

CITY TO BUY PROPERTY FOR ROAD CHANGE

Final action to eliminate the dangerous curve on The Dalles-California highway at Oregon avenue and Upham streets was taken Monday night when the finance committee of the city council was given power to enter into a contract with the Immanuel Baptist church for purchase of the property.

The property has been appraised at \$750, and the original understanding held by the council was that the difference in that price, and the amount of city taxes and liens should be paid.

Haste Urged
The finance committee, however, has been given authority to transact the deal, and haste was urged in order that the state highway commission may start work on re-routing the road to eliminate the S-curve which has caused many accidents. The commission agreed to do the labor if the city purchased the property.

Matter of worn out bridges over the government canal in the city was brought up by City Engineer E. A. Thomas, who reported that they were in bad condition, and too rotten for further mending and patching.

There are four of these bridges, on Lincoln street, Washington street, Esplanade and on the Old Fort road.

Bond Issue Possible
Possibility of obtaining a grant from the government for a portion of the cost was discussed, and the matter was referred to the council as a whole for further consideration.

It is possible that the matter will be put to a vote of the people for a bond issue to conduct the work.

Trees whose branches overhang city sidewalks and extend out into the street came up for discussion, and the city engineer was authorized to make a survey of the matter.

Traffic Survey Sought
The city engineer was also instructed to contact the state highway commission with a view to having an official traffic survey carried on in Klamath Falls.

These surveys are being carried on in other Oregon cities at the present time, it is reported.

A letter from the executive secretary of the Shasta Cascade Wonderland association thanking the council for its recent resolutions relative to a celebration of the completion of the Klamath Falls-Weed highway to be held in conjunction with the association's convention here in October was read and placed on file.

Mayor Presides
The executive asked that copies of the resolutions be forwarded to all members of the board of directors of the organization.

Building permits and license applications approved by the proper authorities were allowed by the council, which adjourned at 8:00 o'clock to attend the lecture given by Dr. Ralph Shaduck, Oregon state area manager for Townsend clubs.

Mayor W. E. Mahoney presided at the brief meeting.

Japan Not Interested In Philippines Nor Treaties, International Group Told

YOSEMITE, Calif., Aug. 18 (U.P.)—Japanese delegates to the sixth institute of Pacific Relations said Monday they were so little interested in the Philippines that they were surprised anyone wanted to discuss the question of the Philippines.

They announced also that they were not interested in treaties or pacts with other nations as they are capable of defending themselves.

New Deal Criticized
Policies of the present administration of the United States were discussed and sharply criticized by nearly all delegates.

Consideration of problems created by recovery plans of this country continued through tonight's session and tomorrow the delegates will turn their attention to Japan, which country will be the object of searching inquiry for three days. It is expected that the discussion of the relations between Japan and China will result in heated variance of opinion.

Practically all phases of the recovery plans in the United States were censured by delegates to the institute but this country's silver purchase policy was condemned roundly as having brought serious economic loss to many countries of the Pacific

and to have been of little benefit to the United States.

AAA Rapped
Chinese delegates charged that under the Roosevelt administration the policy of the United States in the Far East had been relaxed to the disadvantage of China.

The agricultural policy of the United States, as carried out under the agricultural adjustment administration, generally was felt to have failed. Price advances which were expected were not realized, delegates reported, and the program had cost the United States some of her markets. These losses were viewed as being permanent.

French Leader Flays War
Defense forces and armaments of the United States on its Pacific coast and the islands were discussed lengthily. Japanese delegates expressed themselves as being convinced that there was no possibility of war between the United States and Japan.

A less optimistic view concerning relations of nations on the Pacific was taken by Albert Sarraut, twice premier and 19 times a cabinet member of France. "For many years I have feared a great war in the Pacific," he said. He refused to predict when this war would break. "That is the secret of tomorrow," he said.

News of Oregon

MEDFORD, Aug. 18 (AP)—A bi-motored army Martin bomber, en route from Tacoma to Hamilton Field, California, lost its left side landing assembly at Medford airport without injury to any of its occupants.

The plane was piloted by Cadet T. E. Sandegren and had Cadet J. M. Reynolds and two privates aboard.

The accident occurred when the plane, coming in against the wind, bounced in landing.

BONNEVILLE, Aug. 18 (AP)—Crews are all set for construction of the north half of the spillway dam here with the area inside the north cofferdam practically dried out and the giant Monaghan already at work excavating.

Only a skid sticking up from the mud can now be seen of the whirly crane which toppled into the river May 15 when the current undercut its base. It is believed that the crane can easily be recovered since all the machinery and precision parts were removed before the accident.

BAKER, Aug. 18 (AP)—The Baker county republican central committee, at a dinner meeting in the Hotel Baker Monday evening, passed a resolution adopting the state groups plan of organization for the 1936 campaign, which was explained by Walter Toose of Portland, assistant to State Chairman Arthur Prialux.

