ERRATIC WEEK EXPERIENCED BY MARKETS

NEW YORK, Aug. 22 (AP)—Financial markets, caught in the swirling cross-currents of drought, heavy industrial improvement and war scares abroad, put in an erratic week.

Analysts said the meanderings of the share market provided an adequate reflection of the financial district's moodiness.

As some saw it: Dullness and steadiness early in the week mirrored watchful waiting of traders. A mid-week rally on heartening news from the steel industry emphasized hopes for further momentum in the durable goods sector.

Subsequent mild selling and withdrawal of bids by professional traders hinted fears of the darkening clouds overhanging Europe as the result of civil war in Spain.

The fact that trading shrunk to the skimpiest proportions in some two months was seen in financial circles as ample proof that Wall Street, though still bullish for the long haul, had bogged down in the mire of near-term doubt.

Still to be answered, analysts said, is the question of how deeply drought will cut into business and industrial gains still expected.

That the purchasing energy of the most severely affected drought areas has not yet shown any letdown was a bright spot.

These strains in the trade were explained in terms of relief funds and higher prices for farm products flowing from scarcity.

Financial men, clinging to a favorable view of the long-term, also stood firm in their belief of higher steel operations and a gain in electric power output.

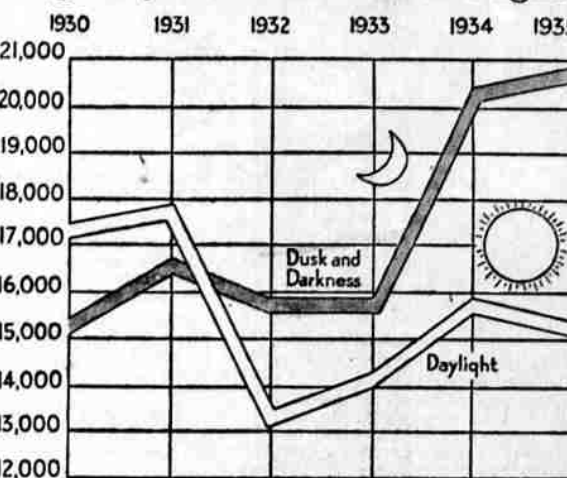

Highway Toll Heaviest at Night



Under cover of darkness, even though traffic then is far lighter, Death now gathers his greatest harvest on the nation's highways, as the chart above, drawn from figures collected by the Travelers Insurance Company, shows. Despite the almost continuous rise in traffic fatalities occurring since 1930, the daylight toll was 12 per cent lower in 1935 than five years before. But deaths during dusk and darkness increased by 37 per cent during that period. Daylight totals were 17,192 for 1930 and 15,126 for 1935. Those for dusk and darkness were 15,808 for 1930 and 20,974 for 1935.

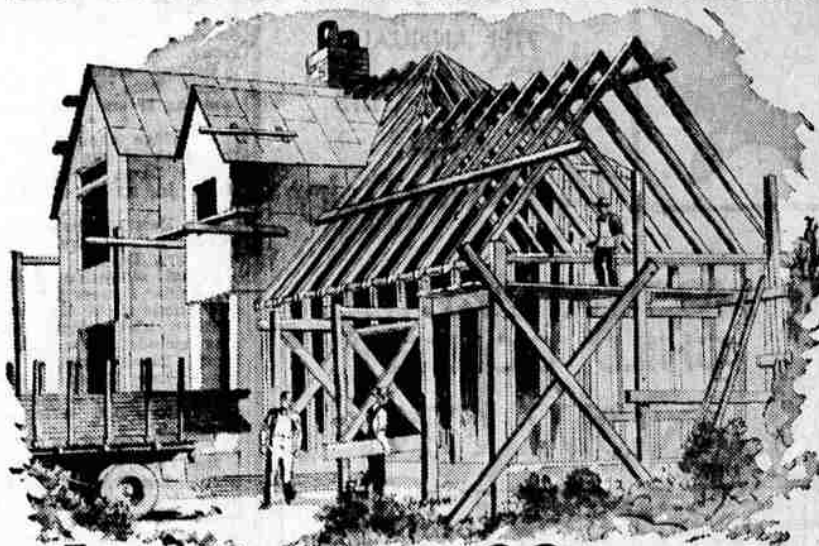
