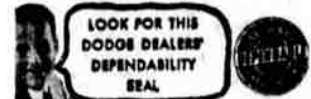
Settled in New Home—Mr. and Mrs. Joe Evans are at home to their friends in their new residence in the Enterprise tract where they moved recently.
