South, and General Emilio Mola, the northern leader, made possible by the capture of Badajoz, was hailed by the rebels as an accomplishment making "victory certain; only a question of time."

Guns Silenced

Meanwhile, in the north, salvoes of 6 inch shells from the rebel cruiser Almirante Cervera silenced the guns of the government fortress of Guadalupe near San Sebastian and Irun.

The warship Almirante Cervera and Espina began shelling the government stronghold at 9 a. m., displaying far more accuracy than did the Espina in yesterday's assault.

The ships were believed to have scored several direct hits in the first hour of fighting. The fort replied twice but failed to find the target.

In retaliation for the vicious shelling, two government bombing planes from San Sebastian blasted rebel troops' positions in the hills northeast of Enderlaza. In a land attack on San Sebastian and Irun, the rebels tried a new advance over the hills from the direction of Enderlaza in the face of heavy machine gun fire and air attack.

French activities sympathetic to the Madrid government are receiving bitterly sarcastic comment in the Italian press.

The first encounter between Italian and French planes in the service of the Spanish combatants was believed to have taken place already between a fast 8-81 Italian bomber and two French pursuit planes near the Straits of Gibraltar.

BERLIN, Aug. 18 (AP)—Germany is ready, it was announced officially today, not only to place an embargo on arms, airplanes and warships to Spain but to prevent volunteers from participating in the civil war.

The Hitler government, however, stipulated the fulfillment of two conditions before making effective the arms-airplane embargo suggested by France.

A German transport plane confiscated by the Madrid government must be released; "All states which possessed considerable industries for the manufacture of arms and airplanes must likewise bind themselves, and in particular private persons and private firms, to come under the embargo."

HENDAYE, France, Aug. 18 (AP)—France hastily set up a rigid border patrol today, as dawn brought renewal of the Spanish rebel attack on San Sebastian and Irun.

Worried by the fighting just across the Bay of Biscay, French gendarmes and mobile guards set up field telephones with direct communication to Paris.

HOYE PARK, Aug. 18 (AP)—Critical conditions in war torn Spain and Europe were disclosed authoritatively today to have prompted President Roosevelt to put a check on any plans that would call for his being far from Washington for any extended period.

Nevertheless any thought of a lengthy trip, political or otherwise, is out of the picture because the chief executive feels he should not be too far away from his Washington base for very long at a time. That thought does not apply, however, to his forthcoming trip through drought stricken states starting a week from tonight.

They agreed his majesty had put one over on New York's masters of jiggers and shakers. "A fellow who takes that one doesn't want a drink—he wants to go to sleep," remarked Joe Hollis with a pensive look and a shake of his head.

"Boy and man I've been mixing drinks for 30 years, but that's a new one on me," he added. "I've never heard of that concoction or anything like it."

"Sounds like a hot one," clipped Al Smith, (not the former governor) who serves what'll-you-have-at-an-exclusive hotel.

What the king served on his yacht in the Dalmatian region of Yugoslavia was an approximation of this:

Discount Moved Up

The present night long distance discount, beginning at 8:30 p. m. is moved forward to 7 p. m. and the present midnight discount for station to station calls is eliminated.

Still another feature will apply the night discount rates to weekend calls during the daylight hours of Sunday, with the result that all long-distance calls between 7 p. m. Saturday and 4:30 a. m. Monday will carry the reduced night rate.

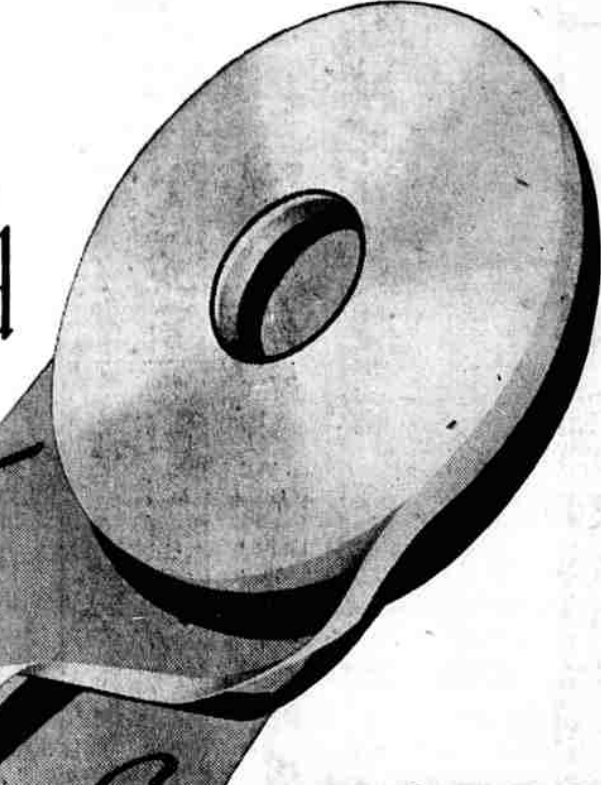
