Discussions concerning this issue resulted in a virtual battle among the delegates representing every major nation whose territory borders on the Pacific ocean.

Trapshoot Classic to Start

No Marksman Has Even Won Handicap Event Twice; Railroad Man Now Titlist.

VANDALIA, O., Aug. 22—Probably no sport in the world bears out the old saw, "They don't come back," as well as does trapshooting.

Never in the 36-year history of the event has a winning marksman returned with enough of his old skill to annex the clay bird classic the second time.

That puts J. B. Royall, 1935 winner from Tallahassee, Fla., on the spot.

Of course, Royall may be able to blast the dope bucket full of holes, but the odds are against him.

In no other event in the country is there so much pressure on the marksman. He is competing against the best trapshooters in the country.

A Winner at 14: Being a handicap event, the classic draws from all ages.

Handicaps are based on scores in registered shoots, and the lower the handicap, the farther from the target the marksman has to perform.

Even women competitors have a chance, notably Mrs. Lella Hall, trap artist from East Lynne, Mo.

An interesting sidelight in this year's tournament will be the attempt of the veteran Steve Crothers, who has been shooting birds for 25 years.

The Philadelphiaian started a run during the Pennsylvania state shoot in June that has reached 535 straight birds.

Second prize went to G. L. Good, Weyerhaeuser camp, No. 3, who caught a huge lake trout at Rocky Point.

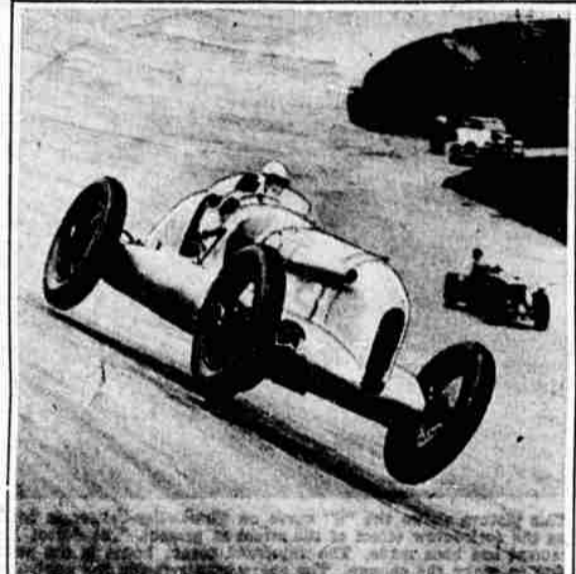

TITLE BATTLE SET FOR JUNE

Schmeling-Braddock Tussle Finally Settled For Next Year

NEW YORK, Aug. 22 (AP)—In one very busy day along Cauldwell alley, the Jimmy Braddock, Max Schmeling heavyweight championship bout has been called off and rescheduled again—this time for either June 3 or 10, 1937.

Champion Jimmy, who started all the furor a few days ago by reporting he had hurt his hand and wanted the fight postponed, made his second appearance before the New York state athletic commission, bringing a final report from the bone specialist assigned to examine his mitt, Dr. Fred Albee.

The commissioners, unwilling to call the whole thing off without further notice, ordered Braddock to begin treatments at once and report back for another examination Sept. 15.

Since that would delay the program too long to hold an outdoor bout this year, the commissioners, Madison Square Garden and Mike Jacobs, went into a huddle and came up with the signatures of both battlers on a new set of contracts calling for the 15-round bout to take place in June in the Garden's Long Island city hotel.
