

ARRESTS RUN HEAVY IN CITY OVER WEEKEND

Jim Murphy, charged with drunken driving, was fined \$100 Monday morning when he appeared before Police Judge Richmond. He was also given a suspended jail sentence of 30 days, and his driver's license suspended for a year.

Murphy was arrested at 1:15 a. m. Monday at Sixth street and Klamath avenue. He pleaded guilty to the charge of driving while under the influence of intoxicating liquor.

Glen A. Strawn forfeited \$10 bail when he failed to appear in police court to answer to reckless driving charges, and Milton H. Jones, who pleaded guilty to the same count, was fined \$5.

Hearing for James P. Connan, arrested at 10:35 p. m. Sunday on charges of reckless driving, has been scheduled for late Monday. He posted \$10 bail.

Jack Bunner, charged with driving with four in the car, forfeited \$500 bail as did O. E. Deas, who was charged with operating an automobile without headlights after dark.

Francisco Lopez forfeited \$20 to the city treasury Sunday, when he was arrested twice during the day on charges of intoxication. He was released from custody both times upon posting bail for his appearance in police court Monday. He failed to appear, however, and the bail money was lost.

Other bail forfeitures were reported Monday by Judge Richmond as follows: Louis Bargo, \$10, on charges of drunkenness; M. J. Aikin, \$500 on charges of disorderly conduct; L. and Conrado Costello, \$10 for drunkenness.

D. L. Morris posted \$10 bail for his appearance at 8:30 o'clock Monday evening for hearing on charges of disorderly conduct.

Fines of \$10 or 5-day jail sentences on charges of drunkenness were imposed upon the following defendants Monday: Iva Scott, William Johnson, H. C. McAlley, Claire C. Ryan, Jay Duffy, Tim Collins, James Choctoot, Benson Johns, Roland Kirk, George Graham, A. J. Condon and William Bellanger.

Alleged habitual offenders were given stiffer penalties for intoxication, with E. W. Erickson fined \$100 or 10 days in jail, and Bill Martin, Sydney Thompson and Walter Vaughn, \$15 or 7 days in jail on the same charge.

James Sullivan received a jail sentence of 40 days and a fine of \$100 on vagrancy charges, and Nellie Nelson was fined \$50 for having no operator's license.

Trotsky Ready To Answer Charges

Reactions Expected
The verdict handed down at dawn by a military collegium of the supreme court was expected to have widespread domestic and international reactions.

The prisoners were declared guilty of having plotted with the exiled Leon Trotsky, war minister of early revolution days, to assassinate Dictator Joseph Stalin and others high in the government and communist party. They were convicted also of having brought about the assassination of Sergei Kiroff, chief aide to Stalin, at Leningrad late in 1934 or of bringing into Russia alleged instructions from Trotsky for carrying out the terrorist plot.

MADRID Aug. 17 (Unlicensed), by courier to Hendaiz, France, Aug. 24.—(Seemingly reliable reports today said President Manuel Azana had sent truckloads of baggage to the port of Valencia amid government fears concerning a southern rebel advance on Madrid.

An official government bulletin admitted Spanish rebel airplanes had bombed Getafe airdrome, on the outskirts of Madrid, early Sunday. Rebels claimed 21 planes dropped 400 bombs.

French sympathizers of Spanish government forces reported more than 100 inhabitants of Irún had been killed in an intensive bombardment by rebel airplanes today.

The report, however, could not be confirmed, since the frontier was closed tightly.

New Planes Used

From Hendaiz, France, insurgent air forces could be seen dropping heavy loads of bombs on the Spanish loyalists.

Three planes, flying in formation, circled the Bay of Biscaya city three times and dropped a dozen bombs, then turned toward the south after 15 minutes of attack without encountering resistance.

The planes looked new, gleaming in the sunlight, and apparently used heavier bombs than those of previous war craft. The detonations were much greater in intensity.

The Madrid Bulletin said, however, that the bombing damage of the capital was slight.

A squadron of government planes pursued the rebel fliers, who sped back to Seville after dropping several bombs.

Government leaders feared the rebels from Hendaiz, in the west, would reach Madrid by the way of the Tagus river valley and Toledo.

PARIS, Aug. 24 (AP)—French officials today dismissed any part by the government in reported service of French volunteers with the Spanish government army.

While officials said they had heard nothing of the reported execution of five French volunteers captured by rebels, one spokesman said "that is one of the risks of war. If a national of one country mixes in the affairs of another he must take the consequences. The government can do nothing for him."

The spokesman added that the government was unable to prevent "adventurers" from enlisting abroad.

Primaries tomorrow in Mississippi and South Carolina commanded national attention. In Mississippi—Senator Harrison, chairman of the finance committee and a staunch new dealer, seeks a fourth term nomination. He is opposed by the combined forces of former Governor Bennett Comer, who seeks his seat, and Senator Bilbo.

In South Carolina Senator Byrnes, another administration stalwart, is opposed for renomination by Thomas P. Stoney, former mayor of Charleston, and Col. William C. Harlee, former marine officer. Byrnes campaigned on his record and the issue of the new deal, while his opponents, saying they had no criticism of President Roosevelt, spoke against what they termed "radical elements" in the party.

Nominations also will be made tomorrow in California for the national house and the state legislature. Delaware republicans on Thursday will make a senatorial nomination and, despite Senator Hastings' announcement that he will not run again, there has been talk of drafting him.

"The government of the republic holds as an unalterable position not to take possession of any property, movable or immovable, belonging to Spanish citizens or foreigners, except naturally in cases of force majeure, and especially when it is a question of the safety of the state or public interest so requires."

"In such a case it will pay the value after a just and equitable appraisal and if possible—and this is the chief desire of the government—in agreement with the interested parties or their legal representatives."

ATTORNEY GENERAL TO FIGHT PETITION

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SALEM, Aug. 24 (AP)—The petition of the Pinnacle Packing company and others for an order temporarily restraining the state unemployment compensation insurance commission for collecting employers' contributions, will be opposed vigorously by the attorney general's office. It was announced here today.

The suit, which asked for both a temporary and permanent restraining order, was filed in Jackson county last week. Arguments on the temporary restraining order will be heard by the court there next Monday. Copies of the complaint were served on the commission today.

The complaint contended that the law creating the fund was unconstitutional in that it violated both the state and federal constitutions.

A number of other packing companies joined with the Pinnacle Packing company in prosecuting the suit.

The commission declared today that a temporary restraining order would result in irreparable damage to the commission and would prevent collections until the court ruled on the application for a permanent order.

Records show that the commission already has collected in excess of \$750,000. It was estimated that collections for the entire year would total \$1,500,000.

Administrative costs are paid by the federal government.
