## TEAMS STRONG IN LETTERMEN

### Corvallis, Eugene Clubs Will Open Season Two Weekends Hence.

America's annual coronation ceremony for king football loomed a short two weeks away as dress rehearsals opened at the University of Oregon and Oregon State college Thursday.

Coaches Prink Callison and Lon Stiner each expected some 15 aspirants on hand, both counted returning lettermen with satisfaction.

The State college squad goes to Moscow for an initial tilt with the University of Idaho September 25.

Callison's Ducks make their debut under lights against UCLA at Los Angeles on the night of September 24.

Corvallis reports indicate Stiner would depend entirely on veterans against the Vandals, who will be cheered by the patron saint of Idaho athletics, Wallace Beery, the screen actor. A tentative lineup consisted of Don Coons and Joe Wendick, ends; Frank Nihil and John Watts, tackles; Frank Ramsey and Prescott Hutchins, guards; Jim Orr, center; Bill Duncan, quarter; Joe Gray and Dick Joslin, halfbacks, and Elmer Kolbers, fullback.

Callison announced no Webfoot starters, but had 15 veterans to draw from, including Vern Moore, center; Captain Tony Amato, Joe Huston, Nello Giovanni and Chan Berry, guards; Bill Foskett, Bill Estes and Chuck Bracher, tackles; John Yerby and Bub Robertson, ends, and Arleigh Bentley, Jim Nicholson, Hank Nilsson, Dave Lasselle and Don Kennedy, backs.

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 9 (AP)—Los Angeles' double bid for the Pacific coast conference championship—USC and UCLA—called out two beefy squads of gridiron hopefuls for the first workout of autumn today.

Howard Harding Jones, head man at Troy, started the fire-works he hopes will boom Southern California back to national football ranking by reorganizing his coaching staff and dropping the two-team idea.

"It worked all right until the boys began not to care which team they were on. This year with only one team to make, I think the boys will be fighting to get in the lineup," Jones said.

Westwood W. 11 Spaulding, starting his 31st season as a coach with boisterous enthusiasm tempered by doubts about his vanished linemen, had 75 Bruins answering his call at the University of California at Los Angeles.

With backfield men springing up like mushrooms in his squad but lacking forwards, Spaulding hoped that reserves, sophomores and junior college transfers might plug the gaps in the UCLA line.

The Bruins oppose Oregon at the coliseum September 24, and against that reckoning Westwood will intend to concentrate on offense in two workouts daily. The defense, if it can, will take care of itself, he indicated.

The Trojans' first game is with the College of the Pacific September 25. A week later they play Washington, 1936 champion.

## Giants Restore Pro Football Glory By Beating Collegians

NEW YORK, Sept. 9 (AP)—Thanks to the New York Giants' 14 to 7 victory over the eastern all-star college eleven, professional football today had regained some of the prestige lost in recent encounters with the star-studded college outfits.

The Giants made it two in a row over the collegians in a game played at the Polo grounds last night for the benefit of the Herald-Tribune fresh air fund, but had several uncomfortable moments.

The game ended just after Mickey Koberky of Trinity had passed the Collegians 78 yards to the Giants' two-yard marker. Needing only one yard for a first down or two for a touchdown, the collegians were confronted by a stone wall that held battering Stu Smith to the line of scrimmage, and 33,000 fans went home, singing the praises of the team put together in three weeks by wily Andy Kerr of Colgate.

After playing the pros off their feet in the first quarter, the collegians struck quick and hard in the second period. Lew Elverson set the stage by a 18-yard punt return. A smooth passing attack, engineered by Koberky, took the ball 39 yards to the one-yard marker from where Vannie Albanese, injured Syracuse ace, plunged over.

### Cardinal Boss Suggests Year on Shelf for Great Diz.

The St. Louis Cardinals looked very much Thursday as if they were sharpening up a knife for the purpose of cutting off their collective nose to spite their equally collective face.

If they were really serious about suggesting a year's retirement suggestion and were not just talking to throw a scare into baseball's No. 1 blower-offer, it would seem they'd be doing themselves more harm than good by shelving the greatest pitching arm in the game for that length of time, despite his eccentricities.

