

OREGON EGG MENU WINNERS LISTED

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis, Ore.—Five Oregon women who submitted the best menus for using eggs in preparing balanced, attractive and economical meals, have been declared state champions and their menus have been submitted in the national competition for a \$1000 grand prize to be awarded at the World Poultry Congress in Cleveland late in July. The five winners follow:

Mrs. Golden Weber, route 2, Troutdale, \$30; Mrs. L. Lassater, Philomath, \$25; Miss Susan E. Wells, Toledo, \$20; Miss Dortha Richards, Oregon City, \$15; Mrs. R. A. Morden, Portland, \$10. Some of the Oregon women may also receive free trips to the poultry congress in case they are among 20 from the entire United States who will be selected to go to Cleveland to demonstrate their winning menus.

The Oregon branch of this national contest was sponsored jointly by the Oregon World Poultry Congress committee and the Pacific Cooperative Poultry Producers, each of which put up \$50 in prize money. Judges of the contest were Miss Lucy A. Case, OSC extension specialist in nutrition, chairman; Nancy Morris, home economics editor of the Oregonian; Frances Clinton, home demonstration agent of Umatilla county; and Helen Cowgill, assistant state leader of 4-H club work. The cash awards have been made by Fred Cockell, state chairman of the poultry congress committee.

House Orders Sweeping Probe Of Labor Board

WASHINGTON, July 20 (AP)—The house ordered today a sweeping investigation of the national labor relations board.

A resolution creating a five-man investigating committee was put through by an almost solid phalanx of republicans and a large group of democrats.

Speaker Bankhead announced the roll call vote for the resolution was 252 to 135.

The measure, by Representative Smith (D-Va.) calls for an inquiry to determine whether a new board to administer the Wagner labor act should be created and what effect the board may have had on employer and labor relations.

Sponsors claimed the inquiry was necessary to meet "tremendous pressure" from all parts of the country while opponents asked that action be deferred until labor committees of both the senate and house could conclude their hearings on Wagner act amendments and make recommendations of their own.

The vote on final approval came shortly after a test vote of 265 to 131 had disclosed a majority of representatives were for the investigation.

The action came, after an hour of bitter debate, on a technical question leading to a vote on the main issue of whether the inquiry should be ordered.

DAMAGING FROST HALTS INVASION OF GRASSHOPPERS

CONDON—Late spring frosts which damaged grain in some sections of central and eastern Oregon had some beneficial results, according to William Marshall, county agent of Gilliam county. Threatened grasshopper invasions in the Trailfork section of the county were effectively checked by the cold weather. Poison bait materials which were on hand to fight the hoppers have been stored for use next year if necessary. Mormon cricket control operations in northern Gilliam county will result in the saving of at least \$500 for land owners, Marshall estimates.

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KOAC ANNOUNCES STUDY PROGRAM

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis, Ore.—Advance notice of the 10th annual series of KOAC radio study club programs for the coming fall and winter season, has just been given by the general extension division, which is in charge of the program service of the state-owned station located on this campus. Personality problems will be the subject of the study club program for 1939-40, with Dr. Elizabeth Montgomery, assistant professor in the school of education at the University of Oregon, as the chief lecturer.

Any group of friends or neighbors, or any organization, may enroll as a radio club by contacting KOAC. Program outlines, report blanks and other aids are then supplied regularly to the club without charge. Such a group meets where there is a radio, conducts preliminary business, then listens to the radio program for half an hour. After this the study group discusses the subject of the day and makes a written report to the station, which may include questions which club members want answered.

This crate is 22 inches long, 16 inches wide, and 10 inches deep, all inside measurements, has a capacity of 3520 cubic inches, and holds twenty-five pounds.

Debate Starts on Political Bill

WASHINGTON, July 20 (AP)—Representative Dempsey (D-N.M.) started house debate today on the Hatch bill to regulate "pernicious political activities," by saying he never had seen a piece of legislation that was "so misinterpreted." Two quorum calls, each requiring 25 minutes, hampered his argument. Rep. Parsons (D-Ill.) demanded the first call before Dempsey got started and five min-

utes after it was over, Rep. Lesinski (D-Mich.) asked another.

Taking up the measure section by section, Dempsey told the house that it would prohibit coercion by any person in order to obtain votes in a national election.
