TULSA, (AP)—Lloyd Price, lunch stand attendant, protested to the gunman, "You'll cause me to be fired."

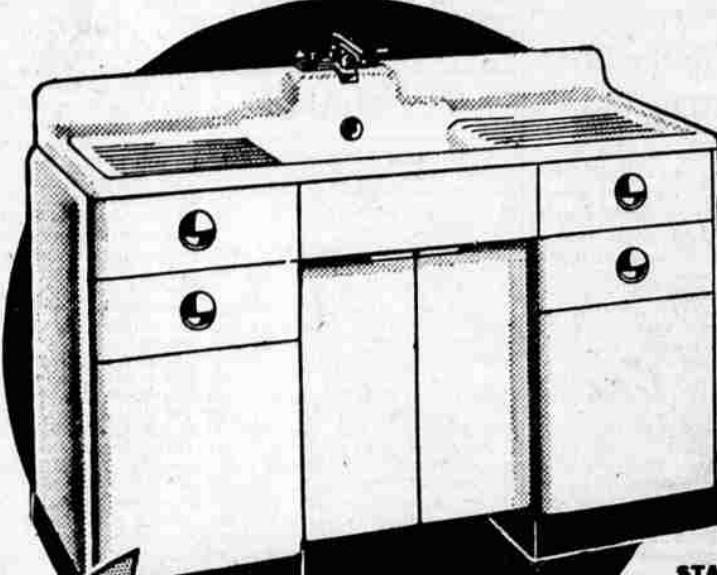
