REBELS BOMB SPANISH CAPITAL

Editorials On the Day's News

THIS headline tells a crisp and terse story: "Rebels Plan to Restore Spanish Monarchy."

A dispatch from rebel territory adds:
"A military dictatorship will be constituted indefinitely to exterminate all loyalist elements and to rule the country without any parliament whatever, high officials of the fascist junta asserted."
"Then, they said, will come a plebiscite (election) to determine upon the restoration of the Bourbon dynasty."

IT IS interesting to speculate upon that proposed plebiscite (which is a fancy diplomatic word for election.) With a military dictatorship running the country, and no parliament whatever to bother it, and this military dictatorship set upon the idea of restoring the Spanish monarchy (meaning some member of ex-King Alfonso's family) just how many votes, do you reckon, would be counted AGAINST the restoration?

Not many, probably, as they do things in dictator-ruled countries.

ANOTHER paragraph from this rebel territory dispatch is interesting. It reads:

"Close collaboration with Germany and Italy, friendly nations, which, fascist leaders said, have stood by the rebel army in the present civil war, would be maintained, officials of the fascist junta asserted."

THAT is to say, Germany and Italy (both fascist ruled) have been backing the Spanish rebellion. Russia, communist-ruled, and France, with a radical socialist government, have been at least secretly patting the Spanish communist government on the back and telling it to do its darndest.

All of which is leading up to a new alignment, communist on one side and fascist on the other, which offers excellent possibilities of again plunging Europe into bloody and prolonged warfare.
If such a war should begin, no one can say where it would stop. But it requires no son of a prophet to figure out that by the time it stopped common, everyday sort of people in Europe would be reduced to unbelievable poverty and want.

THERE is a distinct effort in this country to realize American politics along radical versus reactionary lines, abandoning the economic issues upon which our parties have divided in the past and substituting for them the social issues that have divided European parties for the past several generations.

Let's think a long, long time before we do anything like that. Europe's radical-reactionary political alignment is bringing it to the verge of a frightful abyss.

5000 ACRES NOW COVERED IN SOUTH-END

Damage Mounts To Near \$100,000; Fleet of Combines Work

KANDRA GRAIN IN LINE OF ADVANCE

Grain-Cutting Runs On In Night On Haskins Lease

Five thousand acres of Tule lake leased land lay under water today, and close to \$100,000 worth of grain had been ruined, as floods from the evaporation sump continued their unchecked invasion of the rich farm land.
Combine crews worked feverishly in an effort to salvage as much of the grain as possible before the water took over the fields. Meanwhile, emergency harvesting operations started on the Louis Kandra lease, adjoining Haskins and next in line ahead of the spreading water.

Work at night tonight means nothing to the harvesting crews. They work all night, even though the moisture reduces the efficiency of their equipment. More men and machinery went into service on the leased land Saturday morning.

A temporary dyke broke during Friday night, and CCC boys were called out of the area.
On Calmes Place
Water spread onto the Tom Calmes lease, but it did no damage there, as he had removed the grain from the flooded fields. Calmes' place is on fairly high ground.

VICTIMS IDENTIFY 12 AS VIGILANTES

SANTA ROSA, Calif., Aug. 29 (AP)—Twelve alleged tar-and-feather victims today faced trial on kidnapping and assault charges here, with the attorney general of California as prosecutor.

The twelve, held to answer by a superior judge from another county at the conclusion of a preliminary hearing, remained at liberty under \$500 bail each.
They were identified by tar-and-feather victims before the hearing as members of the night-riding band which acted against supposed labor agitators in an agricultural workers' strike a year ago.

Attorney General U. S. Webb, who sought the charges after authorities in the county failed to act, has 15 days in which to press the information on which the trial will be held.

Axe Slaying Suspects in Lynch Danger

PUEBLO, Colo., Aug. 29 (AP)—Authorities took extreme precautions today to safeguard against mob violence two men named by French L. Taylor, district attorney, as the axe slayers of 15-year-old Dorothy Drain. Joe Arridy, 21, who Taylor said "has the mind of a child," and Frank Aguilar, 33-year-old WPA worker, were held in the Colorado penitentiary at Canon City to forestall any attempt at lynching.

Arridy, who escaped August 8 from the state home for mental defectives at Grand Junction, was arrested Thursday at Cheyenne, Wyo., as a vagrant.

Officers brought him here secretly yesterday and took him to the Drain home, where he repeated an oral confession made to Cheyenne officers.

Taylor said Arridy identified Aguilar as his accomplice. Aguilar was arrested here 10 days ago when he made inquiries about the Drain case while mingling with a crowd outside a mortuary where services for Dorothy Drain were conducted.

Arridy, Taylor asserted, accused Aguilar of killing Dorothy with an axe and of beating her 12-year-old sister, Barbara, into insensibility.

Previously Arridy said he struck the fatal blow but involved another man.
Taylor said Arridy declared last night that he and Aguilar ravished the older girl after she was beaten.

Aguilar denied any connection with the slaying.

F. R. DETERMINED ON DROUGHT PLAN

First Great Cost Not Discouraging, He Tells Audience

PIERRE, N. D., Aug. 29 (AP)—President Roosevelt in a rear platform speech from his train here today reiterated his advocacy of a long-range drought relief program even though the cost may be great at first.

Talking to several thousand persons at the end of a tour of federal relief projects, Mr. Roosevelt asserted:

"On the long-range program the principal thing is better land use."

Three-Way Attack
Pleading again for cooperation in the task between all public agencies, he said: "Unless we invest, not only of money but human beings."

"If it costs \$1,000,000 to save \$10,000,000 I think it is worth while."

