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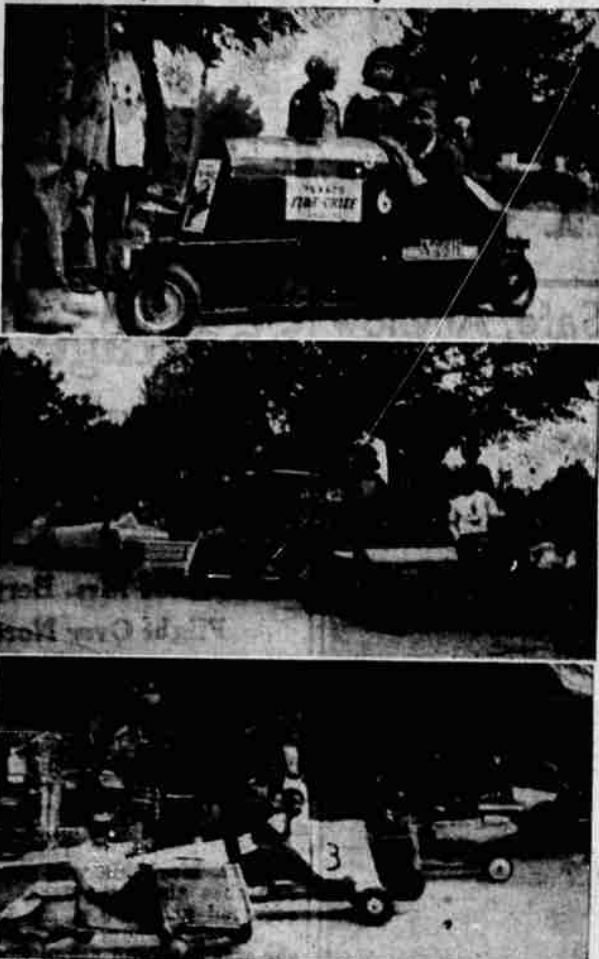

Howard Abbey, Jr., Takes First Place in Soap Box Derby

Several dog fights delayed action Friday afternoon at the start of the second annual Old River Dairy-Locke Motor Company Soap Box derby, as several hundred youngsters stood in the middle of the home stretch to watch the canines battle.

Howard Abbey, Jr., won first in the finals with the splendid time of 35 seconds over a course nearly one-quarter mile long. The Abbey car, with high hood, small

wheels and balloon tires, sped far ahead the full length of Stanley Hendricks in second place in the time of 47 seconds. Buxy Keasterson came in third in 50 seconds.

Others participating in the semi-finals making the course from 51 to 53 seconds were Jack Brown, Don Phelps, Neil Mayfield and Warren McManus.

The car of Dick Katherston was eliminated, declared not eligible, as he received assistance in its construction.

A special heat between the Abbey car and Katherston car showed the Abbey car fastest with time of 38 seconds and Katherston car 40 seconds.

FOREST HILLS, N. Y., Sept. 5 (AP)—There is a new star with an old and famous name in the tennis sky today.

The name is Dorothy May Sutton Bundy—Bundy for her father, Tommy Bundy, national doubles champion with Maurice McLoughlin from 1912 to 1914; May Sutton for her mother, who won the national women's title in 1904; and Dorothy for herself.

A chubby little girl, just turned 20, Dorothy defeated Mrs. Sarah Palfrey Fabry of Brookline, Mass., 2-6, 6-3, 6-4, in the first round of the national women's singles championship yesterday. And since Mrs. Fabry has gone to the finals for the past two years, Dorothy is conceded a chance to repeat her mother's conquest in her first trip east.

Students of the game were impressed by the girl's supreme court confidence and by the sweep and speed of her forehand drives. They point out, also, that she came within a point of beating Alice Marble, the San Francisco star, in the recent Longwood tournament.

Hal Surface, seeded eighth, lost a five-set struggle to Gene Mako of Los Angeles, 3-6, 6-2, 6-4, 6-8, 7-5, in one of the finest matches of the tournament. This was

hardly considered an upset, however, as Mako stands a notch above surface in the national rankings.

