Government Profits

ONE gets so accustomed to the government these days as a sort of universal and cosmic bag-holder for all the losing propositions an ingenious country can toss into its lap, that it is a pleasure to record a venture which netted the government a cool million or more in net profits.

This was the philatelic agency of the Postoffice Department, which reports that it sold \$1,312,016 worth of stamps in the year ended June 30.

These were not stamps for which the government had to provide postal service in return. They were sold to stamp collectors who, for some reason that must remain forever inscrutable to non-collectors, were willing to pay well for them and never use them.

Such sales are practically 100 per cent profit for the government. In his own way Postmaster General Jim Farley is evidently doing his best to stamp out the deficit by keeping cool—and collected.

3. The quickest way to gain weight is a) drink more water; b) sleep more; c) eat more; d) walk more; e) eat more meat.
4. Sunstroke is due to a) too much light; b) too much heat; c) insufficient water; d) over-eating; e) over-exercise.
5. Hay fever is due to a) the climate; b) the heat; c) eating grass; d) pollens of hay; e) all kinds of pollens.

ANSWERS:
 1. What is commonly called an athletic heart is one which has enlarged to permit more work exactly as the muscles elsewhere in the body enlarge with continued work. Certain types of athletics, such as rowing, long-distance swimming and six-day bicycle riding, may damage the heart.

2. According to computations of insurance authorities the average man of 40 is valued at \$25,724. If he is in a \$2500 maximum income class, and \$45,500 if he is in a \$5000 maximum earning class.

3. Ninety per cent of healthy people can gain weight simply by eating more food, particularly carbohydrates.

4. Sunstroke is really heat stroke and is associated with insufficient salt in the body accompanied by evaporation of water from the surface. Profuse sweating robs the body of salt. In summer extra salt should be taken with food and water.

5. The symptoms typical of hay fever may be produced by the pollens of plants, grasses or trees or by the dandruff or hair of animals, by lint, feathers, foods or any other substance to which the human being may be sensitive.

NEWS BEHIND THE NEWS

WASHINGTON, July 17 — The approval which Jesse Jones, the new federal loan administrator, gave to the invisible spending program may have sounded warm enough in print—but not to the guiding geniuses behind the legislation who heard the testimony. They frowned inwardly, issued a hurry call to Treasury Secretary Morgenthau to testify early this week to offset Mr. Jones.

Lender Jones, instead of saying the new presidential program was a great idea which would make a higher standard of living, etc., etc., said what he thought.

What he thought was that the loans would be self-liquidating if they were "properly made," that the interest provision of the legislation was a puzzle which should be simplified, that he had another remedy for the railroads phase, and that the legislation would not provide anything like as much spending as the \$3,600,000,000 authorization in it indicated (because proffered loans would not be grabbed up fast).

In fact Mr. Jones seemed to leave the impression with some that much of the proposed invisible spending was now being done in nearly sufficient quantity to meet real needs.

To give you an example:

When Mr. Jones objected that the restriction against an interest rate of 1 per cent higher than the general treasury interest rate did not take into consideration the premium now being paid for treasury bonds, Senate Majority Leader Barkley broke in and said the government did not want to make any money out of invisible spending.

Jones smiled and replied in effect: "Don't worry the government won't make any money" out of these loans.

Mr. Barkley thereupon revised his observation and said what he meant was the government wanted no profit in interest. But nearly everyone understood both Bark-

ley and Jones the first time. And they understood Mr. Jones did not think the government would collect all these loans.

TRAPPED

As Mr. Jones is slated to administer part of these loans his testimony made a greater impression inside than outside. But as Tommy Corcoran, whose movements are always confidential, spent last Sunday out at the farm of Emil Schramm, new administrator of RFC under Mr. Jones, perhaps the Jones testimony is not indicative of how the program will be carried out. Mr. Schramm is a good friend of Mr. Jones, but Mr. Corcoran is a good friend of the biggest man in town. As between the two, Farmer Schramm seems to be caught between the lightning rod and the silo.

State Secretary Hull has been working quietly to keep the name of Japan out of congressional legislation (probably remembering the effect of the exclusion law). He personally was responsible for the elimination of Japan by name from the arms embargo resolutions and from a bill to impede Japanese fishing

CIO PRESSURE

"Thanks," said Mr. Rowe, who turned on his heel and departed by the back door.

NOTE—Rowe's connection with the Corcoran school of thought has been pretty well exploited. Corcoran's friends say, over-exploited. The third new executive agent, William McReynolds, does not belong to a political school. Treasury Secretary Morgenthau once tried to get the president to appoint him comptroller general. He was given this job to work out the problem of getting lawyers and economists into government without respect to civil service restrictions, a problem which will be submitted publicly soon in a report from a presidential commission appointed by the president months ago to make a survey.
