FOR FLOWER SHOW

MERRILL, August 19.—Final plans were completed Monday by committees working on the valley horticultural show which is to be held Sunday afternoon, August 23 from 2 to 6 in the Merrill high school gymnasium.

Cash prizes donated by merchants of Merrill and Tulelake will be awarded winners of the various entries and a sweepstakes and grand prize are also offered. Names of the donors of the prize money will be published following the exhibit.

The Merrill Lost River Garden club and the Tulelake Garden club are sponsoring booths to exhibit community produce and flowers. Fruit, vegetables, grains, grasses and flowers shown in the booths will not be eligible for prizes.

A great deal of enthusiasm is evident in all parts of the valley according to those in charge of arrangements and entries are expected from all parts of Klamath county and from Blakely county. Everyone is invited to enter exhibits in any or all of the classes, and place of residence is no bar.

Mrs. Hugh O'Connor, general chairman of the show, and members of assisting committees have announced the following prize list:

WASHINGTON, Aug. 19 (AP)—Experts "guessed" today that it won't be long before the housewife lays out from \$11 to \$12 for the same basket of food she now buys for a ten dollar bill.

Government and private experts, admitting that exact estimates are impossible, nevertheless forecast upward revision of the family grocery budgets.

They explained that when the scorching sun shriveled crops in recent months the dollar's food purchasing power went into a dive. It already has affected milk, butter and eggs in some places, and eventually will reach meats, they said.

DORE REBUFFED IN P. I. DIFFICULTY

SEATTLE, Aug. 19 (AP)—Mayor John F. Dore "washed his hands" today of the Post-Intelligencer newspaper strike after the newspaper turned down his proposal for a conference or arbitration which the Seattle chapter of the American Newspaper Guild accepted.

"I'm washing my hands of the business," said the mayor. "I don't care now if the P-I never publishes, and I think it would be a good thing for the town if it didn't."

The mayor gave out the statement when he had read a letter from W. Vaughn Tanner, resident publisher of the Hearst-owned Post-Intelligencer, refusing the offer and telling Dore his first efforts should be directed toward maintaining "law and order."

Tanner's letter stated the legality of the discharge of the photographer and drama editor had been taken to the national labor relations board by the employees concerned, and there was nothing about this to discuss.

"The only other question in-

volved is that of the maintenance of law and order, and I do not see anything to discuss about that," said Tanner's letter.

Charging violence forced the Post-Intelligencer to suspend publication, Tanner said the mayor's first duty was to "maintain law and order."
