

PEARL HARBOR DEFENSE GETS NEW STRENGTH

HONOLULU, T. H., July 19 (AP) — Two of the navy's main offensive weapons — the scouting and raiding sections of the fleet — have been tremendously strengthened in Pearl Harbor, a survey of the giant naval base revealed today.

A total of 17 new patrol bombers is on duty at the fleet air base, following a "routine" non-stop delivery flight of 15 planes June 28 from San Diego. With scheduled arrival of the submarines, Seal July 16, and Pompano July 18, a total of 24 submarines will be in Hawaiian waters — all but four of the modern, late-type ships. Eight submarines, accompanied by the USS Richmond, cruiser flagship of the submarine force of the fleet, and the tender Holland reached Pearl Harbor July 7.

Numbers important — This numerical strength is important when it is recalled that the total commissioned submarine strength of the navy is approximately 55 vessels. Thus nearly half the navy's undersea strength will be in Hawaii. Furthermore, the total submarine force is scattered between the New London, Conn., Coco Solo, and Pearl Harbor bases and the fleet proper, making the local concentration the more impressive.

The Pompano is scheduled to sail July 21 on a shake-down cruise in the south Pacific — perhaps to Tahiti, which the new destroyer McCall visited some months ago. The eight visiting submarines are due to return to San Diego in August.

Another new arrival at Pearl Harbor will be the USS Langley, former aircraft carrier now classed as a seaplane tender. She left San Diego July 11, and will be permanently stationed here.

The increase in submarine and aircraft strength have made Pearl Harbor a more active threat in contrast to its normal position as a full-developed, mid-Pacific base for the fleet. Normally only a few active vessels are in the harbor. In addition to the ships mentioned the harbor has four submarine tenders, a submarine rescue ship, and one destroyer attached to the submarine base; one large mine layer — the Ogala — and eight light mine layers; and two seaplane tenders.

Cruiser Overhauled — Now undergoing overhaul at the base is the cruiser Northampton, while the new cruiser Honolulu paid a one week's visit to the city after which she is named in mid-July.

Five rear-admirals will be stationed at Pearl Harbor by the end of July. They are Rear Admiral Arthur L. Bristol, who is enroute to Hawaii aboard the Langley to become commander of patrol wing two at the air base; Orin G. Murfin, commandant of the 14th naval district; E. J. Marquart, commander of the mine craft in the battle force at Pearl Harbor; J. H. Newton, commander of cruisers in division four; and Wilhelm L. Friedell, commander of the fleet submarine force.

The latest figures disclose that at least three pilots in training are killed every two days in Germany; the rate in Britain is approximately two a week, and the same general figures go for both France and Italy.

Inflation Danger Seen Looming by Harvard Expert

PAULO ALTO, Calif., July 19 (AP) — Complete or at least partial repudiation of the national debt was forecast last night by W. L. Crum, noted Harvard economist and consulting expert of the United States treasury.

Disastrous inflation in the near future, also was predicted by Crum in a speech at the Stanford university business conference.

The coming inflation "will catch everyone," Crum said pointing out "there is no protection against inflation that any of us can use to take advantage of it in any way."

He said the best thing "to do is to have a small homestead too small to be taxed heavily."

National debt repudiation Crum saw as inevitable if debt figures continue to rise. The breaking point, he said, would be reached when the federal debt reached a total of \$80,000,000,000 twice its present figure.

Carrying charges on such a huge sum, the economist said would be \$3,000,000,000 annually which would cause a public outcry for complete or partial repudiation.

PUBLIC RELATIONS COURSE OFFERED

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, July 19—Business and professional men, civic officials, agricultural and labor leaders, and other citizens from Klamath Falls and all sections of the state have been invited to enroll for the summer short course in public relations, to be held under the auspices of the state system of higher education at Reed college, Portland, July 31 to August 11. It was announced here today by Chancellor F. M. Hunter, chairman for the session.

Plans to interest leading men and women in all parts of the state in the institute were made here at a recent meeting of the coordinating committee, which is headed by Dr. Hunter.

A faculty of five outstanding experts in the field of public relations will be joined by outstanding Oregon leaders in conducting the course. The list of nationally known authorities includes Don D. Leachler, University of Wisconsin; Edward L. Bernays, New York, regarded as the leading public relations executive in the country; Harwood L. Childs, editor of Public Opinion Quarterly; Harford Powell, public relations counsel for New York City; and Rex F. Harlow, Stanford university, president of the organization sponsoring the course, the American Institute of Public Relations.

Of special interest to agricultural and labor leaders will be work offered under Dr. Leachler. His career includes positions as chief statistician for the Minnesota department of labor and industry and superintendent of the Minneapolis public employment office. He is the author of "The Labor Market," "Can Business Prevent Employment?" and many other books and articles.

ECONOMISTS AIR ECON STRUCTURE

PAULO ALTO, Calif., July 19 (AP) — Pros and cons of the effects of government policy upon the nation's economic structure were aired Tuesday in a brisk debate between two noted economists attending the annual Stanford university business conference.

Dean Edwin Francis Gay of the Harvard business school said increased governmental participation in industry preargued an era of "cooperative social effort, with the government playing an increasingly important part."

Harley L. Lutz, public expert of the Princeton university, took the diametrically opposite view, saying that a complete "about face" in government policy was necessary to stimulate scientific and industrial activity.

"If we about-faced," Lutz said, "the relief problem would disappear in ten minutes as the line of industrial pioneers made ready to

attack our new frontier formed on the left."

Lutz denied his theory was the result of any political belief. "A republican no more than a democrat can give you the answer," he said. Discussing the problem of investment in federal securities, Lutz said he envisaged nothing but a black picture for investors when the federal debt structure collapsed with the fall of artificial price structures.

FSA LOANS UPHELD FOR HOMESTEADERS

WASHINGTON, July 19 (AP) — The senate passed and sent to the house yesterday a bill to allow application of funds borrowed by prospective homesteaders from the farm security administration on the acquisition of lands on reclamation projects.

The bill by Senator Wheeler (D-Mont.) to further cooperation between the bureau of reclamation and the FSA, would authorize the secretary of the interior to consider money made available to settlers by the FSA as all or part of the capital (\$2000) required by the reclamation bureau before homesteading.