In the upper bracket remained Fred Perry, the English favorite, who won in the second round from Ernest Sutter of New Orleans, 6-4, 6-2, 6-1; Mako, Sidney Wood of New York, Jacques Brugnon and Pierre Pelizza of France, Bobby Riggs, the Los Angeles youngster, and Bryan Grant of Atlanta.

Don Budge of Oakland, Calif., leading American hope, had to contend with John McHard, Princeton; Yvon Petra and Bernard Destremau, France; Frankie Parker, Spring Lake, N. J., and Gregory Mangin, New York.

Budge had a surprisingly hard match yesterday in beating Garman Mulloy of Miami, 4-6, 6-2, 6-0, 6-1.

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YANKS HUMBLE LEAGUE RIVALS

New York Wins 10 Games in 12 Despite Serious Handicaps

At last the Yankees have given some indication of just how completely they outclass the rest of the American league.

For weeks the homicide squad has shown that it tops the other seven clubs like a tent, but it took the results of the last two weeks to prove that the outfit is entirely in a class by itself.

For most of the two weeks, Murderers' Row has resembled a base hospital, with at least two and sometimes three members of its first string cast crippled and on the bench. At the same time, the two heaviest hitters, Lou Gehrig and Joe M. Maggiora, have been in their worst slump of the season.

Yet, even the injuries to Bill Dickey, Red Rolfe and Frankie Crosetti—the latter two wrecked the infield—and the weak stick-work of Gehrig and "Dime" Maggiora, in addition to the hardship of running up against four of the toughest outfits in the loop during that time, have had little if any effect.

The Yanks have minded so little, in fact, that they have come through the hard times with a record of ten victories in their last 12 starts, including clashes with the Tigers, White Sox, Indians and Red Sox.

Winding up with a 9-6 victory over the Boston Gold Sox yesterday, on the strength of Tony Lasser's homer with two mates abroad, and despite Jimmy Fox's 16th four-bagger of the season, the Yanks climbed 17 1/2 games out in front of their nearest rivals, the Indians.

At the present writing, they need but eight more triumphs to wrap up the pennant and take it home, and will probably clinch the matter by the tenth of the month.

The defeat for the Red Sox dropped them out of the pennant fight.

The Senators took over sole possession of fourth place from the White Sox in yesterday's curtailed program by trouncing the Athletics 7-3 behind Buck Newsum's effective hurling, while the Chicago contenders were idle.

In the major league front, everyone else had a scheduled day off—the Chicago Cubs picked up half a game on the National league pace-setters, the Giants and the Cardinals. Larry French returned to his top form and shut out the Pirates with seven hits while his mates clubbed out an 8-0 win. This pulled the Cubs up just half a game off the second-place held by the Gas House Gang, and 4 1/2 back of the galloping Giants.

Desire of Coaches to Keep Jobs Hurts Boys, Says Doctor

SALT LAKE CITY, Sept. 5 (AP)—Dr. Clifford Sweet of Oakland, Calif., charged today high school and college coaches are forced to drive young athletes to the breaking point to keep their jobs.

The child specialist spoke before the Utah Medical association.

"The trouble is," he said, "that the coach loses his job if he does not win. They force him to make a devil of himself to stay on the payroll."

"What colleges and high schools should do is hire a man who knows football and is a gentleman. He should be a member of the faculty, and shouldn't be dismissed except for cause."

Dr. Sweet asserted competitive sports are misplaced in high schools.

"It is all right to teach children such fundamentals as how to stand, walk and run, so that muscles will be built up in a balanced way."

"I would have no objection to baseball and basketball—provided they are non-competitive."

"There are many instances of high school athletes being ruined physically. They never do anything athletically after leaving high school because they are burned out."

Fishing News

By the Chamber of Commerce

Odell Lake—Fishing here remains the same and one can generally always make a fairly good catch. The Willamette highway into Odell lake is in good condition. From Odell lake west on this highway, there are 15 miles of summer detour road, which is a forest road requiring about one hour to drive because of the narrowness and sharp turns. The balance of this highway into Eugene is good. This route shortens the distance from Klamath Falls to Eugene to 190 miles and is a very scenic drive.

Crescent Lake—Fishing in this lake has improved and good-sized trout can be caught here by trolling. The road into Crescent lake is in good condition.

