

CAMPAIGN FOR SUMP PROJECT WILL CONTINUE

Oregon's representatives in Washington D. C. are continuing the fight to obtain appropriations for the Tulelake sump project, according to a letter received here by the Klamath county chamber of commerce, from Congressman Walter M. Pierce.

Said Pierce in a recent communication: "In regard to the appropriations to commence the tunnel from Tulelake to Lower Klamath lake, the committee on deficiency appropriations has ruled that the demand for the tunnel and pump plant to fill Lower Klamath lake is an emergency and not a deficiency, and therefore does not fall within the law or rules under which the deficiency committee works."

"There is still a chance, however, that the senate will put it in when the deficiency bill gets to them, and we may be able to sustain it in the house. Much depends upon the attitude of the reclamation service," Pierce continued.

Pierce also remarked, in the communication, that he was working with Senator Charles McNary on the project which they hope to obtain for this section.

Picard Smiles As Birdie Wins PGA Title Cup

NEW YORK, July 17 (AP)—Henry Picard, whose "frozen" face has been seen at practically all the major golf tournaments for 15 years, finally has proved he can smile.

He turned on a big grin Saturday when he sank his putt for a birdie on the 37th hole at the Pomonok country club and thus defeated Open Champion Byron Nelson in the final match for the National PGA title.

Someone asked him about it and Picard said:

"I've been trying to win a big one all my life, and I decided to wait until I did before I smiled."

His sharpshooting during the week-long tourney gave him the lead in the Vardon trophy competition with 393 points to Nelson's 353. The \$1100 prize money brought him winning's for the year up to \$8177. And with the title automatically went a place on the Ryder cup team which will meet the British pros in Florida in November.

HIGHWAY OFFICIALS VISIT IN KLAMATH

Acquainting a new member of the Oregon state highway commission with roads and highways in eastern Oregon was the purpose of a visit of the highway group in this section Saturday and Sunday.

Huron Clough, new member of the commission and resident of Canyonville, accompanied four veteran highway officials on the motorcade. In the party were R. H. Baldock, state highway engineer, J. N. Bishop, state maintenance engineer, H. G. Smith, state construction engineer, and W. E. Chandler, division engineer located at Bend.

The party arrived here Saturday night and dinner was arranged for the commission, the county court and members of the roads and highways committee of Klamath county chamber of commerce, at the Willard hotel.

The commissioners left early Sunday morning for Lakeview and planned to be in Burns for lunch, continuing from there to Ontario where they were to spend Sunday night. From Ontario the route lay over the Old Oregon Trail to La Grande where the party planned to remain Monday night, later going to Pendleton to be joined by E. B. Aldrich, commissioner, and from there going to Portland.

The gathering of the commission, county court and chamber of commerce men was more of an informal get-together than a round table discussion of highways in this part of the state, according to a member of the group.

PTA NOTES

The pre-school examination of children sponsored by the Parent-Teachers association and known as the "summer round-up," has been brought to a successful conclusion under the capable leadership of Mrs. A. A. Montgomery, county chairman. Sixteen schools participated in the clinics which were all held at the county health unit on Pine street with the exception of Bly, where local facilities were used. A total of 221 children were examined.

The splendid cooperation of the nurses and the conveniences of the health unit were greatly appreciated and the committee decided to accept Dr. Peter H. Rosendal's offer of the use of the clinic next year. The doctors who contributed their time and skill to make the project possible also have the gratitude of the entire Parent-Teachers association.

The local chairmen will continue the follow-up work during the summer with the assistance of the county and city health nurses. A check-up will be made of each child examined to discover if the necessary medical care has been given and the child is in good physical condition to enter school. This follow-up work is to be completed by September 1 and it is hoped the parents will cooperate with the local chairmen in this respect.
