

Triple Play Helps Ducks Win Series Opener

CASTER BLANKS SEATTLE TEAM

Oakland Gains Advantage in South With Victory Over Padres.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 16 (AP)—A sensational triple play and stout pitching by two of the Coast league's best flingers gave Oakland and Portland a one-up advantage in the penultimate round of the playoffs for the championships today.

George Caster blanked Seattle, 5-0, aided by a rally-throttling triple play, while "Wee Willie" Ludolph subdued the San Diego Padres, 6-3, in the other contest. Winners of four games in the current series play next week for the league title.

Portland's triple-killing came in the third inning, when Caster was in his tightest spot of the evening. Baserunners were on first and second when a batter lined a drive at Shortstop Dudley Lee. He speared the ball, touched second and whipped the ball to Manager Bill Sweeney at first to catch both runners off the bags, and retire the side.

The Beavers drove Kewpie Dick Barrett to cover in the fourth inning with a two-hit sortie, after scoring their initial two runs in the third. Ray Lucas, Don Osborn and Ed Wells allowed one run between them, as Manager Dutch Ruether lifted his pitchers for pinch hitters.

Ludolph, league-leading pitcher, had only one bad inning against San Diego, hurling four hit balls until the eighth. In this frame George Myatt doubled home Beryl Horne and scored when Ted Williams, sensational rookie outfielder, lofted one over the piling. Two singles followed, but Ludolph throttled the rally.

Manuel Salvo, starting Padre pitcher, lasted until the second when he yielded three runs. Little Beryl Horne replaced Mountainous Manuel and had two bad innings in which Oakland scored three more runs.

Third basemen did the heavy hitting, Oakland's Jimmy Hitchcock getting two doubles and a single, and Ernie Holman of San Diego three one-baggers. The teams play in Emeryville and Portland again tonight. If Oakland wins, the teams move to San Diego, but if the Padres coast, another contest will be played in the Acorn park. The northwest teams move to Seattle after tonight's contest.

WOLFE DOWNED BY LARIAT SPIN

Fall Through Ropes Incapacitates Texas Scissors Star.

Mr. Dude Chick is no longer the hero of the armory wrestling mat. Mr. Chick is still undefeated, that is true; but he is no longer the hero.

Perhaps Mr. Chick values victory above heroism, which, on any common sense basis of computing relative merits, seems a very proper evaluation but one with which the armory crowd's hoos boos vociferous disagreement.

At any rate, Mr. Chick defeated Mr. Lee Wolfe of Texas in the armory main event Tuesday night. He did so in the manner which all wrestlers of experience know to be the only possible way under the circumstances.

He was trapped in one of Mr. Wolfe's figure-four scissors, hopelessly trapped, for Mr. Wolfe's long, lean legs were hooked accurately into position and carefully locked.

Caught in this uncomfortable situation, Mr. Chick lunged for the edge of the ring and dumped both himself and his opponent over the ropes and onto the floor.

Mr. Wolfe unhappily landed on the bottom, and his wrestling prowess from there on out was seriously hindered. He managed to make it back to the canvas, but soon fell victim to a punishing headlock and, shortly afterward, to a lariat spin, which brought Mr. Chick the second fall and the match. Mr. Wolfe was too badly incapacitated by his whirl through the air to return for a third session. Time of the fall was 5:38.

Mr. Wolfe had previously won a fall in 22:07 by application of the same hook scissors. On that occasion Mr. Chick did not attempt a plunge through the ropes, either because he felt that there was yet time for such drastic action or because he was too weary and surprised.

Joe Hubka made short work of Blacksmith George Craig in the semi-windup, once he got his rocking-chair scissors in operation. Craig made matters un-

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YANKS SET NEW RECORDS DAILY

Pennant Won, New York Turns to Abolishing Old Standards.

From the looks of things, the fellows who keep the record books are going to do a lot of overtime work when this big league baseball season ends, trying to catch up with those run-away Yankees.

Not satisfied with the dozen or so marks they've already shattered as a team, and others varied individuals seem on the way to breaking, the homicide squad is going right along smashing new ones about every other day.

Only last Sunday, they eclipsed the home run and extra base records. Since then, they've already posted a new run-making mark by a pennant winning club, piling up the amazing total of 1016 tallies to surpass the 1004 of the champion Cardinals of 1930.

While the hot National league fight took a day off Tuesday, rain washing out the entire program and giving the Giants a rest before they pick up the job of preserving their 4½ game lead, the Yanks advanced a step nearer a couple of more marks by banging three White Sox pitchers for a 7-1 victory.

As a result, the record for extra base wallops, runs batted in, total bases, and a few others may go before the season ends. Already behind the ball-killing crew, in addition to the homer and extra base records, are such as most runs-batted-in in one game, most homers in two consecutive games, most years leading the league in homers, most years and most consecutive years 100 or more homers, and a tie with the tough one of three homers in one inning.

There's a very good chance, too, that they'll post a new league mark for the biggest lead by a pennant winner over the rest of the pack—their victory Tuesday having left them only a game and a half away from it. And, by clinching the American league flag a week ago Wednesday, they took the title on the earliest date in league history, so far as available records show.

Their victory Tuesday came close to being a heart-breaker,

Other results: Eddie Spina, Portland, knocked out Dick Stokes, Seattle, in the first; Jack Drews, Salem, won a decision from Kid Thornley, Silverton, Ore., in four rounds; Harry Kinsey, Portland, knocked out Al Smith, Salem, in the first round.

Games Cancelled As Owens Banned

NEW YORK, Sept. 16 (UP)—The Caledonian games scheduled for Thursday night at the Yankee stadium were called off last night due to the warning of the Metropolitan association of the amateur athletic union that Jesse Owens, Olympic sprint star, must not be advertised and could not compete. The announcement came after the metropolitan division of the A. A. U. had moved against the suspended negro triple Olympic victor, who was suspended for failure to go through with a post-Olympic track meet in Stockholm after he allegedly had agreed to compete there.

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PELICANS WAIT FIRST CONTEST

Mixture of Veteran, New Material Will Face Lakeview Friday.

A mixture of veteran and untried material will probably be presented to Klamath Falls football fans Friday night when Coach Les Ayritt sends his 1936 eleven out on Modoc field to tangle with Lakeview high in the season's opener.

As the squad has been working out in practice, the first string line is composed almost entirely of new men seasoned at center and right tackle by Veterans Ralph Taylor and Mack Timms.

Backing up the line, however, is a string of experienced ball carriers including Ducky Meyers, Clarence Redkey, Gino Carnini, Dom Giovanni and Pete Green from last year's team and Archie Anderson from the 1935 Wildcats.

Earl Atkins, who was counted on to bolster the backfield, has not yet shown up for practice, and the coaching staff is not even certain that he is in town.

Lakeview's strength so far is an unknown quantity, and until Coach Red McDonald's boys have shown their stuff under active playing conditions, Ayritt will not know whether he will have to leave his first string in for the entire game to pull out a victory or whether he will be able to give his whole squad a workout.
