China Will Refuse Japanese Support In Reconstruction

YOSEMITE, Aug. 25. (UP)—Chinese delegates to the world conference of the Institute of Pacific Relations, told delegates of other nations today that China would refuse assistance from Japan in the reconstruction of the country but would accept aid from any other nation.

The Japanese delegates insisted that the only hope of China is through unification and reconstruction and that Japan's only desire is to cooperate with China on such a program.

The Chinese replied that the Japanese had concentrated on the idea of cooperation so much and in such an insistent manner that they, the Chinese, could not understand it.

American delegates emphasized that although the United States scrupulously had respected the Chinese territorial integrity, yet action by the United States in 1942 in forcing the "first unequal treaty" on China, and later in demanding the most favored nation clause, had forced China into a whole series of international treaties that have infringed greatly on China's sovereignty.

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Produce Vies With Blooms At Exhibition

MERRILL, Aug. 24—Produce from Klamath and Siskiyou county gardens vied for honors with a profusion of blooms, eloquent evidence of the efforts of home-makers to beautify the four corners of the wide agricultural area, at the second annual fall Valley flower show here Sunday.

The show was sponsored by members of the Lost River Garden club, the Tulake Garden club and others from various districts in the valley where no clubs are yet organized. Garden produce made its appearance for the first time at this fall's exhibit.

Several Hundred Attend
Several hundred visitors viewed the exhibits in the Merrill high school gymnasium from 2 until 6 p. m., a much larger attendance being recorded than at any previous show. With interest and cooperation of the various communities consolidated, the exhibition promises to become one of the most largely attended and widely known events of the two closely associated counties.

Main and Tulake vegetable displays were outstanding. Varieties were exhibited that many residents believed impractical or impossible to raise to maturity here. The fruit display from the James Lacey ranch at Merrill won the acclaim of those attending. The Henley district also came in for honors in this division with a splendid collection of summer fruits.

Clubs Build Booths
The Lost River Garden club and the newly organized Tulake club added booths in which were displayed splendid horticultural exhibits. A miniature Tulake lake, flanked by bits of lava rock, and old Indian relics added to the attractiveness of the Siskiyou county entry.

Children of the community were encouraged to display in a number of divisions, and the invitation brought to light some unusual artistic ability in the younger generation. Outstanding additions to this division were the miniature garden entries made by Lorraine Dolan, Spring Lake, who took first, and Margaret and Benny Murphy, Merrill, who took second and third prizes.

Prize List Withheld
The booth sponsored by the Lost River Garden club was guarded by a cleverly made vegetable lady with cornsilk hair, flanked by giant sunflowers grown by Mr. and Mrs. Willard S. Smith.

Cash prizes donated by merchants of Merrill and Tulake will be mailed to the winners in the various divisions as soon as a thorough check of the prize winners is completed, probably within the next two weeks. List of the prize winners will be published at a later date.

Judges for the event included Mrs. E. D. Lamb, Mrs. Mitchell Wells and C. A. Henderson, Klamath county agricultural agent, all of Klamath Falls, and Merle Looney, Malin.

The judges, with Mrs. O. T. McKendree, president of the Lost River Garden club, Merrill, and Mrs. Gould of the Tulake club, were entertained at luncheon by Mrs. Melvin Bowman.

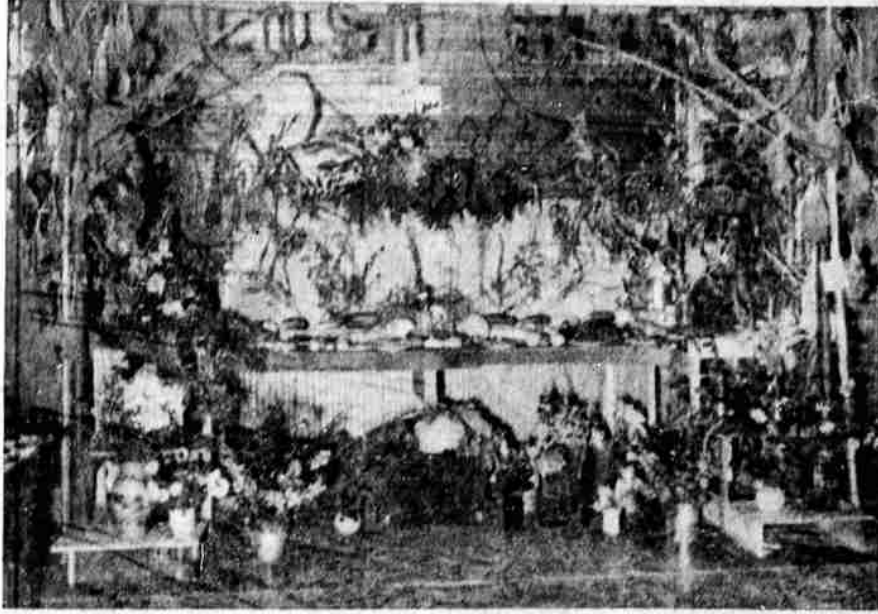

NEW HIGH SCHOOL WILL BE OCCUPIED

MERRILL, Aug. 25—With the approach of the fall term of school activities are already under way for the first days' sessions with the moving of office equipment, laboratory equipment and other necessities from the old high school building to the new, which has just recently been completed and tentatively accepted by the county school unit. While the structure, built by the Brotherhood Construction company, will be occupied, it has not yet been officially accepted by the county, according to Principal Harold J. Hendrickson.

Fire escapes on the old brick building are to be used in the future at the elementary school. They were placed during the summer vacation and janitor's quarters were added in the basement. E. S. Riley will serve as janitor of the grade school, and Charles Brown has been employed to serve in that capacity at the new building. The mechanical arts building formerly located on the old grounds has been moved to the new location in preparation for that group of students, and some new equipment added. Other subjects offered will be the same as in former years. The first teachers' meeting is expected to be called for the early evening of Monday, September 7. Classes will begin Tuesday, September 8.
