Paris Glamor Mode for Fall Ends Informal Era

PARIS—The days when a smart wardrobe consisted entirely of straight, untrimmied little shirt-waist dresses, a plain tailored suit and mannish blouses to wear with it are dead and gone. This is a season of glamor clothes. Everything has a dressy, ultra feminine air about it.

The dressy afternoon frock is again in vogue. Satin, heavy crepe and velvets of all kinds are favored a good deal, but silky, chiffon-weight broadcloths are newer. Important houses like Marchesa, Chanel and Patou show simple little dresses, cut on the lines of a sports frock, in fine gold and silver lame for the cocktail hour.

Black definitely dominates for formal daytime wear, and red is the newest contrast note. Scarlet, Chinese, Soudanese (Lahvin) and geranium reds impart a good deal of zest to both dull and shiny blacks. Touches of palest blue, myrtle green and mauvish pink are fashionable, too.

While the majority of suits depend on blouses to supply contrast, a great many of them have matching blouses in lustrous fabrics like satin or silk ottoman.

Fur is used lavishly on coats and suits. Immense fur collars in silver fox, astrakhan, and lynx have replaced the denuded necklines of last winter. On very formal models the entire back panel is in fur—astrakhan, seal or broadtail—sometimes with sleeves also made of fur, or high fur cuffs. Shawl collars are popular, so are the newer triangular ones which give a very broad look to the top front of the coat.

An entire silver fox, forming an elongated godet, with the head placed at the waistline, trims the two edges of many afternoon coats and gives an apron-like effect. This is also done in flat fur. Then there are abbreviated boleros of bushy fox worn over afternoon wraps, a style which only the almighty of women can wear successfully.

Every collection has at least one broadcloth suit cut on the lines of the masculine cutaway or formal evening coat, with or without fur trimmings. The Patou collection has a cocktail suit with a Norfolk jacket, a box-pleated skirt, a shirtwaist in lame and a realistic rose embroidered on the left side.

Reveries include the old umbrella skirt, the gored skirt (Piquet and Patou) and the chemise dress (Molyneux). In some houses the fullness is concentrated at the back, leaving the front plain. This applies to day and evening skirts. Then again there are a great number of flowing skirts with fullness evenly distributed all around the figure, contrasted with skirts which are so skintight that the mannequins would positively "hobble" were it not for a practical slit in front or on one side, sometimes disclosing the knee. Ardane shows a skirt made up of five panels, all slit about seven inches up, topped by a flared tunic, and she lines these panels with a contrasting satin or with soft brown suede, as in a very striking gold lame dinner dress.

Molyneux has several evening

silhouettes but the slim, straight, unbelted line is the newest. On some models a loose cord in silk or wool, complete with tassels, indicates the waistline. He does this throughout his daytime and evening things. His version of the still popular tunic is a straight one, over a slinky skirt which acquires fullness at the ankles, with or without a belt. It is guaranteed to add inches to the silhouette. Then again he shows several robes-de-style type of dresses with the full skirt attached to a bodice extending below the hips.

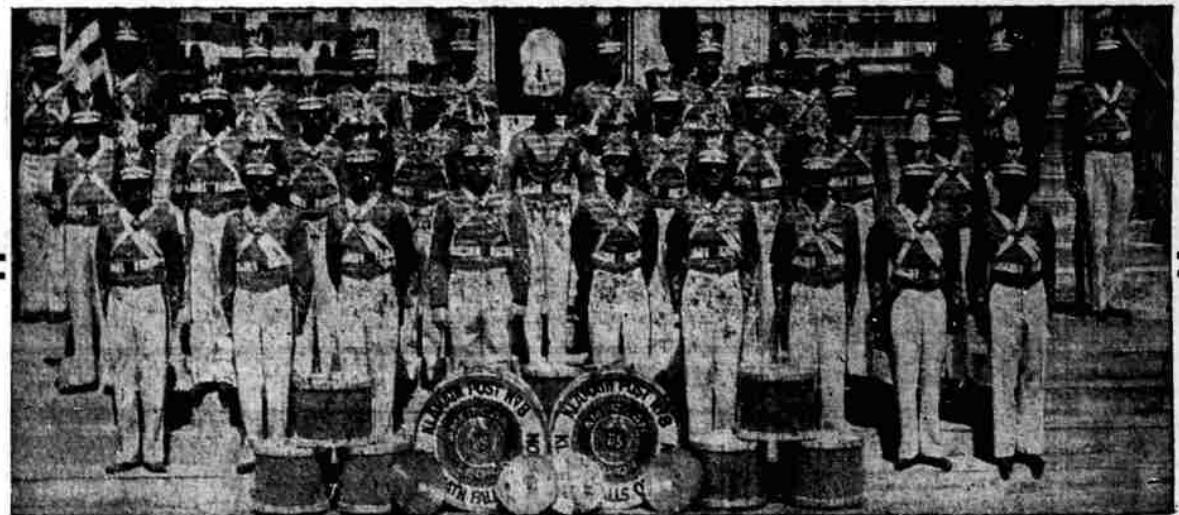
