

ENTOMBMENT TAKES LIVES OF TWO MEN

into the mine with me. We found the men. One man, McCann, came out in perfect shape. He tells us one of the men died two hours after they were hemmed in.

"Monoxide gas is believed to have caused his death." Griffith said obviously their "strong constitutions" was all that kept McCann and Sexton alive during the three-day imprisonment.

He said he believed both Stoner and the negro were dead within three hours after the main shaft collapsed Tuesday.

Condition Serious Sexton, with Stoner part owner of the mine, was in a serious condition, but Dr. Maddox did not elaborate on his statement.

Anxiety at the mine, packed tight with vigilantes and curious spectators who had turned the soil to dust in their three-day vigil, reached fever peak this afternoon when Dr. Maddox and his son, Dr. John Maddox, went down the shaft.

It had been understood previously that the younger doctor would enter the shaft only in the event some of the entombed men were found living.

"There's only one chance in a thousand the men are still alive." Arnold Griffith, state inspector of mines, had said earlier today as weary rescue crews hacked cautiously at the few remaining feet of debris which imprisoned the men in the depths of the Sexton coal mine near here.

Hoist Away From a three-quarter level, Griffith directed the rescue attempt. With the crew at the bottom was Vic Crigler giving the signals to Charles Hartig at the surface.

"O. K., hoist away," came Crigler's voice from the depths when the tub was filled. "You're taking a long time down there," Hartig answered. "Everything all right?" Crigler replied. "The men can't work too fast."

"How's the air?" "It isn't any too good, but we're getting by. I'm going to send two men up."

"What's the matter?" asked Hartig, his voice betraying his anxiety. "We've got to have some older men down here. I want to be sure no one loses his head. Here they come."

"They must be alive," Mrs. Edward Stoner, Jr., wife of one of the entombed kept repeating as she rested on a blanket. Last night, unable to restrain herself, the attractive brunette woman dashed under the rope holding back the crowds. Before she could get to the main shaft, she was stopped and escorted, half hysterical out of the forbidden zone.

U. S. Declines to Join in Mediating Spanish Rebellion

WASHINGTON, Aug. 21 (U.P.)—The United States tonight courteously declined the Uruguayan invitation to participate with other American nations in efforts to mediate the civil war in Spain.

The refusal was contained in a formal note handed by Acting Secretary of State William Phillips to the Uruguayan Minister J. Richling, late today.

The American note was couched in language exceptionally courteous even for a diplomatic communication.

Phillips praised the motives which prompted the Uruguayan government to suggest joint mediation efforts by the American nations in an attempt to bring about a cessation of the bloody civil war in Spain, but declared that such action would be contrary to the United States' declared policy of strict non-interference in the internal affairs of other nations.

Bridge Chief Gets Governor's Praise

SALEM, Aug. 21 (U.P.)—Governor Martin today congratulated James H. Richmond, Portland, upon his 50 years of service as superintendent of the Morrison street bridge.

"Such citizens as you are the backbone of the nation," the governor wrote. "I feel it my duty, as governor, to give official recognition to your long and faithful service."

but now there were 200,000 in the northern provinces alone. They include many pretty young girls, dressed as men.

The general staff, secretaries and clerks of General Emilio Mola, the northern commander, were quitting the city in a caravan of automobiles.

Southern rebel columns, advancing on Madrid from Seville and Granada, were reported to have effected a junction at Loja, west of Granada.

Rebel leaders said the troops met "enthusiastic manifestations" along the way, establishing full communication for the first time between the two cities in the south and the armies in the field.

A fresh Moroccan battalion, meanwhile, arrived at Burgos by rail from Seville and departed for an undisclosed destination, apparently on the northern front.

The insurgent leaders said government troops were evacuating Iruin, in the north. A fascist rebel airplane dropped five bombs on the village of Henrand, south of San Sebastian, today while negotiations were reported underway to restore peace in the Bay of Biscay battle area.

One child was wounded, dispatches declared. The Basque nationalists who have been aiding the loyalist militia, it was said, were trying to end the fighting by arranging the surrender of the cities of San Sebastian and Iruin, besieged by rebels.

