

SCHOOLS MAKE PREPARATIONS FOR NEW TERM

Students of Sacred Heart academy marched back to school on Tuesday morning to start their fall work.

Those who attend Klamath Falls city schools and Klamath Union high school, however, have another week before they listen for the school bell, on Tuesday morning, September 8. County schools will also open next Tuesday.

Freshmen and sophomores, only, are asked to report at Klamath Union high school on Tuesday morning, and the junior and senior classes on Tuesday afternoon. Some organization work is necessary, according to Principal Lloyd H. Emery, and classes are being divided to avoid confusion.

All K. U. H. S. students are asked to report Wednesday morning, and Wednesday afternoon will be given over to the purchase of books. It will not be necessary for any students to obtain books before that time.

Some confusion relative to the announcement of concentration of high grades at Fremont school has arisen, according to Superintendent J. P. Wells.

Only the high half grades from Mills and Roosevelt schools are being transferred to Fremont. That is, Wells explained, the sixth, seventh and eighth grades of Mills and the seventh and eighth high from Roosevelt. There are only a few pupils in these groups, who are a half year ahead of the regular class.

All teachers' assignments in the city schools have not been definitely made, and probably will not be until the opening day, when enrollments have been tabulated.

Due to increased clerical work in the Southern Pacific yard office and freight station, the company has just added four new clerks here.

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Solar Ray Machine to Be Shown at Power Meeting

WASHINGTON, Sept. 1 (UP) — The vanguard of power officials from 50 nations began arriving today for the opening session next Monday of the third world power conference, where experts will discuss some of the future uses of electricity in a world still being revolutionized by this type of energy.

Among the first arrivals was Sir Harold Hartley, British railroad magnate and international president of the conference.

Meeting Every 6 Years
The power conference, a gathering held only once every six years, will be unique in many ways, but probably the most interesting feature of the entire proceedings will be Dr. Charles G. Abbot's first public demonstration of his solar ray machine.

Dr. Abbot, secretary of the Smithsonian Institution, is world famous for his studies of the sun. Solar ray machines have been made before this, but their expense and inefficiency have made them impractical commercially. Dr. Abbot's machine is unique in its simplicity. Its head efficiency compares with that of coal at \$3 a ton.

Translations Planned
Using his device, Dr. Abbot will operate a one-half horsepower engine in his demonstration. The machine may be used to pump water, or utilized in refrigeration, air conditioning, cooking or heating.

Proceedings of the conference, which will be carried on in several languages, will be recorded electrically, and delegates will have headphones at their desks through which they will hear

translations in their own language of papers being read in some foreign tongue.

September 10 the delegates will hold a banquet. Only one place in Washington was found big enough to hold the 3000 expected to attend—the main lobby of the Union station. It will be closed off and especially decorated for the occasion.

Meanwhile exhibits have been prepared at the national museum here of present day uses of power, open to the general public as well as to delegates. They tell the story of how the rural electrification administration is trying to electrify the farm homes of America, illustrate power loads and portray technical subjects. One exhibit is a scale model of Bonneville dam on the Columbia river, complete even to the electric elevators for salmon, thoughtfully provided so that development of power would not destroy the northwest's salmon industry.

Frightened Horse Breaks Girl's Leg

ALTURAS, Calif., Sept. 1.—Virginia Hemm, 16, was severely injured Sunday afternoon when a horse from which she was just dismounting was frightened and ran across the street between a pump and a tree knocking her from the horse and breaking her leg. She was brought to Alturas for treatment. She had been riding in a parade.
