

USDA Sees Higher Potato Prices

PROSPECT FOR OREGON SPUD GROWERS GOOD

PORTLAND, Aug. 21 (AP)—Prices averaging "much higher" than for any season since 1925-26 are in prospect for Oregon potato growers, the U. S. department of agriculture said today.

The deterioration of the late crop in July, the improvement of demand and prospect, of a crop as well as those of 1925 and 1929 combined to offer unusual price opportunities, the department said.

A recent forecast of the department put the Oregon production at 5,880,000 bushels, compared to 5,670,000 bushels in 1935 and a five-year average of 5,054,000 bushels.

The United States farm price of 70 cents in the 1935-36 season is expected to be doubled this year, and may go three times above the 47-cent average of 1934-35. On July 15, the average farm price of potatoes was \$1.41 a bushel, compared to \$1.37 in June and 52 cents a year ago.

Stock Market Quotations

NEW YORK, Aug. 21 (AP)—A European war scare hit the stock market today and prices of numerous leaders topped one to six or more points.

Mild support was accorded a few issues in late dealing, but the majority closed weak around their lows of the day. Transfers approximated 1,500,000 shares.

After the last morning slump, which lasted only a few minutes, the volume dwindled appreciably. It picked up again near the finish.

At the height of the forenoon downfall, the ticker fell a bit behind transactions on the floor of the exchange. It was again in arrears in the final half hour.

Commission houses with foreign connections stated that little or no liquidation was in evidence from foreign sources.

A few aircraft displayed early strength, but the principal ones relapsed in the subsequent proceedings.

Pirelli Co. of Italy (American shares), traded infrequently, jumped nine points on a few transfers.

Among the prominent losers were Allied Chemical, Westinghouse, Du Pont, U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, Youngstown Sheet and Tube, General Motors, Chrysler, Sears Roebuck, Douglas Aircraft, Boeing, J. I. Case, International Harvester, Deere, American Telephone, Western Union, Consolidated Edison, Anaconda, Kennecott, Santa Fe, New York Central, Pennsylvania, Southern Pacific, Delaware & Hudson and Johns Manville.

Other stocks to subside included Union Carbide, Illinois Central, Philip Morris, Union Pacific, Columbia Carbon, Woolworth, Commercial Investment Trust, Radio, Crown Cork, American Chain and Bendis.

WHEAT PRICES GO FORWARD FRIDAY

CHICAGO, Aug. 21 (AP)—Un-easiness over disturbing political developments in Europe tended to lift wheat prices today, especially in the late dealings.

Commission houses and pit traders were the principal buyers of wheat futures. Considerable notice was taken of unfavorable moisture conditions for domestic winter wheat seeding.

After a maximum advance of 14 cents, wheat reacted, closing nervous at the same as yesterday's finish to 1 cent higher. Sept. \$1.12 1/4, Dec. \$1.12 1/2-1/4. Corn 1 cent to 2 cents down, Sept. \$1.12 1/2, Dec. 97 1/2. Oats 1 1/4 off, and provisions at 7 to 15 cents decline.

PORTLAND, Aug. 21 (AP)—After starting weak the market for wheat futures recovered and locally was 4c higher for May in the final today. Even the sale of 5000 bushels of May failed to check the advance. There was no change in cash wheat.

Revenue Freight Loadings Advance

WASHINGTON, Aug. 21 (AP)—The Association of American railroads reported today loadings of revenue freight for the week ending last Saturday totaled 736,497, cars.

This was an increase of \$204 cars, or 1.1 per cent, compared with the preceding week; an increase of 132,492, or 19.9 per cent, compared with a year ago, and an increase of 134,709, or 22.4 per cent, compared with two years ago.

DEMAND FOR WOOL CONTINUES FAIR

BOSTON, Aug. 21 (AP)—The Commercial Bulletin will say tomorrow: "Demand for wool continues fair for three-eighths and finer combing wools and moderate for woolen wools, with prices very firm throughout, showing a recovery of a half cent to a cent in the grease during the past fortnight."

"The piece goods end of the market is also better, but still meeting price resistance, which is passed on to spinners and combers."

"Foreign markets are generally steady. The political situation in continental Europe is interfering to some extent with English textile exports."

"In the west is less pronounced this week with prices fully up to Boston parity."

PRODUCTION DOWN IN PINE INDUSTRY

PORTLAND, Aug. 21 (AP)—A sharp increase in new business but a falling off in production appeared in the western pine industry in the past week, a weekly review of the Western Pine association showed today.

While orders leaped ahead to 75,242,000 board feet against 67,647,000 a week ago and 41,626,000 for the same week a year ago, production slumped to 76,851,000 feet against 76,997,000 a week ago and 72,312,000 for the same week a year ago. It was the first decline in production in some weeks.

Shipments held level with the previous week, totaling 61,479,000 board feet in the past week, or an increase of 270,000 feet over the preceding week and up 7,600,000 feet from the same week a year ago.

On a year-to-date comparison, orders for 1936 totaled 1,830,166,000 board feet against 1,529,983,000 in 1935, shipments, 1,754,956,000 feet against 1,433,699,000, and production 1,781,723,000 against 1,415,052,000.

Wool Bulletin

BOSTON, Aug. 21 (AP)—USDA Prices were firmly advanced buyers on fine territory wools. Inquiries were quite numerous, and many bids within recent selling ranges were being turned down.

Average to good French combing fine territory wools in original bags were quoted mostly at around \$5c, secured basis, which was the high side of the selling range early in the week. Original lots of bulk good French combing and staple lengths realized fully 87c to 88c.
