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that the people would have a chance to decide which side they believed.

The final decision to abandon efforts to revise the law at this session was said to have been brought about by an informal poll of those present, taken by Vice President Garner.

Besides the president, Garner, Hull and Borah, those attending the conference were Democratic Leader Barkley, Republican Leader McNary, Chairman Pittman (D-Nev.) of the foreign relations committee, and Senator Austin (R-Vt.) assistant minority leader.

The president was represented by some of those present as being particularly anxious for the responsibility for failure to act—a failure which he contended would tie this country's hands if war broke out in Europe—be placed squarely on the senate.

This was reported to have provoked a brilliant exchange with Borah, in which the veteran Idaho senator, sitting directly opposite the president, was quoted as saying:

"Of course the responsibility must rest upon the senate. Where else could it rest? It is perfectly proper that it should be there. We are not operating under Hitler."

In a sharp exchange of views with Borah, one conferee said, the president declared the senator might have his opinions, but that he, the president, had facts. At one point, accounts of the meeting continued, Garner turned to Mr. Roosevelt and said:

"You had just as well be candid about this, captain, you haven't got the votes."

Garner then asked Barkley if he thought the administration controlled sufficient votes to discharge the foreign relations committee from consideration of the neutrality legislation and bring it directly to the floor. Barkley replied that in his opinion it did not, and cited results of a poll he had taken in the afternoon.

SOCIALISTS HELD FOR BOMB PLOT BY DANZIG POLICE

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relic has nothing to do with it." Informed quarters intimated the "marxian socialists" had entered relations with Poland detrimental to Danzig and Germany.

Announcement of the arrest of 20 "marxian socialists" charged with plotting against the free city of Danzig and a statement by British Prime Minister Chamberlain that he hoped a British-French-Russian mutual assistance pact would be concluded by August 4 led European developments today.

Newly-organized political police of the Nazi-dominated free city announced the arrested

"socialists" were "presumably associated with some hostile foreign power." They said the prisoners had stored explosives to blow up bridges and would be charged with treason.

Chamberlain, although stating "we certainly have not got an agreement yet," told the house of commons he hoped to announce the tri-power defense pact before parliament recesses August 4.

As the British cabinet met today principal concern seemed to be the protracted delay in the Moscow negotiations for including Russia into the British-French front. Less hopeful observers felt that the three-month-old talks could not continue much longer without losing much of their value.

Asia Stalemate

Britain had another apparent stalemate on its hands in the Tokyo negotiations on Tientsin. Ambassador Sir Robert Leslie Craigie, after a five hour meeting tonight with Foreign Minister Tachibana Arita, was said to have departed in anger with the situation still deadlocked.

Britain went ahead with her usual defense plans on the continent. Major-General Sir Edmund Ironside, inspector-general of overseas forces, beginning an inspection of various branches of the Polish army.

Chinese Victory

Chinese reports asserted that deep in China the long-checked Japanese forces in Hupei and Shansi provinces had been defeated by the Chinese. The reports said a large-scale battle was under way now in southeastern Shansi, and that the Japanese had lost 7000 men there in the past two weeks.

To combat a widespread whispering campaign in the protectorate of Bohemia and Moravia, former heart of the Czechoslovak republic now governed by Germany, the minister of transportation, George Havelka, urged fellow Czechs to adapt themselves to German aims rather than nourish "unfounded hopes."

In a radio appeal he sought to dash dreams of resurrecting the Czech republic.

He quoted Bridges as saying: "You're just like Earl Browder (national communist leader). He couldn't understand the rank and file movement on the coast when I met him at Fishbacker pool on the beach (San Francisco). I told him I had had to take the rank and file workers even away from Mike Casey of the (San Francisco) Teamsters' union."

Saprio testified Bridges said "We've got men in the Sailors union, the International Longshoremen's association, Cooks and Stewards union and the ARTA (American Radio Telegraphists association), and Bridges termed the ARTA 'our prize baby.'"

CHINESE CLAIM INTERIOR GAINS

On the other front, about 100 miles west of Hankow, the Chinese reported they were pushing the invaders back from the Han river which they had been trying to cross since a few weeks after the October 26 fall of Hankow.

The Japanese drive westward through Hupei province had been directed at Shansi and Ichang, important mid-Yangtze ports upriver from Hankow.

River Crossings

The Shansi campaign has been aimed at various times at crossings of the Yellow river southward into Honan province for a junction with forces along the Lunghai railway and westward for an invasion of Shensi province.

It was impossible to confirm the latest Chinese reports but it had long been apparent the Japanese were stalled in Shansi and Hupei.

