

CANNED FOOD WINNERS GET SCHOLARSHIPS

Three girls won scholarships to the 4-H summer school at Corvallis next year and at least 16 jars of assorted fruits, vegetables, meats and preserves were assured a show when the Oregon state fair when judges completed their inspection of exhibits entered by 64 girls in the canning division of Klamath county 4-H club work.

The canning exhibits, which were on display in the chamber of commerce windows over the weekend, represented a delayed section of the 4-H spring fair, delayed because fruits and vegetables were not ready for preserving at the time of the general exposition. Another division of the fair, the livestock division, is still in the future, it having been set for September 29.

Lois Lousley of Fort Klamath, Barbara Damon of Dairy and Joana Jones of Altamont, were the girls who showed at the Oregon state fair when judges completed their inspection of exhibits entered by 64 girls in the canning division of Klamath county 4-H club work.

The exhibits of these three girls along with those of the three or four next ranking exhibitors in each classification will be sent to Salem for display in the 4-H building at the state fair, Clifford Jenkins, county club leader, said Monday.

NEW TELEPHONE EXCHANGE OPENS

TULELAKE, Calif., Aug. 31.—Cut over of the first line of the local telephone exchange operated by the Columbia Utilities company was made at 8 p. m. Friday evening by D. O. Hood, Portland, president of the utility company, when officials of exchanges in Merrill and Klamath Falls and a host of guests from Klamath Falls and surrounding towns gathered to offer congratulations on the move of the exchange from the Havina camp location into the new modern quarters in the Barks building.

The move marks a new era in progress for the company. Prior to two and a half years ago, service was dispensed to patrons of Tulelake from a switchboard in a local restaurant. Later the switchboard was moved into two operators were employed. About a year and a half ago toll service between Tulelake, Merrill and Malin was inaugurated.

The present office offers to the public trans-Atlantic cable service as well as service to any part of the continent. Two telephone booths, one with outside entrance for 24 hour service, will facilitate calls from the office. A new type switchboard has been installed and a third operator has been added to the staff.

The newly completed quarters provide a modern three room and bath apartment for the chief operator and 24 hour service is available.

Employees of the various local exchanges and business men of Tulelake presented a profusion of flowers in token of welcome, and punch, wafers and sandwiches were served to the host of friends and well wishers who gathered for the formal opening.

COUNTY SHARES IN RA PAYMENTS

Payments totaling \$21,842.75 were made in Klamath county by the resettlement administration from July 1, 1935 to June 26, 1936, according to information received by Edgar Freed, state director for the national emergency council.

Of these payments loans totaling \$14,559.78 were made to 24 persons, and \$7,383.00 of grants to 179 persons were disbursed. An additional activity of the resettlement administration, that of farm debt adjustments, showed that in Klamath county one case had been adjusted through May, 1936, involving an original indebtedness of \$2,200.00 with resultant savings of \$200.00.

The state of Oregon had received rehabilitation loans through June 26, 1936, amounting to \$675,745.16 which were actually certified for payment. There remained the sum of \$9948.00 in unpaid commitments. Rehabilitation grants during the same period were advanced in the sum of \$217,199.48. A total of 1213 persons in Oregon received loans while 4932 persons were the recipients of grants.

HELP PLEDGED IN POTATO FESTIVAL

MERRILL, Aug. 31.—Co-operation of individuals, Klamath county agricultural organizations, the Klamath county agricultural agent's office and others has been pledged the Merrill Service club in bringing to a successful conclusion plans for the third annual potato festival to be held here in community hall October 31.

Officially the festival is scheduled for one day only. Actually there will be two days of the event with the first day, Friday, October 30, devoted to the annual meeting of the Klamath County Potato Growers' association and judging of potato entries.

Preliminary plans for the event have been under way for several weeks and committee members meeting in general session Friday evening, advanced still further plans for a larger and more interesting series of events than was offered at any previous potato show.

Under the new system of preparation devised this year, each committee chairman is urged to proceed with his own particular plans, assisted by committee members and plans will be approved by the central committee, comprised of Tom Chaburn, Service club president, Chet Barton and Tom Laird, if suggested plans do not conflict with plans made by other committees.

Sections of the Potato Growers' association will probably convene at 1 p. m. Friday following judging of the exhibits by Professor Hyslop of Oregon State college.

A large list of classifications is to be open for entries with cash prizes amounting to approximately \$300 offered.

Half of the prize money is to be advanced by the Service club and the remainder by local 4-H clubs. Future Farmer organizations, Klamath county and possibly the state.

Saturday's festivities will open with a parade at 10 a. m. followed by a brief period devoted to juvenile sports. A free lunch will be served at noon at the community hall, featuring Klamath netted gems, Klamath basin butter, hot dogs and trimmings. "Absolutely no charge attached," says President Chaburn, who stated Saturday that the club expects to prepare at least 1000 free meals that day.

Immediately following lunch, Malin and Merrill, traditional enemies of football, are expected to battle it out on Merrill high school's new athletic field.

State candidates as well as local aspirants for office up for election in November will be heard during the banquet scheduled for Saturday evening at 6 o'clock in the Presbyterian church annex. Letters of invitation will go to Senator McCall, Congressman Pierce, Willis Mahoney, Klamath Falls mayor and others from George Offield, mayor of Merrill, who is serving as chairman of the banquet committee. Dinner will be served by ladies of the Presbyterian aid.

The big event will close with a dance in the community hall with music to be furnished by the best orchestra obtainable. William Hammond is making arrangements for the final event of the festival.

Entries are open to residents of Klamath, Siskiyou and Modoc counties.
