Situated at 133 South Eighth street, the store site Sears occupies fronts 120 feet on Eighth street and has a depth of 87 feet on Klamath avenue. The adjoining one-story building, which contains an area of appreximately 10,000 an area of appreximately following square feet is being used as a warehouse with ample space for free automobile tire and battery servicing facilities. sion of the company.
