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Wheat Falls as Week Opens

FOREIGN MARKETS SHOWING WEAKNESS

CHICAGO, Aug. 24 (AP)—Losses ranging up to 2 cents a bushel were sustained by wheat futures today as a result of weakness in foreign markets and decreased domestic demand for grain for immediate delivery. Other grains also were lower.

Cash wheat was quoted 2 to 3 cents a bushel down. Heavy receipts of new wheat at Winnipeg and the pressure of hedging sales on the Canadian market influenced the world price structure. Wheat closed 15-23 cents lower compared with Saturday's finish, September 1.19-1.4, December 1.19-1.4, and corn was 1-1 1/2 off, September 1.11-1.13, December 96-1. Oats lost 1-1 1/2, rye 1-1 1/2, and lard 13 to 18 points.

PORTLAND, Aug. 24 (AP)—Wheat prices were in reverse today with the Portland futures market, without any trading, showing September final off 1 1/2, December 2c and May 2 1/2c.

Stock Market Quotations

NEW YORK, Aug. 24 (AP)—The stock market got off on another fairly today, but backtracked a bit in the final hour after gains of fractions to 3 or more points had been recorded.

Even though the list lacked vigor in most departments, there were many advances of fractions to 1 cent or more at the steady close. Transfers were around \$9,000,000 shares.

Business and industrial developments were viewed with satisfaction by economic observers. The better tone of foreign news also helped to stiffen bullish resistance.

Allied Chemical, at its best, was up about 3 points. Among the firmer spots during most of the session were J. I. Case, International Harvester, Deere, U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, U. S. Pipe and Foundry, Chrysler, Studebaker, General Motors, Montgomery Ward, Sears Roebuck, Schenley, U. S. TRADING ACTIVITY SHOWING UPSWING

PORTLAND, Aug. 24 (AP)—An upswing in trading activity in wheat occurred in Pacific northwest markets in the past week, receipts at Puget Sound and Columbia river terminals totaling 1514 cars, the U. S. department of agriculture said today.

California buyers appeared for high protein wheat and although no new export business developed sales were estimated to have exceeded 20,000 tons, mostly to Ireland. The foreign flour trade also showed upswing, shipments to the Philippines under the Nationality plan totaling 6000 barrels, which brought the traffic since July 1 to 156,000.

Northwest barley markets were fire with milling types in especially strong demand from the midwest and corn markets advanced in sympathy with eastern strength. There were no additional arrivals of Argentine corn.

Oats continued firm with an encouraging inquiry for current offerings in some producing areas. The Willamette valley crop was being threshed, with yields and quality reported below expectations.