The row started by Branch Rickey with the retirement suggestion and followed up by Dean's plaintiff plea for permission to trade himself, took the stage away from anything in the big time Thursday. Playing second fiddle to the Rickey-Dean brass were such other developments as the Grimes as chief umpire batter and manager of the Brooklyn Dodgers; the continuation of the Giants' 23-game lead in the National League race; the widening of the Yankees' American league edge to 12 full games and the rise of Pittsburgh to third place in the National league and Cleveland to fourth in the American.

The Cards may have their reasons for talking about packing Diz's arm—as well as his ability to talk it out with anyone in the game—in mothballs for a year. These would include, of course, the fact that such a move would, as Rickey described it, "act as a tonic and build up his baseball morale as well as his arm."

But on the other hand Dizzy has given no evidence that his pitching warrants a year's retirement—and when he's right, he's somewhat better than a cross hand at flogging an in. His all-aroundness of the moment, he contends, are at worst only temporary. He's still one of the game's big drawing cards, as well as a piece of ivory that could return a tidy sum on the open market.

He certainly didn't look ready for a wheel chair Wednesday as he pitched a five-hitter against the Cubs. Although he lost, 4-9, largely because of the clouting of Gabby Hartnett, a five-hitter isn't exactly getting your ears pinned back.

The victory for the Cubs enabled them to stay within shouting distance of the Giants, who had their hands full before pulling out a 9-7 decision over their best-loved "haters," the Dodgers.

The Yanks pulled two games out of the fire against the Red Sox. They took the opener, 3-2, with a run in the ninth and then dropping the curtain raiser, 6-1. The Pirates pounded the Reds, 7-6, in 10 frames and 8-2 in nine.

Four well-pitched games found the Phillies splitting with the Bees, and the Athletics doing the same with the Senators. The Phils won 6-3 and lost 1-0. The A's won 2-0 and then went down 1-0. The White Sox socked the Browns, 10-1.

## CARTER FACES SUPREME TEST

### Missourian Billed Against Les Wolfe in Armory Main Event.

A supreme test for Marshall Carter, newly-crowned champion of the armory wrestling mat, appears in prospect next Tuesday night, when the ex-Missourian pedagogue of pull tangles with Les Wolfe, a good boy gone wrong with a vengeance.

Mack Lillard announced Thursday that he matched the pair for next week's top main event with the hope the bout would prove conclusively one way or the other whether Carter is just lucky or whether he really packs the goods.

About half the fans, Lillard says, believe that Carter's victory over Toots Estes last Tuesday was more or less accidental, while the other half are of the opinion that the Missourian is just a little too clever for the rest of the boys currently hanging around the mats, as well as being pretty well equipped with all the other attributes essential to grappling success.

Wolfe is expected to represent the ultimate in trial boys. Whether he chooses to be mean or clean, the lanky Texan has never been accused of shortchanging either himself or the public on brainwork, and his newly adopted roughhouse style is calculated to make things extremely tough for Carter, who so far in his local career has had to worry only about leverage and not about larpaps.

A second feature of the evening tussles Gorilla Pogi, the Argentine assassin, against Toots Estes, who temporarily at least, forfeits main event rating because of his defeat at Carter's hands.

Pogi gave Sailor Dick Trout a multitude of unhappy moments last time out, before the latter managed to connect with a series of his double-barreled dropkicks. Even so Trout might not have made off with the victory if his efforts had not been bolstered by the donation of a fall on a foul. Pogi figures to give Estes the same treatment.

Next week's program will open with an engagement between Trout and young Zibby Zyzosko. Both lads are clever and scrupulously clean, and their imminent meeting may prove the stand-out attraction of the evening.

Bobby Wazner, New England champ in two divisions, will stay on the fringe of activity until the spot where his tonsils once were gets the benefit of another week's healing. He will return.

## Dodger Chief Grimes Given New Contract

BROOKLYN, Sept. 9 (AP)—National league umpire take warning—Burt Grimes will be back managing the Brooklyn Dodgers again next season.
