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No Comparison

IF it be possible to talk about the horse and buggy days without getting into a discussion of politics, it might be pointed out that most of us have a fairly cockeyed idea of what the horse and buggy era really was like.

Unless our memories are fairly long and accurate, we assume that the horse and buggy occupied much the same place that the automobile occupies today. We figure that it was the ordinary mode of conveyance for the ordinary family; that the average man was as used to viewing the open road over the jogging hams of Old Dobbin as he now is used to viewing it over the bright nickel of his radiator cap ornament.

A recent advertisement points out that this assumption is entirely false.

Today, this advertisement discloses, three out of four American families have automobiles. In 1900 not one urban family in 100 had a horse and buggy. The overwhelming majority of Americans who lived in the horse and buggy age, in other words, did their living without the aid of the horse and buggy.

THIS is a little point worth remembering. Arrival of the automobile age—symbolizing not merely the automobile, but all the other mechanical gadgets of the present—did not merely enable the average man to do in a new way what he had formerly done in a less efficient way; it enabled him to do things which previously he had not been able to do at all.

It completely altered his way of life and changed the whole complexion of his world. Today he can own his own means of transportation; in the horse and buggy age he could not. The fact that the automobile has it all over the horse as a means of getting from place to place is purely incidental.

And that, perhaps, is why we seem to be having such a hard time getting adjusted to this new age of inventions and mechanics. We are living in a new world. Human life is actually lived differently today than it was in our fathers' day.

CONSIDER, for instance, a day in the life of the housewife—in, say, a typical city such as Akron, O. She telephones her grocer and gets delivery of assorted fruits and vegetables which have come, literally, from the four corners of the earth.

Then, after putting them in her electric refrigerator, she gives the rugs a whirl with the vacuum cleaner, sends some clothes through the electric washing machine, reads an airmail letter written the day before by her sister in San Francisco, and goes up to the corner to get her hair set.

This finished, she gets in her car with a friend, drives 75 miles into the country to look at some antiques, stops at a movie on the way home, sees a newsreel of the rebellion in Spain, comes home and eats a dinner cooked by gas piped in from West Virginia, turns on the radio and listens to the president of the United States—and, finally, dons pajamas made of an unbelievable combination of sawdust and acid, and goes off to bed!

Her life differs from her grandmother's more than her grandmother's differed from the life of a woman in the days of Queen Elizabeth. Like all the rest of us, she is part of a dazzling and bewildering new world.

News of Oregon

BEND, Aug. 17 (AP)—Robert W. Sawyer, president of the Oregon Reclamation congress, said today the 26th annual meeting of irrigators will be held at Vale, Sept. 4-5, in observance of the completion of the Vale and Owyhee projects.

Sawyer said it was hoped that John C. Page, acting commissioner of the U. S. Reclamation bureau, would attend the meeting. Page is expected in the west in early September to inspect various federal projects. Invitations also have gone forward to Senators McNary and Steiwer and Representative Pierce.

ROSEBURG, Aug. 17 (AP)—John Alexander, 83, veteran postmaster and storekeeper at Glendale on the North Unquapa, became the oldest 4-H club leader in the United States this week. Alexander directs a vegetable gardening club.

EUGENE, Aug. 17 (AP)—The suggestion of the state highway commission that citizens of a village 20 miles northwest of here vote to determine whether the village is to be called Smithfield or Franklin was vetoed by County Judge Fred Fisk. He held there is no statute covering such an election.

The controversy arose when the highway commission placed signs at the village some time ago reading "Smithfield," the original name. Objections immediately arose on the grounds that Franklin, the name of the postoffice which formerly existed there, was the correct title. The suggestion of the highway commission was vetoed by the county judge. The Smith family held out for the other name.

PORTLAND, Aug. 17 (AP)—Oregon and southwestern Washington have a fight on their hands to secure cheap Bonneville power rates, W. D. Dodson, executive vice-president of the Portland chamber of commerce, said here upon his return from Washington.

Dodson expressed strong opposition to the regional planning commission report favoring a blanket rate for the entire Pacific northwest.

EUGENE, Aug. 17 (AP)—The University of Oregon loan fund, established 32 years ago by William M. Ladd, A. S. Roberts, and the class of 1904, has reached a total of \$68,692.14. J. O. Lindstrom, university business manager, reported. It showed an increase of almost \$5000 during the last year.

Lindstrom said 2,342 loans, totaling \$56,248.63, were made last year and that \$52,413.34 was paid in.

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 17 (AP)—Construction is going ahead rapidly on the Timberline hotel with 380 WPA men working and more being added.

This week work will begin on the roof of the west wing, which will contain ski-changing rooms and living accommodations ranging from de luxe down.

Construction of the entire building to be roofed before winter.

DELAKE, Aug. 17 (AP)—Postmaster R. J. Collins said between \$150 and \$175 was taken from the Ocean Lake postoffice by safecrackers.
