Coast Foreign Trade Booms

GAINS ABOVE 1935 AROUND 20 PER CENT

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 1 (AP)—Pacific coast foreign trade is bringing better cargoes to shipping lines, bigger employment to commercial units, better profits and generally a larger movement of goods in both inbound and outbound trade channels.

Department of commerce figures for June, just released, show an expansion of around 20 per cent over last year. This is around one-third more than the average increase for the preceding portion of the year.

Total foreign trade in and out of ports from Seattle to San Diego amounted to about \$235,435,000 during the January-June period. This compared with \$202,088,000 in round figures for the 1935 half.

Exports, as normal for the Pacific coast, were far larger than imports, totaling \$134,751,849 against \$125,633,255 last year; imports were \$100,683,112 against \$76,454,282 last year.

John J. Judge, district manager of the bureau of foreign and domestic commerce here, pointed out that Washington export accounted for the great part of the coast expansion, though all ports participated in it.

The Washington customs district sent cargoes out to the value of \$29,701,000 in the 1935 first half, against \$23,813,396 in the 1935 half. In June Washington exports were more than double the 1935 rate, totaling \$4,742,586 against \$2,525,325 last year.

Lumber movement, which has been brisk, accounted for a good part of the northwest gain, trade observers said.
