

# Champion Steele Wallops Aldare at Tacoma

## K. O. WINS IN SECOND ROUND

### Haymaker Splits Glove of Titlist From Tip to Wrist.

TACOMA, Wash., Aug. 21 (AP)—Using a blow that split his glove from fingertip to wrist, Freddie Steele, world's middleweight champion, won his first battle as a champion here last night.

Aldare was a beaten fighter from the moment he stepped into the ring. Less than 30 seconds later, he was on the floor for a nine count after taking a series of hard lefts and rights to the body. He managed to hang on the rest of the round, making Freddie miss a pair of right uppercuts to the face and getting in an effective blow or two himself.

In the second, he showed a momentary aggressive streak, covered quickly when Steele drove into his body again, then flopped to the canvas a second time from a long swinging right. He rose to his knee once, at the count of eight, looked around and sank back to be counted out. The blow split Steele's right glove.

The fight, which drew some 3200 persons, was held to fulfill a promise Steele made to George Shanklin, veteran promoter, before the Tacoma fight took the middleweight title from Eddie (Babe) Risko in Seattle last month. Shanklin, who gave Steele his first professional fight, was told Steele would make his first appearance as a champion under the same promotion.

## BEAVERS GO DOWN AGAIN

### Three Teams Only Game and Half Out of First Place.

The unpredictable Coast league race, with six teams playing better than 500 baseball, was further snarled today.

Three teams remained a game and a half out of first place, as the league-leading Portland Beavers dropped their third in a row to Los Angeles 10-4, and second place Seattle took its third consecutive licking from the San Francisco Seals 4-2.

Oakland and San Diego moved up on victories over the San Francisco Missions and Sacramento by 7-1 and 6-1, respectively.

Collapse of their pitching staffs brought defeat to Portland and Seattle. Bill Posedel yielded eight runs before he was chased by Los Angeles, and Hobo Carson had to finish. Meanwhile, Joe Berry held the Beavers hitless in seven out of nine frames. John Bottarini hit a homer and two singles to lead the Seraph attack.

Ed Wells yielded the Seals hits in every inning, while Win Ballou pitched smart ball, allowing eight hits only five of which went to the outfield. Hal Rhyne, Tony Borofa and Larry Woodall got nine of the Seals' 10 hits.

Manager Dutch Ruether was not allowed on the field at the start of the game because a league fine of \$50 remained unpaid. Bill Klepper, president of the Seattle team, produced the money—all in small change—which was presented to Umpire Harry Leake in a sack. Ruether was then allowed to coach.

Oakland measured the Missions for the third straight night in a pitching duel between Jim Tobin and studious Wayne Osborne. Osborne caused his own downfall in the eighth, when leading 1-0, he hit and walked two batters, who scored on singles by Jimmy Hitchcock and Jack Glynn. Tobin, who restricted the Reds to four hits, scored the winning run.

NEW YORK, Aug. 21 (UP)—Eleanor Holm Jarrett, America's greatest backstroke swimmer and world record holder who was barred from the Olympic team for drinking, returned home today aboard the Bremen, determined to retain her amateur standing.

Nervously facing reporters and cameramen, the pretty brunette merrily declared:  
1. She will not turn professional.  
2. She will not quit drinking champagne.  
"I want to retain my amateur standing," said Mrs. Jarrett. "I plan to appeal to the Metropolitan A. A. U. for reinstatement, and I believe I'll get it as they are all my friends and I've done nothing wrong. Regardless of what happens I do not intend to quit drinking champagne. I like it."

## Dizzy Dean's Best Season Big Aid to Gas House Gang

Whether Dizzy Dean's "workhorse" act saves the pennant for the St. Louis Gas House gang, it appears to be pointing the great one toward the best season of his big league career.

Old Diz is turning in those victories at the rate of two a week, and at his current pace may come close to hitting the 35-mark in games won for the campaign.

His strikeout and bases-on-balls records for the season so far compare favorably with his best year, 1934, when he won 20, lost seven, pitched 95 batters and walked only 75.

His record for the current campaign is 21 won against eight. He has a winning streak of six straight, and he has his eye on the Giants' coming road trip, when he will be bearing down to end the threat of Bill Terry and company on the National league lead.

## Herman May Take His Row With McPhail to Landis

CHICAGO, Aug. 21 (AP)—Floyd "Babe" Herman, deserting outfielder of the Cincinnati Reds, today was still nursing the idea of placing his contract squabble before Kenesaw Mountain Landis, commissioner of baseball, for settlement.

The lanky outfielder, missing since he quit the Cincinnati club last Tuesday with the avowed intention of coming to Chicago to consult Landis, was located yesterday, lifting apprehension concerning his whereabouts.

## Averill Leading League Batters

CLEVELAND, Aug. 21 (AP)—Earl Averill, Cleveland's slugging outfielder who learned his baseball on Southamish, Wash., sandlots, held the American league batting leadership today with an average of .353.

His mark was two points better than Gehrig of the Yankees and Weatherly, his Cleveland teammate who were tied at .351.

Averill has clubbed 181 hits to lead that department, Charlie Gehring of the Tigers being second with 177. Averill also tops the league in triples with 13.