In return, under the Basques' plan, the rebels would grant amnesty to the defenders, the reports related. Fighting continued in the Guadarrama mountains outside Madrid with new victories claimed by loyalists.

Loyalists were reported strengthening positions near Teruel while Catalan columns reported the capture of Capes, near Zaragoza. Other reports stated that loyalists had surrounded the city of Huesca further north of Zaragoza.

Vancouver Harbor Swept by Flames; Damage \$700,000

VANCOUVER, B. C., Aug. 21 (U.P.)—Officials tonight opened investigation into the disastrous fire that swept across Vancouver's waterfront Thursday morning, destroying the ice hockey arena, auditorium, two shipyards and a motorboat construction plant and causing damage estimated at \$700,000.

After fire department officials expressed belief that the fire started in the Fenner and Hood Motorboat company, civic officials ordered an immediate investigation and attempted to determine the amount of the damage.

Three firemen were injured fighting the flames and a woman was treated for shock when she collapsed after her home caught on fire. The injured were William Scott, William Bailey, and Murdo Morrison, all firemen, and Mrs. Benjamin Redding.

Starting in the waterfront motorboat plant, the flames leaped to the arena where 3000 persons had watched Max Baer knock out James J. Walsh less than three hours before, and quickly penetrated the entire block of wooden structures.

Guy Patrick, one of the members of the family which owns the arena, said it probably would not be rebuilt, and indications are that the auditorium was damaged too much to be restored.

charged, had taken over command of the Spanish conflict in an effort to set "the entire world aflame" for communism.

France was reported ready to demand apology from Madrid for reported search of the German steamer in its effort to pacify Nazi Chancellor Hitler into accepting a neutrality pledge.

PARIS, Aug. 21 (U.P.)—A report that the German ambassador to Moscow had made a "threatening" protest to Russian Foreign Minister Maxim Litvinoff against alleged soviet interference in the Spanish civil war was circulated tonight in Paris diplomatic circles.

(From Berlin, it was announced the German government has protested to Moscow against allegedly unfair radio broadcasts, but the nature of the protest was not stated. A second protest was sent from Berlin to Madrid, following yesterday's soviet warning concerning the reported search of a German steamship by a loyalist war vessel.)

A foreign office spokesman said they were "unable to confirm or deny" the diplomatic report concerning the "threatening" nature of the protest.

ROME, Aug. 21 (U.P.)—Premier Mussolini, informed sources said today, has asked his envoys abroad to sound out foreign reaction to abandonment of neutrality negotiations in the Spanish civil war.

This, observers watching Il Duce's armed preparedness, believed reflected his determination to accept no agreement which departs materially from his demands for both practical and "moral" neutrality.

Germany's vigorous ultimatum to the Spanish socialist government, that she will use force against all "unjustifiable acts of force," strengthened Mussolini's resolve, fascist quarters said.

MADRID, Aug. 21 (U.P.)—The Spanish government, apparently anxious to avoid international complications from the civil war, refused to comment today on warnings from Berlin and London that the rights of foreign ships must be respected.

"We have nothing whatever to say," a high official of the state department asserted.

Pardons Urged for DeJonge and Denny

SALEM, Aug. 21 (U.P.)—Pleas urging the pardon of Dirk DeJonge, Portland, and Edward Denny, Eugene, from the state penitentiary, have come to the executive office of the hundreds, Governor Martin said today.

DeJonge is serving seven years and Denny two, for violation of the criminal syndicalism law. Most of the appeals came from members of an Oregon communist organization, the governor said.

Poole, young WPA worker; William Guthrie, Black Legion printer held on a charge of inciting a riot; Clarence C. Fry, former head of the organization's intelligence source, held on charges of conspiracy to kill Arthur L. Kingsley, Highland Park publisher, and Roy Hepper, Black Legion "colonel" also held in the Kingsley conspiracy case.

Names of others were withheld until they could be rounded up.

As Judge Chenot handed down his findings, Frederick A. Gulley and Thomas A. Cox, convicted August 7, of "false imprisonment," of Robert Penland, were sentenced in another court to five years imprisonment. They originally had been charged with abducting and flogging Penland, but the charge was reduced by order of the court.
