properly in Spain might soon prove more important than the question of who is holding Madrid.

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PARIS, Aug. 19.—France will abandon her present position of non-intervention in the Spanish civil war, officials asserted today, if Italy undertakes to aid openly the fascist rebellion against the Madrid socialist government.

"If Premier Mussolini envisages sending arms and munitions to Spain," one official stated, "certainly the position of France must change immediately."

The French people's front government, sponsor of the proposal to band together European powers in a pledge to aid neither faction in the civil war, has been under constant pressure from leftists to send aid to the Spanish socialists.

MADRID, Aug. 19.—High government sources said today any foreign aid given to the fascist rebels would be considered a violation of international law and would provide the government with a prima facie case for submission to the league of nations.

These sources insisted on the loyalists' right to aid from foreign powers in the civil war, but declined to confirm that French assistance was being received.

The government pushed its battle against fascist rebels with an army of Asturian miners, hurled against the northern city of Oviedo.

His colleagues, including Leon Kamenoff, also a one-time communist leader ousted by Stalin, followed, although T. Smirnov and E. Holmann, two of the lesser defendants, pleaded guilty with reservations and said they were not involved in the actual attempt to kill the leaders.

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American Girl Chief Spy For Smuggling Ring

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 18 (U.P.)—An "attractive and sophisticated" American girl whose name was not made public tonight was disclosed as the chief spy in a reputed \$1,000,000 international smuggling ring.

Federal narcotics agents said the girl, object of a nation-wide search, was an accomplice of 23-year-old Maria Wendt, Eurasian arrested last Sunday in New York. They said the American girl helped Maria Wendt escape when she first was picked up in Los Angeles two weeks ago.

Identify Well Known

The American girl was described as the "eye" in the smuggling syndicate that federal men believed one of the most powerful in the world.

Narcotics investigators said the girl's identity was "well known to customs men." She was trailed by agents after it was known she was assigned to transfer \$100,000 worth of narcotics to Miss Wendt.

LAMAR, Colo., Aug. 19 (AP)—The president's "drought busting" move northward through Colorado and Kansas today with dust and rain behind them, but questions still to harass them.

DRY PERIOD REMOTE

WASHINGTON, Aug. 19 (AP)—Amid government moves to aid a mounting total of drought-ravaged farmers, the Smithsonian institution today held out a hope that another major dry period may not strike the north-central grazing area until 1950.

Records from analysis of water level records for the Great Lakes, since 1877, the Smithsonian concluded that the drought area now "is near the bottom of what appears to be a 46-year precipitation cycle in some way associated with cyclic variations in the radiation output of the sun."

Dr. Charles G. Abbott, Smithsonian secretary, declared that his cycle hypothesis, announced three years ago, "gives no support to pessimists who predict that the great drought area will be converted into a permanent desert."
