

Klamath Swamps Lakeview in Season Opener

BUCKS DOWNED BY 56-0 SCORE

Blocked Kicks, Pass Interceptions Lead to Visitors' Downfall.

Led by a quintet of ball carriers each of whom starred at his own particular specialty, and a rugged line which set the opposition back on its heels, Klamath Pelicans ran wild over the Lakeview Buckaroos on Monday night to mark up an overwhelming victory in their first start of the season.

It ended—if the scorekeeper didn't overlook a touchdown or so in the last quarter—at 56 to 0, and the Klamath total was mounting by the minute by the time the final gun sounded.

It didn't start off at any such pace, however. The plucky Bucks, outwitted and outnumbered, held the Pelicans to six points in the first quarter, the single score coming late in the period when Dom Giovannini, in the tailback position, cut around left tackle and dashed 40 yards through a broken field to the last white stripe. An end run for the extra point was stopped.

Klamath added two more touchdowns before the end of the half, capitalizing on Lakeview's short punts from deep in its own territory.

As the second quarter opened, Pelican Pete Green regained all but three yards of a kick from the Lakeview 15-yard line before he was downed. From 18 yards out Giovannini took the ball to the Buck 3-yard marker, then plunged on across after an intervening try by Carnini had failed.

A pass, Giovannini to Benson, brought one of the only two points after touchdown scored by Klamath in nine tries during the course of the evening.

A second score was registered in the same quarter by much the same formula. Lakeview, unable to get anywhere after Redkey's kickoff had carried to the goal line and been returned to the 12, kicked out to its own 30. Captain Ducky Myers and Pete Green promptly swung into action with passes and end runs to move up to the Lakeview 8-yard line. From there Green picked his way through a hole in the Buckaroo line to a touchdown. A pass for the extra point fell incomplete.

The half ended shortly after the Pelicans with the score 19-0 for the Pelicans.

Coach Red McDonald's eleven came back from the locker rooms after the rest period with a do-or-die passing attack which gained them triple the yardage they had rung up in the first half but also coupled with a pair of blocked kicks cost them twice the number of points they had conceded to the Pelicans in the opening periods.

Sparked by Bussey and Van Keulen, a couple of backs any coach would be happy to see perform under his colors, they started immediately following the kickoff with a 30-yard completed pass which carried them to midfield from far back in their own territory. Another pass, Van Keulen to Curry, was fumbled when an ambitious Klamath tackler grabbed the receiver too soon, but Lakeview made 15 yards anyway on the resulting penalty.

About that time, however, the Buckaroo passing attack temporarily bogged down. The next one was incomplete and the one after good, but for no yardage.

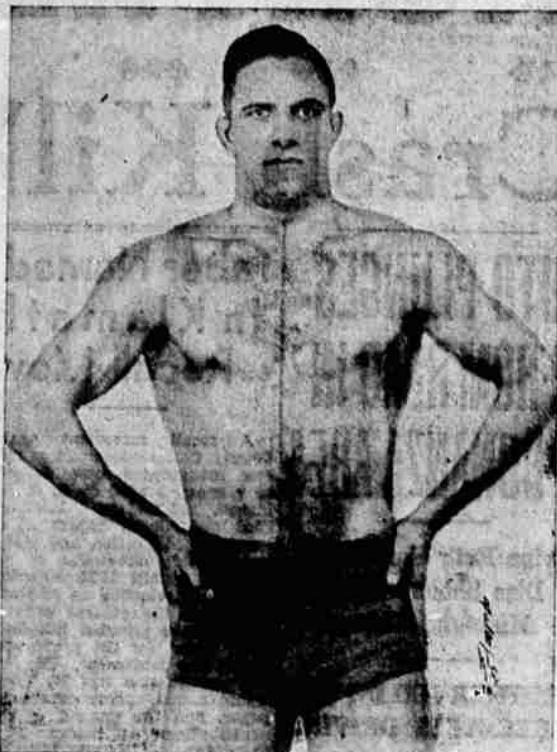
Then Klamath blocked a Lakeview pass, recovered the ball, lost it again when one of its own passes was intercepted, itself intercepted Lakeview's first pass thereafter and scored the first of six second-half touchdowns with Myers packing the ball.

Giovannini's toss, Redkey brought the last point after touchdown and boosted the Klamath total to 26.

Disregarding the hint contained in this disastrous interception, Lakeview returned immediately to its aerial attack, then returned again and again after each subsequent Klamath touchdown on pass interceptions just as soon as the Bucks got their hands on the ball.

