Thus far, no filing has been entered by the state tax commission as to whether job insurance benefits are income for the purposes of state taxes, but payment of benefits did not tax, in any instance, 1938, no income, if any

The internal revenue bureau ruling involves benefits which may approach \$6,000,000 by the end of the year, commission officials said. Distribution already has reached \$4,300,000 a year more than 25,000 claimants have exhausted their credits for this year.

As contrasted with other forms of assistance, unemployment compensation is based upon earnings in base year and is paid as a matter of right instead of a matter of need.

The maximum total amount of benefits payable to any eligible individual during any benefit year is limited by the law not to exceed one-sixth of his total wages during his base year or 16 times his weekly benefit amount, whichever is the lesser.
