

HUGHES PLANNING HOP AROUND WORLD

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LOS ANGELES, Aug. 14.—Howard Hughes, millionaire flier now in the east on a "technical trip" with his flying air laboratory, is planning a "round-the-world" flight in four hops, the United Press learned tonight.

The 30 year old former Oklahoma oil magnate, who holds the world record for land planes at 352 miles an hour and has consistently denied his intention of flying around the world, reportedly is preparing a Douglas transport plane for the flight.

The proposed flight will be made in non-stop jumps from New York to Moscow, from Moscow to a point in Siberia—probably Omsk; from there to northern Canada, and thence to New York, refueling at each stopping place.

Special tanks carrying a fuel load of 2200 gallons were installed in the plane at a hangar here, the location of which was not revealed. The gasoline load is twice the amount required to make a non-stop flight across the United States, and would be sufficient to exceed the present world non-stop record on each hop.

The airline distance of the proposed flight would be approximately 26,000 miles, in jumps of about 5000 miles each.

Passenger chairs have been ripped out of the plane to provide space for gasoline, and two new Pratt-Whitney motors, each powered at 1000 horsepower, have been installed. It was learned.

The plane has a cruising speed of about 200 miles an hour, consuming fuel at the rate of 80 gallons an hour and is expected to be able to travel between 5000 and 6000 miles on each leg. It is equipped with a powerful radio transmitter in addition to a receiving set. Hughes has applied to the Federal Radio Commission for permission to use the transmitter.

The source which disclosed the information on Hughes' projected flight was unable to say whether the flier plans to make the trip alone, or will be accompanied by a co-pilot. A three way control system has been installed in the plane.

WRECKING METRIC MILE RECORD



Glenn Cunningham is shown in this radiophoto breaking the world 1500-meter record for the second time in two years and still finishing second as Jack Lovelock maintains Great Britain's supremacy in the metric mile of the Olympic Games. Lovelock traversed the distance in the phenomenal time of 3 minutes and 47.8 seconds, a full second faster than the old mark established by Bill Bonthonron in Milwaukee, June 30, 1934. Cunningham's time was 3:48.4. Luigi Beccali of Italy, Archie San Romani, and Phil Edwards, Canadian Negro, trailed Cunningham in the order named. All five bettered the Olympic record of 3:51.2 set by Beccali in 1932.

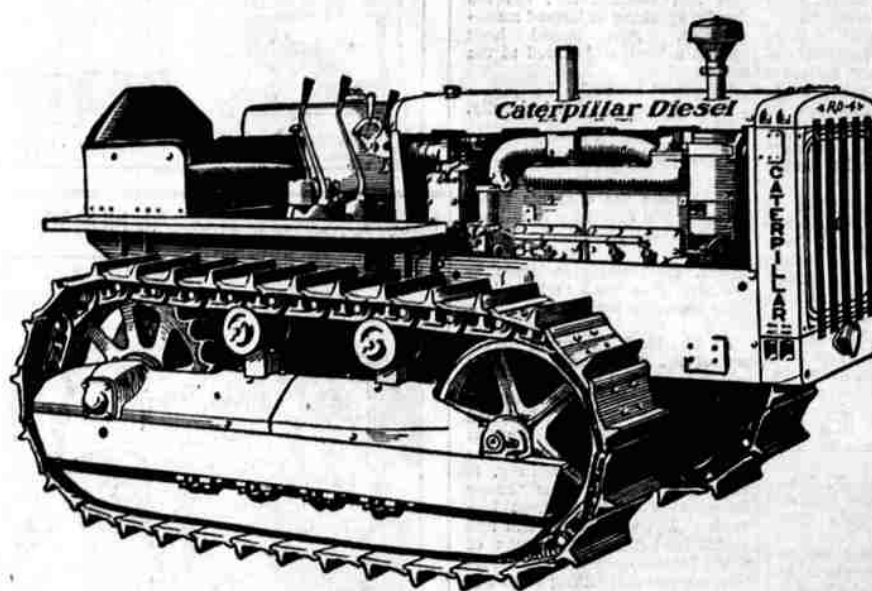
