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loyalty anew to the party in order to use the same weapons Trotsky was employing, but in a different manner.

Zinovieff appeared particularly incensed by the accusation of another defendant yesterday that he was a "liar."

"Yes," he said, "I lied over since the struggle against the government started."

"It was necessary to lie."

"But now I am determined to tell the whole truth."

"I have not the illusions of my grave past as to the court's reactions to my words."

"I can corroborate my past in nothing but words, but I shall speak the truth."

"Ivan Smirnov (the defendant who called Zinovieff a liar) is still lying and concealing the truth."

"Trotsky's role in the counter-revolution was greater than mine, although mine was great enough."

"I am guiltier than Trotsky because I was here doing the actual work."

Ably, Zinovieff confessed he and Leon Kamenoff had "fallen so deep into the abyss of counter-revolution" that at one time they could not determine whether the program advanced by the conspirators was left or right, what form of right it was or what it was.

Kamenoff spoke in a conversational tone, but Zinovieff showing a loud speaker aside, shouted across a 40-foot expanse of courtroom, almost ignoring the judge and prosecutor.

He presented the harried look of a man deeply troubled while blue-capped red army soldiers, changing guard every half hour, provided the only interruption to his words.

A strong feeling between the principals in the plot was disclosed when Zinovieff declared the depths of his degradation were reached when he wrote a newspaper editorial condemning the assassin of Sergei M. Kiroff, Stalin's chief aide, whom he had directed.

"Kamenoff planned the same thing," he added.

Kamenoff interrupted heatedly: "I did not! I had no intention of writing an article!"

Zinovieff, shaking his head sadly, continued: "I admit now I was the one with the greatest guilt in Kiroff's death."

Earlier, T. Relingold, during

the testimony of Kamenoff, jumped up and faced the witness, shaking his fist, Relingold screamed:

"You are responsible for the death of Kiroff (A. Bogden, Zinovieff's secretary)."

Kamenoff, who had been on the stand all day calmly denied the accusation and said he was not a party to a reported conspiracy to murder men named to actually carry out the assassinations of Stalin and others.

Kamenoff admitted that a bloodthirsty lust for personal power motivated the conspirators.

He denied he wanted to overthrow the government because it was successfully building socialism.

"Naturally," he added, "political groups deprived of power feel their policies are superior."

"Were you a bloodthirsty enemy of the government?" asked Prosecutor Andrew Vishinsky.

"Yes, I was," Kamenoff replied.

"We faced in 1932 two alternatives," he said. "Because of the success of the government we knew we had failed. We could capitulate, throw in the sponge and conform to Stalin. Or we could conspire for terrorism, as a desperate effort to regain power."

"We decided on the second alternative."

Navalmar de la Mata was reported in flames with rebels in heading flight before victorious government troops.

Kelley Robinsonette, a member of the teaching corps for the elementary schools, who returns this fall after a year's leave of absence, was appointed to take Erdman's place.

Florence Ollman, heretofore principal of the Joseph Conger school, will be transferred to the principalship of Fairview school to replace Elita Farr Canning, whose resignation was read Wednesday evening. Mrs. Canning is moving to Bly to reside.

Vern Spiers, who has been teaching in the grades, has been promoted to the principalship of Conger school.

Miss Barbara Powers was granted a year's leave of absence Wednesday evening.

Other teachers elected to fill vacancies for the coming school year include: William Francis Lewis, Miss Lida Hanna, Miss Vera Wright, Mrs. Mayme Johnson, Miss Katherine Engebretsen, Miss Elizabeth Jungch and Mrs. Aubra Griffith, who will be employed for half-time work.

DRIVER HELD ON U TURN CHARGES

**JOB INSURANCE
LAW GETS TEST**

MEDFORD, Aug. 20 (AP)—The first test of Oregon's unemployment compensation law went before the courts here today in the form of a complaint filed by five fruit packing plants and one grower on constitutional grounds.

Asking a declaratory judgment to free them from contributions to the state unemployment fund, the packers and growers charged that the workers affected in their industry are transient and reside in the state only during the fruit harvesting season.

The contention was made that both federal and Oregon constitutions were violated through disregard of the law governing limitation of the powers of the states, the rights of individuals to contract and the uniformity of taxation.

Asserting that the law delegates to the state unemployment commission, administrator of the act, the power to create and collect taxes, the suit classed the law as "discriminatory and class legislation."

The packers presented a further argument that their labor is agricultural and therefore exempt.

The suit seeks a restraining order to prevent the commission from collecting assessments pending final determination of the action. About 1600 workers, employed here from August to November, are affected.