Sale of Cincinnati Team to Cards' Owner Stirs League

The baseball spotlight was drilled today on the Cardinals and Reds, and the possible changes in their organizations, to the virtual exclusion of the Cubs in second place in the National league, and Lou Gehrig's 1500th consecutive game with the New York Yankees.

While the Giants maintained an almost unbeatable lead of five games in the hot National league race, and Gehrig put on his spikes and glove to add another milestone to the greatest of all iron-man records, the diamond public was asking these questions:

(1)—Will Branch Rickey, the man who played a major part in the successful run of the Cardinals during the last ten years, buy a controlling interest in the Cincinnati Reds, along with Merrill Russell, a director of the Columbus (American association) Redbirds?

(2)—Will Warren Giles, president of the Cards' International league farm at Rochester, N. Y., be named to succeed Larry MacPhail, resigned vice president and general manager of the Reds?

The two questions—and their answers—appear interlocking. Denials were the only replies to the published report that Rickey and Russell would buy the Reds. One source emphasized that Powell Crosley, Jr., president of the club, is too rapid a fan to sell his interests.

However, it was pointed out in some quarters that the mention of Giles as successor to MacPhail, the man who introduced night baseball to the big leagues, may be in line with the report that

The Pelicans showed plenty of stuff and also plenty of weaknesses during their evening's workout. The line from end to end turned in a creditable performance in holding Lakeview to two first downs from scrimmage and the backfield revealed unsuspected versatility. Dom Giovannini, transformed tackle, put on a display of speed which surprised the fans who had looked on him simply as a good-for-anything-or-two line plunger.

But the Klamath pass defense was pitifully weak, the kicking short and uncertain, and the offense occasionally ragged.

Green was high point man for the game with three touchdowns for a total of 18. Other scorers: Giovannini 12, Myers 12, Redkey 7, Carnini 6, Benson 1.

The victory, however, failed to disturb the five-game lead of the idle Giants, who are just about "in" for the pennant.

The American league also put on a curtailed program, with the Tigers knocking off the Indians 8-3 in one game, and the Browns beating the White Sox 4-5 in the other.

Tommy Bridges stopped the Tribe with four hits in posting his 22nd win of the year, as Detroit's ex-world champions pinned back the ears of young Bob Feller with a game-clinching four-run rally in the sixth, and moved into a virtual tie with the White Sox for second place.

A five-run spree in the third featured the Browns' victory over the White Sox, but just to put the clincher on, "Sunny Jim" Bottomley belted a homer in the seventh for what turned out to be the winning marker.

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Fischer Enters Golf Final With Scotch Expert

GARDEN CITY, N. Y., Sept. 19 (AP)—It's up to Johnny Fischer.

On the slim shoulders of the Cincinnati mailman's son today rested America's last hope of regaining the steady reputation drive of Jack McLean, a Scot who has ideas and a chance of taking the U. S. amateur golf championship trophy across the Atlantic ocean for the first time in a quarter of a century.

McLean, the whiskey-selling Scotchman from Glasgow who first was given a golf club when he was 2 years old, was the man who stood at the barrier of the rain-soaked, wind-churned Garden City club course.

Out of the worst storm ever to strike a national amateur battle-ground, emerged Fischer and the straight hitting Scot to enter the finals of the 40th championship. Fischer, a 24-year-old student at Cincinnati Law school, gained the title round by beating the slightly-favored Johnny Goodman of Omaha, 2 and 1, in a match that was so close and dramatic that it was squared 11 times. The Omaha blond drew level in the rain seven of those times with a fighting heart that finally was beaten on the 35th green as the rain and wind sounded taps for him.

Using the same human stepping stones to the finals that T. Philip Perkins of England used eight years ago in reaching the finals, McLean breezed in to join Fischer. More accustomed to the treacherous wind than his older American rival, the slight Scot pulled away to a six up lead at noon and merely loafed along with the wind in the afternoon to crush 42-year-old George Voigt of New York, 8 and 7.

Sportsmen Wait Hunting Season Opening Sunday

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 19 (AP)—Thousands of Oregon hunters eyed the skies anxiously today for one of the sportsmen's best reasons—the deer season opens at sun-up tomorrow.

Seventy thousand hunting licenses have been sold—an increase of 10,000 over last year, registration stations reported.

The individual quota—one buck mule deer with forked horns or two Columbia black-tailed bucks with similar adornment.

Thanks to recent rains, the greater part of the state's forests are open. Closed areas, the U. S. forest service said, include portions of Umatilla national forest near Fort Heaven and township 31 north Range 35 east, Malheur forest around Bear Valley and the Deschutes forest near Paulina lake is closed to smoking only.