The speech came just before the president entered a comfortable in his private cab with Gov. Berry of South Dakota and Gov. Miller of Wyoming, and Senators Bulow (D-S.D.) and Carey (R-Wyo.).

He reiterated the drought problem would be attacked from three angles—taking care of people, immediate need of food, and caring for thousands of families who will require help through the winter "until the Lord sends more rain in the spring," and a long-range program.

GIRL KILLED BY HIT-RUN DRIVER

WALLA WALLA, Aug. 29 (AP)—Southwestern Washington and Lincoln county, Oregon, were being scoured today for a hit and run motorist who last night fatally injured 13-year-old Dorothy Birkes of Walla Walla on the highway four miles southwest of here.
Dorothy, last of a bicycle party of eight youths was found with her head crushed, alongside the road by motorists who brought her to a hospital where she was pronounced dead.
George Patterson, highway patrolman who investigated, said Dorothy was probably carried more than 90 feet from the point of impact to the spot where she was found. Evidence that the driver had applied his brakes or slackened his speed was lacking, Patterson said. The car was Walla Walla owned.

Official Note Handed To Foreign Minister At Moscow

GOOD RELATIONS HELD JEOPARDIZED

Soviets Do Not Ask That Exile Be Forced Back To Russia

MOSCOW, Aug. 29 (AP)—The soviet government today officially demanded that Norway expel Leon Trotsky, the exiled Russian bolshevik leader.

A government note handed to the Norwegian foreign minister by the soviet representative in Oslo read:

"The soviet government expects the Norwegian government will not delay measures to deprive Trotsky of further refuge in Norwegian territory."

Threat Noted
There was no indication, however, that the soviet government had demanded the exile's return to Russia.

The note made plain that Norway's refusal would prejudice good relations between the two governments and would be considered a violation of international law.

It was further stated in the note: "On Dec. 1, 1934, Comrade Sergei Kiroff, a soviet government official, was killed."

"An investigation proved the murder was committed by a member of a terrorist organization, the purpose of which was to organize terrorist activities against members of the soviet government and its leaders."

Led By Trotsky
"This was proven in the 1934 trial of the assassin. Additional investigation and the trial in August established that the terrorist organization was organized by Leon Trotsky, now living in Norway, who gave detailed instructions to his followers in the U. S. S. R. for the assassination of Stalin and Klement Voroshiloff, Lazarus H. Kaganovich and G. K. Ordzhonikidze and others high in government officialdom."

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DAMAGE DONE BY PLANE IN CITY CENTER

Several Hurt; Government Building Suffers From Explosions

LOYALISTS SHOOT AT OWN PLANES

Fierce Fighting Occurs As Insurgents Storm San Marcial

MADRID, Aug. 29 (AP)—Fascist rebel aerial bombs exploded today in downtown Madrid for the first time.

Several persons were wounded, hundreds of windows were broken and important government buildings were damaged.

The attack was the fourth of the week but the first successful onslaught against the city itself.

Assault Stopped
It was followed by a fifth venture by the rebels which was frustrated by quick-action Madrid socialist government airplanes.

The rebel plane, apparently flying at a great altitude, roared toward the center of the city in power-dives shortly before midnight when the streets were still filled by homebound-going crowds.

A few moments later the engines of the plane could be heard plainly, and two Bengal lights were dropped, brilliantly lighting a vast area of the city.

Windows Broken
Immediately two bombs were released from the plane and fell in the garden of the ministry of war, tearing up great holes.

The rebel lights fell in the plaza Cibeles lighting the great square flanked by the ministry of war, the Bank of Spain and the general postoffice.

Several hundred windows were broken by the bombs' blast, including those in the Bank of Spain, the ministry of the interior and the nearby office of the Associated Press. No other damage resulted.

The next attempt to bomb the city was balked at by authorities from the nearby town of Calvario flashed the warning of the approach of the rebel airplanes.

Shoot At Own Planes
Government planes took to the air immediately as they flew in high circles over the city.

Madrid militiamen mistook their own craft for rebel planes and directed a heavy rifle and machine gun fire at them.

Women Flee
After daybreak the battle subsided to occasional artillery firing. A rebel plane dropped three bombs on the government line near San Marcial without effect.

EMPLOYERS UNITED IN LABOR QUESTION

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 29 (AP)—Fears in Pacific coast waterfront circles of a possible repetition of the bitter 1934 maritime strike increased today as employers presented a united front in declaring for modification of labor agreements.

Harry Bridges, militant coast president of the International Longshoremen's association, described the employers' proposals as "ridiculous" in a talk before the San Francisco labor council last night.

He expressed belief the longshoremen, rather than accept pay reductions and other proposed changes in the present agreements, would vote for another strike.

Bridges' declaration came after the Shipowners' Association of the Pacific operators of the coastwise steamers' line-up complete by serving modification notices on the various unions.

ROBINSON ATTACKS LANDON'S SPEECH

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Aug. 29 (AP)—Senator Joseph T. Robinson, praising new deal revenue legislation, said last night Gov. Alf M. Landon's Buffalo speech showed "the republicans are staking their last hope on their ability to frighten the consumer."

"The G. O. P. always adopts these methods when its leadership is sterile of constructive plans and proposals," the senate majority leader asserted in a broadcast speech.

The republican presidential nominee, said Robinson, sought "to alarm the man of moderate means by hinting that the country is overburdened by a huge public debt that must be paid by those of moderate means."

Business and industry "have gone forward with amazing rapidity since enactment of the 1935 tax bill," he said, asserting this proved the soundness of the revenue measure which Governor Landon had attacked.

BURLINGTON, Vt., Aug. 29 (AP)—Col. Frank Knox, republican vice presidential candidate, left today the assertion "this is not a political campaign, this is a crusade to save America."