Elk Lake—Trotting in this lake has improved, while fly fishing is just beginning to get good. The smaller lakes adjacent to Elk lake still offer very good fishing. Elk lake can be reached from The Dalles-California highway or the Willamette highway over good type forest roads.

Rocky Point—Trotting here continues to be good and few fishermen go away from here disappointed. The West Side highway, Oregon No. 236, to Rocky Point has recently been oiled for the first five miles out of town, but the balance is dirt road which is quite rutty in spots. In some places you can drive 50 miles an hour and in others it is necessary to slow down to 15 or 20 miles an hour.

Harriman Lodge—Good fishing in Harriman creek and Upper Klamath lake. This lodge is reached by the West Side highway and is just about three miles south of Rocky Point.

Lake o' the Woods—Yielding fair catches of bass, perch and sunfish. The road is dusty and quite rough in places. There will be boat racing on the lake Sunday and Monday, Sept. 6 and 7, starting at 2 o'clock. Dancing can be enjoyed at the resort Saturday and Sunday evening.

Four Mile Lake—Fishing here is still good, with silverides being taken by both trolling and deep fishing. This road is materially improved and by the end of the week the road crew will have removed the worst of the rocks.

Grater Lake National Park—All entrances to the park are in very good condition. The rim road is all passable, although there is a portion of it where construction crews are at work.

Weather—The weather has been unsettled the last two days, with occasional showers. Saturday the sun was shining and there is a slight wind. All of the forest roads were improved by the recent rainfall, which tended to settle the dust.

Hunting—The hunting season will be here, with the deer season opening on Sept. 20. Open season for grouse will commence on September 10, for Chinese pheasants and quail on October 1 (in Klamath county), and for ducks and geese on Nov. 1. Hunting conditions should be good this fall. The deer are quite plentiful in the Brush mountain, Buck Lake, Robinson butte and Brown mountain sections; also around the foot of Mt. Laughlin and Four Mile lake. Feed is very good in all parts of the forest and the deer should be in good shape. Blue grouse seem plentiful in all the high country, while quite a number of pheasants have been seen along the creeks and around lakes. According to reports from the biological survey, the wild duck crop on Upper Klamath lake is unusually good and feed is better than usual this year.

HOT PAGE HELD IN COAST PLAY

San Diego, Seattle, Portland Win By Lopsided Scores Friday

Favored Coast league teams, crushing opposition with a deluge of baseballs, continued their winning ways today.

The league-leading Portland Beavers stayed two games ahead of Seattle and San Diego, still a tie for second, as all turned in lopsided victories yesterday. Oakland moved into fourth place by slugging out a 15-10 win over the Reds in a game featured by a brief, but earnest fist fight.

Altogether, 20 pitchers were used in the four league games, with only two going the route. One of these was Tom Flynn of Portland, who hurled an 8-2 victory over the Angels. Flynn spaced 19 hits wisely, while Pay Thomas and young Struss were allowing but six. Four of these came in the first off Thomas, interspersed with two walks for six runs. Nino Bonkiovanni started the inning with a homer, and singled two runners home his second time up in the same frame.

Howard Crashead, the battered professor who has won 14 games since he joined the Padres a few months ago, was the other hurler to go the route. He had a breeze as San Diego hammered four holeless Sacramento flingers for 16 hits and a 13-1 triumph. The Reds even had to call on outfielder Frank Doljack to pitch part of the game.

Seattle kept on even terms with the Padres by blasting the Seals, 16-8. The Indians chased Sam Gibson in the third, and San Francisco shelled Ed Wells out of the game in the fourth. Both teams got 16 hits, but the Tribe slapped out nine extra-base blows, including Hal Spindel's homer with nose on, and Rookie Levi McCormack's circuit swat with one mate aboard.

The Oaks made it three out of four from the Missions after overcoming a six-run spurge by the Reds in the first inning. This hectic chucker was highlighted when Shortstop Eddie Joost crashed into Catcher Willard Herschberger of Oakland while trying to steal home. After the impact, both players got up swinging and when Joost hit the deck it was a signal for other players to join in. Peace was restored without injuries and Umpire Sam Crawford did not eject any players. The Oaks out-hit the Reds, 19-13 but used four pitchers, one more than the losers.