PORTLAND, Aug. 18 (AP)—R. C. Flanders, secretary of the tax supervising and conservation committee of Multnomah county, said the commission, recently stripped of power by a state supreme court decision, would continue to function for the assistance of other budget-making bodies in the county.

The court decision removed incorporated cities and towns from the jurisdiction of the commission but it was reported that the county, the school board and the Port of Portland commission would probably pass their budgets to the commission September 1 as usual. The supervising body will have the power only to advise, however.

OREGON CITY, Aug. 18 (AP)—Miss Mildred Oliver of Canby, sponsored by the local papermill unions, will reign over the Ter-

ritorial days' celebration Friday and Saturday.

Miss Oliver won out in a contest with six other girls.

OREGON CITY, Aug. 18 (AP)—Herman H. Chindgren, president of the Clackamas county fair board, reported a record number of requests for premium books and entry blanks and a heavy demand for commercial space concession rights for this year's fair at Canby, September 2 to 4.

One exhibitor said he would show a full carload of sheep and hogs.

PORTLAND, Aug. 18 (AP)—The good old cry of "tally-ho, tally-ho" didn't but might well have resounded from the police radio here Monday when prowler No. 12 was sent to search for a fox reported running loose. No sign was found of it.

GRANTS PASS, Aug. 18 (AP)—Federal services will be held in Merlin today for Frederick Albert Davis, 15, son of Mr. and Mrs. Albert Davis, who drowned Sunday afternoon in the north fork of the Santiam river, 22 miles from Albany.

BURNS, Aug. 18 (AP)—Joseph Whitteberg, Harper rancher, was killed when a blowout overturned his car on the Central Oregon highway about five miles east of the Gap ranch.

Several others in the car received serious injuries. William Purvis, Vale, suffered a fractured rib and possible internal injuries; Earl Graham, Vale, a crushed hand and Mrs. Whitteberg and a small daughter, cuts and bruises.

They received medical attention at a CCC camp first aid station.

WALDPORT, Aug. 18 (AP)—A hit-run driver claimed another victim when Tom Morgan, 50, was killed outright on the Aisea highway. His body remained on the road and was struck by another car before being found. Morgan was a member of the forest service.

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U. S. AGENTS TRACE PATHS OF CRIMINALS

WASHINGTON, Aug. 18 (AP)—The federal bureau of investigation disclosed today its agents still are tracking down the activities of four notorious criminals even though death and prison doors have closed the government's case against them.

J. Edgar Hoover, director of the bureau, said the government had yet to finish its investigations in the careers of Thomas Henry Robinson, Jr., and Alvin Karpis, convicted kidnapers, and also of Harry Campbell, member of Karpis' gang, and Raymond Hamilton, an associate of Clyde Barrow.

"These cases are still open," he said.

The justice department is unwilling to consider those cases closed, Hoover continued, until all persons who knowingly harbored any of the four have been brought to trial.

"Already there have been some convictions," Hoover said, "and we are working toward others." Hoover made the announcement while discussing with newspapermen the qualities of a new gun of tremendous power which now is being tested by the justice department.

This weapon, which one official said was capable of "stopping anything," is being subjected to experimentation to determine whether it shall become a part of the standard equipment of Hoover's "G-men."

Weighing from 44 to 49 ounces, this weapon is said to inflict a terrible wound, the impact of a bullet carrying a force of 802 pounds. This is more than twice the "shocking power" of the regular automatic.

The department announced the gun, a product of an American manufacturer, already had been placed on the market and thus had become available to criminals in states which do not license the sale of firearms. Officials expressed a hope that the cost, about double that of the ordinary revolver, would discourage sale to the lawless.

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THREE-C LEADERS PLAN CONFERENCE

MERRILL, Aug. 18—Wednesday, August 26, has been set as the date for a Klamath zone conference of CCC officers, educational advisors and assistant educational advisors, the latter camp enrollees. The conference is to be held at Diamond Lake.

An effort is being made by those directing camp activities to establish a definite program of extra curricular activities by October 1. The suggested program is to include instruction in vocational, avocational and physical education.

Enlisted men are to be instructed in blacksmithing, painting and other vocational arts in order to be able to enter some worthwhile work at the end of their enlistment in the civilian conservation corps.

In preparation for the course a new blacksmith shop is being built and equipment installed at Camp Klamath. Material is being furnished by the bureau of reclamation.

In the avocational classes, book binding, leather tooling and copper plating are among the numerous subjects to be offered. The entire personnel at Camp Klamath is at present occupied with fire control in the Mt. Stukel district.

**NEW JUDGING RING
BEING CONSTRUCTED**
