SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 27 (AP)—At least 15 Pacific Coast League players, including six hard-hitting catchers, are being considered by major league scouts.

Every team in the league has brilliant prospects, although they are not all on the market, some already being owned by major circuit outfits.

The two prize rookies on the selling block are Joe Marty, hard-hitting San Francisco Seal outfielder, and Hal Spindel, peppery but temperamental Seattle catcher.

Marty is hitting in the neighborhood of .350 and held the league leadership for most of the year.

Spindel, a .306 hitter, is priced at \$50,000 by William Klepper, owner of the Indians.

Other promising backstops have even more impressive batting records. Vince Monzo, Seal regular, was leading the league when the averages were last released with a .350 average.

Charley Paddock Advises Owens to Stay 'Simon Pure'

LONG BEACH, Calif., Aug. 27 (AP)—A former world sprint king advised Jesse Owens today that he is making a mistake in turning professional because he can make \$100,000 as an amateur.

Charles W. Paddock, the last United States winner in the Olympic 100-meter dash, contends Owens can net at least \$20,000 a year for the next five years while retaining his simple pure athletic status.

As a professional, Owens' career would be ended in twelve months at least, Paddock asserts.

The former "fastest human," now newspaper business manager and sports columnist here, published his views as follows: "As a professional, Owens is good just so long as the memory of his achievements in the Olympic games are fresh in people's minds. He will have a manager (perhaps several of them) and a publicity agent.

"He will not be adding to his laurels but rather capitalizing on them. And in his case, it is a perfectly proper thing for he
