NEW YORK, March 25 (AP)—Stocks crashed through support levels in today's market, many tumbling to new lows for the past three years or longer with losses running to five or more points.

Blame for the collapse was placed on a combination of circumstances, including fears of fresh troubles in France, doubts over business prospects for the near term and general discouragement of stockholders over recent ineffectual attempts at rallies.

There were occasional moderately cheering news items, but these, it was said, could not outweigh the gloom which has again descended upon speculative and investment circles.

Volume picked up on the back-swing and the ticker tape was better than the close. Transfers approximated 1,400,000 shares.
