14,000 SERVE TIME IN OREGON PRISON

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 17 (AP)—An even 14,000 persons have served time in Oregon's penitentiary in 35 years.

The legislative act establishing a penitentiary for the territory of Oregon was passed in 1851. The prison was built in Portland, and was not moved to Salem until 1866.

First inmate in the penitentiary was a redskin known as Indian Charlie. He was sentenced to three years for larceny in Marion county. An old book containing the prison's first records doesn't show when Indian Charlie started his term. But he escaped on Dec. 3, 1852, and wasn't recaptured until May 5, 1859, the book revealed. Then Convict No. 1 escaped again June 16, 1862, and never

was heard of again. Whether his term was lengthened for his first escape is not known.

By a strange coincidence, Convict No. 14,000 is also from Marion county and also serving a term for larceny. He is Joseph Gigger, who started a six months' sentence Aug. 12.

Man to Appear on Morals Count

A. J. Krost, 62, was scheduled to appear in justice court Monday afternoon for arraignment on charges of contributing to the delinquency of a minor.

Krost is alleged to have molested a little girl while he was hired to do odd jobs around a local residence.

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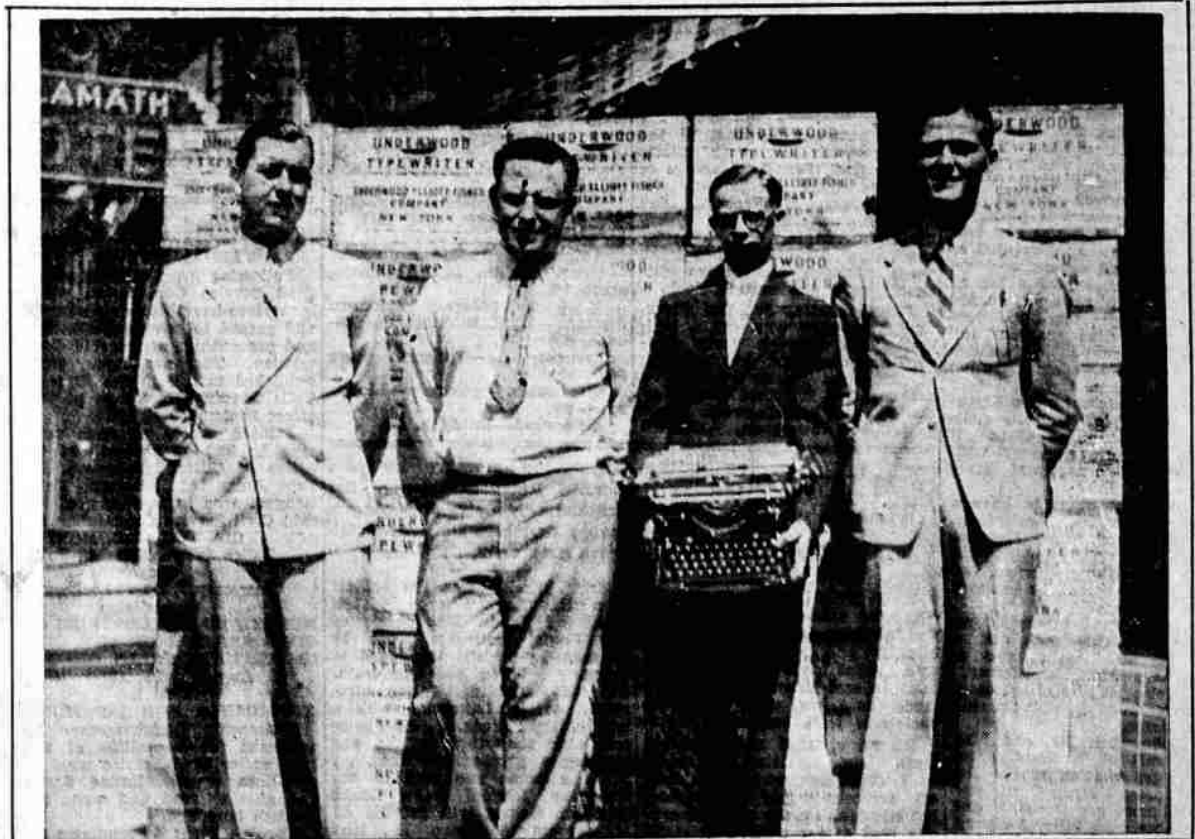


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
