Why Hungary Goes Along With Reich



The map above shows why once-powerful Hungary has reason to line up with Hitler's Germany. The visit of Regent Nicholas Horthy, left, Hungary's "unrowned king," to Berlin has brought reports that henceforth Hitler will be allowed to use Hungary as a springboard for economic penetration in the Balkans in return for formidable military protection. The Little Entente—composed of Czechoslovakia, Yugoslavia and Rumania, all of which countries gained large chunks of Hungary after the war—opposes German-Hungarian friendship because of Hungary's key position. Hitler reportedly has guaranteed the boundaries of Hungary, and the Entente fears both Germany and Hungary will benefit territorially at the Entente's expense.

(Left)—Tumbled and old, this is the Gold Hill "crazy house" in which one cannot stand up straight, in which plumb lines show a bow, around which no birds will nest in trees that lean strangely, and in which, if he stays long enough, a man develops a strangely dizzy feeling.



(Above)—A broom can be balanced on its brush in the "crazy house," held erect, apparently, by the pull of the "force" that permeates the area.

(Circle)—A ball rolls on the level, slowly and evenly and for an apparent reason, in the "crazy house." Here (circle) a mechanically leveled board is shown inside the house, a golf ball rolling away from the man's hand.

OREGON'S "CRAZY HOUSE" Baffles Science

Four miles from Gold Hill, Oregon, stands a dilapidated shack, built some thirty years ago as a mine away office. Ten years ago it slid down hill from its original position to land squarely in the center of a 125-foot circle, within whose bounds there operates, or appears to operate, a strange "force".

A person standing in this tilted shack leans, or appears to lean, as much as 7 1/2 degrees from the normal vertical position of the body. In the area are other strange upsets in the laws of gravity and other natural laws. What the "force" is no one definitely knows.

While standing in one of the rooms in this "Mystery House" a gold ball may be thrown into the

air but the ball, in descending describes a wide arc in the opposite direction away from this strange "force", as if blown by a gust of wind. Anyone standing in this area cannot help leaning toward magnetic north, regardless of what direction he may face.

Whether fact or fancy, a 25-lb. weight suspended as a plumb bob on a rope may be pushed toward magnetic north more easily than magnetic south. The plumb line shows a distinct "bow" in the direction opposing magnetic north, that is, 22 degrees west of true south—but you can't pull the bow out of the line. Tense within this area all lean without exception toward magnetic south. An ordinary exposure-meter used by a photographer, which tests the intensity of light by photo-
