

POWERS WINNER OF LIVESTOCK JUDGING

Results of the county 4-H club judging contest on livestock, held last Friday, and in which 25 club members competed, showed that Norman Powers of Merrill was high point man, with a score of 560 points out of a possible 700. Classes of Herefords, Guernsey heifers, Hampshire sheep, Hampshire sows and gilts, Guernsey and Jersey cows, were judged during the day. The team of three from one club scoring the highest came from the Merrill baby beef club, the boys making a combined score of 1440 points out of a possible 2100. The boys and their respective scores were Tom Haley, 490; Lou Rathoff, 475; Randall Pope, 475.

The second high team was from the Henley baby beef club, with total score of 1280, composed of Charles Rudolph, 505 points; Bobby Hickenstaff, 430; and Alvin Cheyne, 445 points. Other boys who participated and their scores were as follows: Dick Shuck, 290; Gene Short, 430; Ray Warner, 460; James Hammond, 415; Virgil Powers, 430; Don Manning, 490; Anthony Crapo, 520; Harry Oren, 385; Bobby Norris, 310; Rich and Takaas, 445; Edul Bailey, 535; Howard Manning, 520; Jackie Grafton, 415; Irwin Warner, 325; Paul Patrelo, 360.

Another county judging contest will be held later this week, after which the combined scores of last contest and the new one will be added together and the three highest boys from one individual club will be selected to participate in the state livestock judging contest. All the boys in the livestock clubs are studying their livestock judging work and the results of the next contest may be entirely different should some of the boys now in the lead make a slip or others make a much better score.

FOUR-H CANNING EXHIBIT PLANNED

Four-H canning club work for 1936 will be terminated this weekend with an exhibit of canned fruits, vegetables, meats, and jellies, at the chamber of commerce beginning Friday, August 28. The exhibits will be in the windows of the chamber of commerce where all may view them, and they will be judged and ribbons awarded on Friday afternoon. Mrs. Isabelle Brixner, county school supervisor, will judge the canning, and the arrangement of the exhibits will be in charge of local leaders, Miss Mildred Shipman, Sprague River; Mrs. Myrtle Fleming, Henley; and Mrs. W. Zimmerman of Chiloquin.

Winning exhibits in the first five places will be taken to the state fair next month, to be entered in the 4-H canning divisions there.

The girls in the various canning clubs are working this week to perfect their demonstrations, which will portray some canning work covered this year, and each club is expected to send in one demonstration team in each division which was carried by the girls in the club. The winning team will be taken to the state fair where it will compete in the state contest.
