a ditch five miles east of Keno on the Greensprings highway.

Mr. and Mrs. Frank Kirkland, also passengers in the car, were uninjured. The party was en route to Cottage Grove when the accident occurred.

According to reports of Lewis G. Johnson of the state police, who was the driver of one of the automobiles involved in the accident, Hamilton swung out to pass a machine driven by Frank G. Abel of Ashland. Hamilton failed to see the state police car ahead of Abel, and was unable to get back into the traffic lane.

Sung Hits Car
A falling snag from a tall tree on the Lake of the Woods road caused a unique accident late Sunday afternoon, when it crashed down on the top of a large sedan driven by W. R. Miller of this city.

There were seven passengers in the machine, none of whom was injured.

The snag, which was 16 inches in diameter, hit the top of the machine in the back, sliding across to the front, and denting the top to a depth of more than eight inches.

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REBEL SHIPS OPEN ATTACK ON 2 CITIES

with 20,000 government troops and militiamen trying to break a rebel blockade along the Portuguese frontier.

The government reported fierce fighting with bayonets, with no quarter shown on either side.

Reports that rebels, in taking Badajoz, had executed 1,500 government adherents spurred the government forces into a merciless drive to "completely exterminate" the rebels in the west, authorities at Madrid said.

Messages from Captain Bayo, chief of the government forces landing at Palma, Mallorca, said his men were in possession of the entire coast as far as Punta Amer.

(Reports reaching London stated rebels had trapped the Mallorca landing party, killing 500 and taking 250 prisoners.)

The shelling of Guadalupe subsided early in the afternoon, after a two-and-a-half-hour assault, and two persons who were wounded when a bomb fell on a farm at Fuenterabarra were the only known casualties.

Harried by communist clamor for a "Baby Russia," the Madrid government seized millions of dollars from church repositories. Authorities said more than 200,000,000 pesetas (nominally \$26,000,000) in currency, gold, jewels and negotiable securities were taken from a bank vault of the sisters of St. Vincent de Paul.

A third development in the drought situation was a report received at the agriculture department from Dr. C. W. Thornthwaite, former climatologist of the University of Oklahoma, who proposed that 55,000 families be moved from the western plains.

In a study of the whole strip of prairie land from the Canadian border to the Texas panhandle, Dr. Thornthwaite recommended that millions of acres in the wheat country be returned to sod.

SEX-MAD MANIAC SLAYS YOUNG GIRL

PUEBLO, Colo., Aug. 17 (AP)—A hatchet-killer was sought today in the second fatal bludgeoning here within two weeks.

The latest crime, Police Chief Arthur Grady said, was perpetrated by a "sex-mad maniac," who crept through an unlocked door and clabbled to death Dorothy Drain, 15, and beat her sister, Barbara, 12, into insensibility early yesterday.

Grady said the girls were bludgeoned about the head with a blunt hatchet. Mr. and Mrs. Riley Drain, the girls' parents, returned home at 3 a. m. from a dance and found the girls lying on a blood-soaked bed.

Dorothy apparently was killed almost instantly. Barbara was unconscious. Dorothy Drain, Grady said, was ravished before she was killed.

Although Governor Martin would not go into details on the matter, friends reported that leaders of this organization called on the governor in Olympia and promised him their support if he would give them a large sum of money. The offer was immediately turned down.

Governor Martin said it was interesting to note that the Voice of Action, communist newspaper, was bitterly opposed to him and at the same time was sponsoring the campaign of the King county commissioner. He was referring to Radio Speaker John C. Stevenson. He said that the commissioner had endorsed the commonwealth platform which was entirely communistic.

CLEVELAND, Aug. 17 (AP)—The Rev. Charles E. Coughlin rested in seclusion today after a sudden illness brought an abrupt halt to an address yesterday in which he renewed his attacks upon President Roosevelt, asserting that "those surrounding him had mesmerized his intellect."

A policeman on guard outside his room, Father Coughlin slept comfortably. He was stricken by what Dr. George P. O'Malley, Cleveland physician, described as exhaustion and a nervous disorder superinduced by the intense work of planning and carrying out the first convention of his national union for social justice.
