Oregon Crops Improve

MARKED GAINS BY OATS REPORTED

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 17 (AP) Five out of seven selected Oregon crops showed a better general condition Aug. 1 this year as compared with the corresponding period a year ago and the two others were only slightly behind the 1935 mark, the U. S. department of agriculture said today.

Oats showed the most marked gain, the Aug. 1 report indicating a crop 93 per cent normal compared with 69 per cent a year ago. Others improved were spring wheat, tame hay, potatoes and apples.

Pears and prunes were estimated as slightly below last year's figures.

The seven crops, their 1935 state-wide percentage of normal estimates as of Aug. 1 and the 1936 condition for the same date were:

Spring wheat, 68, 84; oats, 69, 93; tame hay 77, 94; potatoes, 75, 89; apples, 69, 75; pears, 75, 72; prunes 67, 65.

Only district 8, consisting of nine central and southeastern counties, reported estimates exceeding last year's for all seven crops.

The report by districts, with the 1935 estimate and the 1936 crop condition in that order included:

District 8 (Crook, Deschutes, Grant, Harney, Jefferson, Klamath, Lake, Malheur and Wheeler counties): spring wheat, 81, 92; oats, 86, 91; tame hay, 83, 94; potatoes, 81, 87; apples, 63, 65; pears, 52, 75; prunes, 48, 62.
