

KLAMATH 4-H CLUBBERS TO ATTEND FAIR

This week is a busy one for Klamath county 4-H club members, as many of them are getting their project exhibits ready for entry at the Golden Jubilee state fair, to be held in Salem the week of September 7 to 13.

At the Klamath county 4-H spring fair, held last May, boys and girls who made exhibits which placed in the top five or six places were asked to send their exhibits to the state fair so they might have an opportunity to compare the quality of their work with that of boys and girls in other counties of the state.

As only the better exhibits from the various counties get to the state fair, it is expected that competition will be very keen. In order to meet this competition many of these club folks have done additional work on their projects since the spring fair in May and this week 4-Hers will be putting the finishing touches on their exhibits, thus "Making Their Best Better," which is the motto of 4-H club work.

Already several entries have been received and those who have not already gotten them in are urged to get them to the county club agent's office this week so a complete entry list may be sent to the state fair management as soon as possible.

AUTO DEALERS TO MEET ON FRIDAY

A meeting to discuss conditions prevailing in this section among automobile dealers and to consider methods of improving the services which automobile dealers render the public, will be held at 8:00 o'clock Friday night at the Willard hotel, under the auspices of the Oregon Automobile Dealers' association.

J. L. Miller, official representative of the National Automobile Dealers' association, will conduct the meeting, which is one of a series arranged throughout this state. He will discuss the problems that have developed in the automotive industry in recent years, and particularly, those that are the result of mass selling and the handling of used cars.

He will outline a selling procedure designed to meet the needs that exist today in automobile selling, and which has proved its value in other sections through building greater confidence between dealers and the public whom they serve. As the recognized leaders in the movement towards business recovery, the efforts of automobile dealers have resulted in the re-employment of thousands of workers during the past two years. One out of six workers is now employed directly or indirectly in the automotive and allied industries, it is estimated.

SERUM CAN CURE HORSE DISEASE

SALEM, Ore.—The California horse disease which has been attacking many horses in the southeastern portion of the state can be cured by the use of serum, Dr. E. R. Derflinger, state veterinarian, said.

Dr. Derflinger has been in Burns, treating the sickened horses in that section and reports satisfactory results. The results are "quite satisfactory" when the horse is treated early from well-kept serum, he said.

"Serum is not always available to treat the new cases of sick horses that are reported at intervals. Dealers in that section should bring in a supply of serum to be available as needed. It must be kept refrigerated to insure its potency," he warned.

When the sick animals are given proper care, kept in the shade and given the right nourishment, most of them are cured, he said.

Six sick horses were reported from Diamond as the most recent out-cropping of the disease.

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MILL OWNERS GET HEARING ON THURSDAY

Kenneth Murdoch and Jess Gilkey, timber and mill appraisers for the Oregon tax commission, and Charles Galloway, chairman of the commission, were expected to arrive in Klamath Falls Wednesday night or early Thursday morning to meet with county mill operators and the board of equalization, according to an announcement from Charles Mack, assessor.

The meeting is scheduled to open at 9:00 a. m. in the county court room, according to the assessor, and will probably be the most important of the equalization board's sessions, since the re-appraisal has called forth much opposition on the part of operators. The re-appraisal was conducted this spring by Gilkey and Murdoch, and was the first change in mill assessments in the past six years, according to Mack. The re-appraisal resulted in increase in tax assessments for virtually all mills in the

county. It is expected that about 20 operators will attend the meeting.

Jewish Evangelist to Speak Tonight

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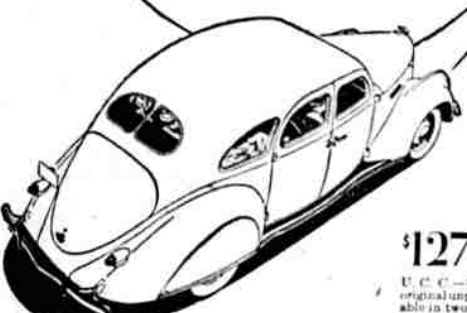
