Fishing News

Deschutes River Above Bend—Some fine large fish being taken both morning and evening by experienced fishermen. Here's a tip that should enable any fairly good fisherman to get some nice fish. Try weighted nymphs in black, or black and green, or black and yellow combinations during the day and grey hackle with yellow body or bucktail coachman; fish dry for evening fishing.

Deschutes River Below Bend—No recent reports available. Metolius River—On the upper Metolius a few more cold nights are necessary to produce really

good fishing. Some nice fish, however, are being taken on various small flies. The lower Metolius down in the canyon is producing very fine catches of large fish on a fly.

Crooked River—Nice catches of rainbow trout being made on fly. Water is low and exceedingly clear and much care must be exercised, but the fish are there and can be caught.

Cultus River—Some very fine large fish being taken on fly. Many can be hooked, but landing is difficult due to the amount of windfall across the stream.

East Lake—Fly fishing is very good of an evening. Also limit catches are being made deep trolling and bait fishing.

Paulina Lake—Fly fishing is steadily improving. A large percentage of large fish are being taken each week.

Elk Lake—Some nice large fish being taken on troll. Very little fly fishing, but good fishing is available at the adjacent lakes—Sparks, Mud and Horse; both fly and troll.

Diamond Lake—Limit catches of fine large fish being made on bait, some on troll. No report on fly fishing except that it is good in Lake Creek.

Crescent Lake—Fishing very much improved and limit catches of fine large fish are being made on spoons and worms. Fly fishing not so good in lake, but limit catches being made in adjacent streams.

Odell Lake—Reasonably good fishing on fly as well as on plugs and spoons.

Sparks Lake—Fishing is improving, fair catches being made on fly, troll or bait.

Three Creek Lake—Very erratic, but limit catches being made at times both on fly and troll.

Mud Lake—Fishing is still good

but few large fish are being caught.

Big Cultus Lake—Fair on troll. No report on fly fishing.

Little Cultus Lake—Fair on fly for small fish.

Davis Lake—Some evenings fly fishing is excellent, other evenings not so good. All fish are running large, 1 1/2 to 2 1/2 pounds.

South Twin Lake—This lake is likewise erratic, but some very fine limit catches are being taken.

Suit Filed

Norman Smith versus American Automobile Insurance company.
