Your hair will be brushed backward from your brow and upward from the nape of your neck. If you possibly can, you'll part it in the middle and leave it sleek and smooth across the top.

Even manufacturers of cosmetics are advocating simple makeup and soft, feminine effects instead of artificial-looking, sophisticated ones. The new fall clothes call for pretty rather than smart grooming.

When you discard your dark autumn powder (don't do it until your skin has faded noticeably), don't go back to the partly used box of face powder you absorbed early in the summer. CHEYENNE, Wyo., Aug. 22 (UP)—Ann Troyenovsky, wife of the Soviet Russian ambassador to the United States, tonight was recovering in a Cheyenne hospital from injuries she received today in an automobile accident 33 miles east of Cheyenne.

Lida Ivanova, secretary to the ambassador, was also injured, but the 17-year-old son of the ambassador was unhurt. Neither of the two women was seriously injured.

Pacific Mutual Reorganization Plan Rejected

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 22 (UP)—After a long legal tussle, court approval was withdrawn from the Pacific Mutual Life Insurance company reorganization plan late today.

Superior Judge Henry Willis vacated a previous order by presiding Judge Douglas L. Edmonds approving the plan.

The ruling, handed down on a motion of intervenors to vacate a previous order on the company's rehabilitation plan, was one of three made by Judge Willis today, and climaxed a day of argument by attorneys.

Judge Willis also granted a motion to vacate appointment of State Insurance Commissioner Samuel L. Carpenter as liquidator of the company, but sustained a similar order of Judge Edmonds appointing Carpenter as conservator.

Judge Willis explained he was vacating the orders because they constituted judicial acts in which Judge Edmonds was disqualified as being a policy holder in Pacific Mutual and thereby being an interested party.

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 22 (UP)—Col. W. G. D. Mercer, 89, veteran sergeant-at-arms and chaplain of the state senate from 1907 and 1933, died Friday.

Although a Civil war veteran, the title of colonel was given him by several governors. Mercer knew Presidents Lincoln, McKinley and Theodore Roosevelt intimately.

As a boy of 15, he rode with Lincoln to Gettysburg and stood near him during the president's address. Mercer's uncle was an aide de camp on Lincoln's staff.

Mercer enlisted in the Union army at 16, and was with General Sherman on the march to the sea. He joined the secret service after the war, and aided in rounding up the Louisiana lottery gang.

He was a member of the Eugene post, G. A. R., and came to Salem from Lane county. He is survived by a daughter, Wilma Grace Mercer, at Eugene.

Funeral will be held here Monday.

Paraguay, Bolivia Resume Relations

BUENOS AIRES, Aug. 22 (UP)—Diplomatic relations between Paraguay and Bolivia, broken in July, 1931, as result of an incident in Washington related with the Chaco dispute between the two countries, were reestablished tonight.

Renewal of relations was effected by the Chaco peace conference and is in accordance with provisions of the peace protocol signed in July, 1935, which ended the Chaco war. The agreement to reestablish diplomatic representation was signed by members of the Chaco peace conference and delegates of Paraguay and Bolivia. Spruille Braden signed for the United States.

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Missouri Woman Has Six Daughters; All Dute But One

MENDON, Mo., Aug. 22 (UP)—Sextuplets, only one of whom survived, were born here August 9 to Mrs. Philip Spielhinger, 36, mother of 10 living children, the United Press learned today.

The multiple birth was disclosed by Dr. W. B. Lucas, 80-year-old country doctor, who said he was so concerned with the mother's condition he forgot to report it.

Mrs. Spielhinger was up and around tonight, fully recovered. Dr. Lucas said he called Father J. J. Groetsch of the Brunswick, Mo., Catholic church, to administer last rites to the mother when her condition became very serious. Then, he said, she rallied after her ordeal and pulled through.

The baby surviving, a nine pound girl, was the first born. Dr. Lucas said. The next five were born dead. The delivery took an hour.

Mrs. Spielhinger is the mother of five boys and five girls including the last born. The oldest child is 15. She and her husband live on a farm six miles south of Mendon. There is no record of multiple births in her family, Mrs. Spielhinger said.

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