The latest development in Japanese-British friction in China—a Japanese charge a British soldier on the outskirts of Shanghai bayoneted a Chinese railway crossing employee brought to threat of an anti-British boycott from the Japanese operators of the war-commandeered central China railways. They said they might refuse railway facilities to Britons and British goods.

PORTLAND, July 19 (AP)—Police automobiles were employed as moving vans today to recover about \$3000 worth of jewelry, guns, radios and clothing from a huge, rambling seven-room house occupied solely by a 18-year-old Tigard youth.

Detectives Roy Ripley and Perry Belter said the boy, Lewis LaFollett, had been arrested on an open charge for questioning about a series of burglaries. They also detained a companion, Frances Lewis, 18, who was graduated from high school in June. Recent robberies in Portland have been distinguished by a youth who carried away articles in a pillowcase.

Articles, which also included tennis rackets, golf balls, tennis balls, baseballs, motion picture projection sets and clocks, were scattered through the big dwelling. Many of them, the detectives said, were reported stolen six months ago.

Missing Bonds Found in Grass Near Milton Depot

PENDLETON, July 19 (AP)—Sheriff Bob Goad received word today that the \$38,500 face value bonds and \$2200 in checks stolen from the Milton-Pendleton Union Pacific station express agency last week were found this morning, in brush along the tracks a thousand feet from the station.

Although the discovery eased the officers' burden of recovery, the sheriff, railroad and express officers continued their quest of the robber, who broke into the station through a window.

As the bonds were serially numbered and listed at the office of Jesse G. Wells, trustee of the defunct Eugene Bible college, to Mrs. Laura Harris and her daughters, Mabel and Martha, of Milton Freewater, and were in the process of liquidation, which made them of no value to anyone else, the mystery remained as to whether it was a professional or an "inside" job by someone having knowledge of the shipment. Mr. Wells said at Eugene the bonds were worth about 10 per cent of their face value—"If anyone would buy them."

Payment had been stopped on the three checks in the package, destroying their value to anyone but the Harris.

Sheriff Goad said it was surprising the thief was expecting an express shipment and, finding bonds, instead, threw them away.

ROOSEVELT ASKS REFUGEE BOARD TO WASHINGTON

LONDON, July 19 (AP)—President Roosevelt today invited officers of the 39 nation inter-governmental committee on refugees to meet at the White House in Washington to discuss the problem of finding homes for refugees from central Europe.

Announcement of the invitation was made after a meeting of the committee at the foreign office.

"United States Representative Myron C. Taylor conveyed an invitation from the president of the United States to the chairman, vice chairman and director of the committee to meet him in conference at the White House in Washington the first week in September," the announcement said.

Nazi Paper Rails at Styles As Waste of Clothes, Money

BERLIN, July 19 (AP)—Das Schwarze Korps, organ of the elite S. S. blackshirt guards, poured scorn today on women's styles, especially in hats, as a wasteful "foreign swindle."

With an apology for invading the field of feminine fashion magazines, Das Schwarze Korps declared:

"German women should learn that one puts a dress aside when it is worn out or no longer is suited to her age—not when it becomes 'out of fashion.'"

No Difference

"For what really becomes a woman 'charmingly' in the spring is not her dress but her personality, which becomes her just as charmingly next spring and the spring thereafter, provided it is good cloth and well taken care of."

Das Schwarze Korps sees in constantly changing fashion creations an "irresponsible" waste of

material" at the expense of national economy.

"For what is the use of our entire anti-waste campaign," the magazine asked, "if the fashion industry, by continuing change of styles, intentionally makes products of the textile industry worthless almost from month to month?"

The publication found particularly distasteful "advertising magicians" who convince women that to be beautiful they have to obtain "models being ballyhooed right now." This leads not only to a change in mode four times a year, but also between seasons, it observed.

"As a result they put a Brazilian plover or an Australian miniature stork on some kind of beer pad and sell this demagogic of nature as the 'last word' of the hat making art at outrageous prices."

SALE OF MUNITION STORAGE HALTED BY PAYMENT OF TAXES

LOS ANGELES, July 19 (AP)—Sale by the county assessor of a 170,000 stock of arms and ammunition was halted today when a \$1356 tax claim was paid by Richard L. Dineley, a San Francisco exporter.

The munitions, consisting of hand grenades, artillery ammunition, trench mortars, cartridge belts, steel helmets, bayonets, gas masks, trench mortar shells and several pieces of field artillery, had been consigned to Dineley after shipment from San Antonio, Tex., to Raymond Aris, a Panamanian.

County Assessor John R. Quinn said that with payment of the tax claim he had "lost all interest" in the matter, but the county board of supervisors had a notice from H. R. Hubbard, a San Francisco attorney, declaring he is half owner of the munitions as the result of a suit and attachment over collection of a promissory note in San Francisco.
