GROWTH OF BAR SAID TOO FAST

SAN FRANCISCO, July 14 (UP)—The growth of the American Bar association in the last five years has been too rapid to be healthy, and oversteering committees have resulted in inefficiency, Charles A. Beardsley, Oakland, told the concluding session of the 62nd annual convention here today.

Beardsley, in his inaugural address, blamed this condition partly on the fact that "lawyers like to see their names in print." After the new president asked for broad powers to abolish advisory and associate committees, and urged the assembly to revoke the power of other groups, a move to curb the activities of the bill of rights committee was rejected.

Among the recommendations made by Beardsley was: Immediate discontinuance of all state committees on procedure reform, striking 393 names from the official list, with necessary duties being assumed by state and local bar associations. Abolition of committees which duplicate each other. Vesting of powers in the president to discontinue associate and advisory committees on adjournment of the next annual meeting and to reduce the membership of standing and special committees.

A new engine, with a rating of 2000 horsepower, and said to be the world's largest and most powerful air-cooled aircraft engine, is now being installed on army military planes in the United States.

GRAIN RALLIES ON CHICAGO MARKET

CHICAGO, July 15 (AP)—Grain prices staged a brisk rally today after declining 1/2 to more than a cent a bushel in some cases early in the session and quotations in most pits closed near yesterday's final levels.

Corn tumbled more than a cent to 42 1/2c for July, a new five-year low, but then recovered all of the loss.

Wheat was off about 1/2 cent at one stage but closed very little, if any, changed from yesterday. More favorable weather over much of the grain belt stimulated some of the early selling but the decline brought out some short covering in the way of accepting profits on previous sales. Forecast of little rain and above normal temperatures in northern and central great plains regions the coming week encouraged some purchasing.

Wheat closed unchanged to 1/2c lower compared with yesterday's finish, July 66c, September 66 1/2c; corn unchanged to 1/2c higher, July 44c, September 45 1/2c; oats 1/2c off to 1/2c higher.

Among the New Books

Summer books, both "light and heavy," continue to arrive at the Klamath Falls city library and through the courtesy of Mrs. Embert Fossum, member of the library staff, the following brief reviews of new books have been written.

MEXICO MARCHES, By Jaime Plenn—This is an account of the recent history of Mexico, particularly of the last two or three years. It discusses the expropriation of British and American oil properties, the Cardenas regime, education, and the growth of nationalism and fascist influence in Mexico.

Only a newspaper man, and a good one, could have written this snappy volume with its nonchalant touches of real poetry, its quick dash from topic to topic, its utilization of the dramatic to constant obsession with news flashes, its deep concern with the human interest angle, its wry bitterness—all in sinewy prose.

The book is as jerky and jagged as the profiles of the Mexican Sierras, and yet it achieves structural harmony and is filled with a quiet passion that holds it to its purpose like a strong balance wheel. Up until now the writers on Mexico, have, with rare exceptions, called joyfully on the surface. But this book opens up current Mexico in such engaging and informal fashion as to leave breathless gratitude in the hearts of all confirmed enthusiasts for that bewildering land.

THEY WANTED TO LIVE, By Cecil Roberts—This is a sequel to "Victoria, Four-thirty," which appeared several years ago. Here Cecil Roberts follows the fortunes of the station porter, Jim Brown, a character in the previous novel, after he wins a football pool of \$5000 and marries Lizzie Parrish, a waitress. The ensuing honeymoon on the continent, leads to their meeting a number of unusual people, visiting Budapest and other of the great Hungarian estates, and matching with personal tragedy the tragedy of Czechoslovakia.

While to the more thoughtful the book's moral may seem a little too pat, its characters a trifle too expertly assorted and paired, the plot a trifle too much on the Hollywood side, no one will deny the expert writing, the brilliant pen pictures of central Europe, and the book's mounting excitement. Readers who like to be carried out of themselves by a story (and who doesn't) will certainly enjoy this intelligent English novel which moves so swiftly against its cosmopolitan up-to-the-minute background.

NORWAY: CHANGING AND CHANGELESS, By Agnes Rothery—Once more the author has traveled to her beloved Scandinavia and brought back a travel book which tells the tourist what to see and how to see it, but also includes much of history and social conditions, many anecdotes of people and places. The book is illustrated with numerous fine photographs taken by the author's husband.

Life is so short for such an eager observer that often in writing about impressive scenery or

quiet art she employs adjectives as exciting as those used by sports writers to describe a football game. Miss Rothery's revelation of Norway is all that one could ask for in 300 pages turned out at white heat. If her narrative is breathless, her appendices and bibliographies are calm and authentic. The illustrations are always original and personal as well as professional; for her husband photographs as excitingly as she writes.

THE HOLY TERROR, By Herbert G. Wells—This is the story of the rise and fall of one Rud Whitlow, who began life as a particularly nasty little English schoolboy; rose, after two wars, to immense heights as world dictator; and finally died, a madman, killed by the last man in whom he had any trust. It is a lively and penetrating novel, it drops pat with all its magnificent bounce and optimism at a moment of such tension and dismay that one can scarce forbear to cheer.

With as much energy and inventiveness as though he had been born in 1916 instead of 1866, Wells tears into a great and eventful tale of the world's future. It is a superb narrative, the old art of fiction as it was before Mr. O'Brien began waving his leaden laurels above the heads of plotless and characterless young writers. The conclusion may be too neat in view of the desperate means that procure it, but it is as credible as today's own news.
